EPA to introduce new jet service

Wabush (Staff)—Eastern Provincial Airways has disclosed it will introduce on June 1 a daily jet service connecting Montreal, Charlottetown, Halifax, Deer Lake and St. John's.

An additional EPA daily jet service will fly from St. John's to Wabush via Goose Bay, with scheduled stops at Deer Lake on Mondays, Wednesdays, Fridays and Sundays, and at Gander on Tuesdays, Thursdays and Saturdays.

The summer schedule flights, marking EPA's entry into the jet age, will be made with Boeing 737 twin-jet aircraft capable of carrying 109 passengers or 25,000 pounds of cargo.

The jet equipment will be leased from United Air Lines, and maintained in Montreal by Nordair.

Re-establishment of the east-west service will re-open EPA's dormant route between the maritime provinces and Newfoundland and Labrador via Halifax. This will provide a new

jet route to Montreal, gateway for air travellers of the Atlantic region.

Schedule timing calls for a late afternoon departure from Montreal and a late evening arrival in St. John's. The return flight departs St. John's early each morning and arrives Montreal during mid-morning.

The service linking Newfoundland and Labrador is an overnight return flight originating in St. John's.

The overnight schedule was selected after considering every variation of a jet service package that could be set up by early summer, that would serve all the company's major routes, and that would permit aircraft maintenance in Montreal where jet maintenance facilities are available.

Schedules of the east-west and north-south services are interim summer schedules, but probably will remain in effect until the airline receives permission to operate between Churchill Falls and Montreal.

Application for such a route is before the Canadian Transport Commission and is slated for a mid-June hearing. Acquisition of the Montreal-Churchill Falls license would give EPA a second entry into the Montreal gateway and ease future scheduling problems.

EPA also will operate secondary Dart Herald services between Montreal and Charlo, N.B., and throughout the Maritime provinces on a summer schedule calculated to connect with the mainline jet service at Charlottetown.

Meanwhile, due to increased traffic on a jet service starting on June 1 the EPA operation will insist that passengers check-in at least 40 minutes prior to flight departure.

Station manager, Barry Clouter, stated that in order to assure departure, the airline regrets they will be unable to accept late arriving passengers at the airport. They ask the co-operation of travellers in this regard.

Backstrom to conduct hockey school

HOCKEY SCHOOL

Labrador City (Staff) - NHL Hockey star, Ralph Backstrom will be in Labrador City again this year to conduct a hockey school.

The school will be held from August 24-30 at the Labrador City Arena.

The program, for boys 7-19 years, will include skating, stick handling, shooting, passing drills and chalk talks.

Each group will get two hours of ice time per day and each boy plays in his own age group.

Ball games, tennis, swimming and instructional, as well as recreational movies will make up the "off the ice" program.

At the end of each week, games will be played and trophies distributed to the best performers and to the students who have given most attention to instructions during the week.

In order to keep a high standard of instruction and continually improve it, top professionals will be on hand, who will bring to the school, a wealth of knowledge and experience in both forward, defence and goaltending positions.

Each student is required to bring his own equipment ---hockey helmets are compulsory.

For local students the fee is \$30 for the first member of the family, \$20 for the second, \$10 for the third and any additional members.

For out of town students, the fee is \$35 for the first member of the family, \$25 for the second, \$15 for the third.

Out of town students must arrange their own living accommodations.

Series on water safety will begin in Aurora

In order to encourage the various aspects of water safety the Aurora in co-operation with the Wabush Recreation Centre's director of water safety, Ron Brophy will commence this week a series of articles covering the various areas of water safety both indoors and out. The new column which will be entitled "Water Safety With You and Yours" will commence with a list of the rules and regulations governing swimming activities at the recreation pool.

In order to comply with the Newfoundland Department of Health Requirements and for your own comfort, safety, and convenience the following rules will apply at all times in the Swimming Pool and Locker Rooms. Failure to abide by any of these rules will result in suspension of pool privileges.

1. All persons are required

to take a soap shower before using the pool.

2. Any person having skin disease, open cuts, head colds, nasal or ear discharge, are not permitted to use the pool.

3. No boisterous or rough play, running, pushing, except in supervised sports, is permitted in the pool, on the pool deck, on diving boards or in the locker rooms or dressing rooms.

4. Smoking is prohibited in all locker and dressing rooms and in the pool area.

5. No gum, candy, or other food is to be carried into the locker rooms or pool.

6. Footwear or any item of clothing other than bathing suits are not allowed in the pool area.

7. No swimming across the paths of divers.

8. Safety equipment is not to be touched except in cases of emergency.

9. Users of the pool are to comply with directions from the

pool supervisors or lifeguards on duty.

10. Only one person is permitted on a diving board at a time.

11. Management is not responsible for any articles lost. Report all missing items or turn in any found items to Control Room Attendant.

12. Masks, fins or snorkels are not permitted in the pool.

13. **CHILDREN UNDER 17 WILL NOT BE PERMITTED IN THE POOL AREA EXCEPT AT SCHEDULED TIME FOR THEIR AGE GROUP, AT WHICH TIME SUPERVISION IS PROVIDED, (UNLESS THEY ARE ACCOMPANIED BY THEIR PARENTS), WHO WILL BE DIRECTLY RESPONSIBLE FOR THEM.**

Scanning the market

Mining Stocks from \$1.00-\$2.00 to \$20.00. This short review will concentrate on mines already in production or due to begin operations in 1969.

Several of the higher priced mines in this group offer definite potential gain.

(a) Northgate Explorations. Present price about \$18.00. Canadian controlled Northgate is Ireland's chief base metal and silver producer. A recent advisory report states "it has developed capabilities that will take advantage of the company's strength, ore in the ground and a strong cash position. It is an excellent hedge against inflation. Shares are recommended as above average with relatively little downward risk." The impending listing of shares on the American Stock Exchange (current listings Toronto and London) is an important factor from the stock market point of view. To add icing to the cake, Northgate, by Irish law, has been given complete tax exemption until 1986.

(b) Bethlem Copper. The B.C. producer that touched off the Highland Valley action. This company whose shares reached \$21.00 this year (present price \$17.00) is in a strong financial position having retired its long term debt. Sumitomo Metal Mining Co., of Japan has undertaken to purchase all copper concentrates until 1973. 1968-69 profits were \$1.27 per share.

(c) Brenda Mines. Due to commence production in October 1969. Its facilities, which will cost \$65,000,000.00

is planned as a 24,000 ton per day operation, and will be managed by Noranda Mines. Nippon Mining has agreed to take all production for a period of 5 years. This copper-molybdenum property is also located in British Columbia. Present price of \$14.00 is \$4.00 below its high for 1969.

(d) Dynasty Explorations. The new copper-lead operation is due to commence operations this summer. Its Anvil Mine in the Yukon will ship a considerable quantity of minerals to Japan. High \$23.00. Present price \$18.00.

(e) Sheritt Gordon Mines. A Canadian owned, widely diversified producer with extensive nickel holdings in Australia. Its principal Canadian operation is at Lynn Lake, Manitoba. Dividends have been raised from 20 cents to 30 cents. Shares trade at \$10.50 below their 1969 high of \$13.50.

Shares Trading Under Ten Dollars

(a) Brunswick Mining & Smelting Ltd. After a troubled beginning which saw shares drop from \$19.50 to \$4.30, Noranda Mines took over management in 1967. Since then the price has risen to \$9.20. Present price \$8.65. Brunswicks' operation is located near Bathurst, N.B. This company still carries a heavy debt structure from its earlier difficulties. However with good ore reserves and Noranda management it should turn into a profitable operation.

(b) Lake Dufault Mines Ltd. Controlled by Falconbridge Nickel. As copper ore reserves

fell last year, so did the share price from \$11.75 to \$6.05. Present price \$7.70. An extensive new development is presently under way. If successful shares could rebound to their 1967 price of \$16.50. This company paid handsome dividends in prior years, \$4.00 in both 1966-67.

(c) Madeline Mines. Present price \$6.30. Due to commence operations later this month in

the Gaspé Area of Quebec. MacIntyre Porcupine will have control of the new copper producer.

(d) Western Mines. Another B.C. copper-zinc producer. Because of a heavy debt structure and low zinc prices, shares dropped to \$1.95 last year. Present price of \$3.80 is well below its high of \$6.15 reached in 1966. Northgate Explorations has recently

purchased large blocks of Treasury shares, enabling Western to strengthen its cash position.

(e) Arctic Gold and Silver Mines. Gold-silver-lead-zinc operation commenced last year and shares rose to over \$4.00. However production and quality problems soon became apparent. Although the owners have stated early difficulties can be overcome, this stock rates as strictly speculative.

SNOW CLEARING COSTS LOWER THAN LAST YEAR

Town Clerk, Norman Genge, reported that snow removal costs for the month of April amounted to \$2,351.45 which brings to \$27,084.16 the cost of snow removal up to April 30, 1969. This amount, he said, was about \$10,000. less for the corresponding period last year.

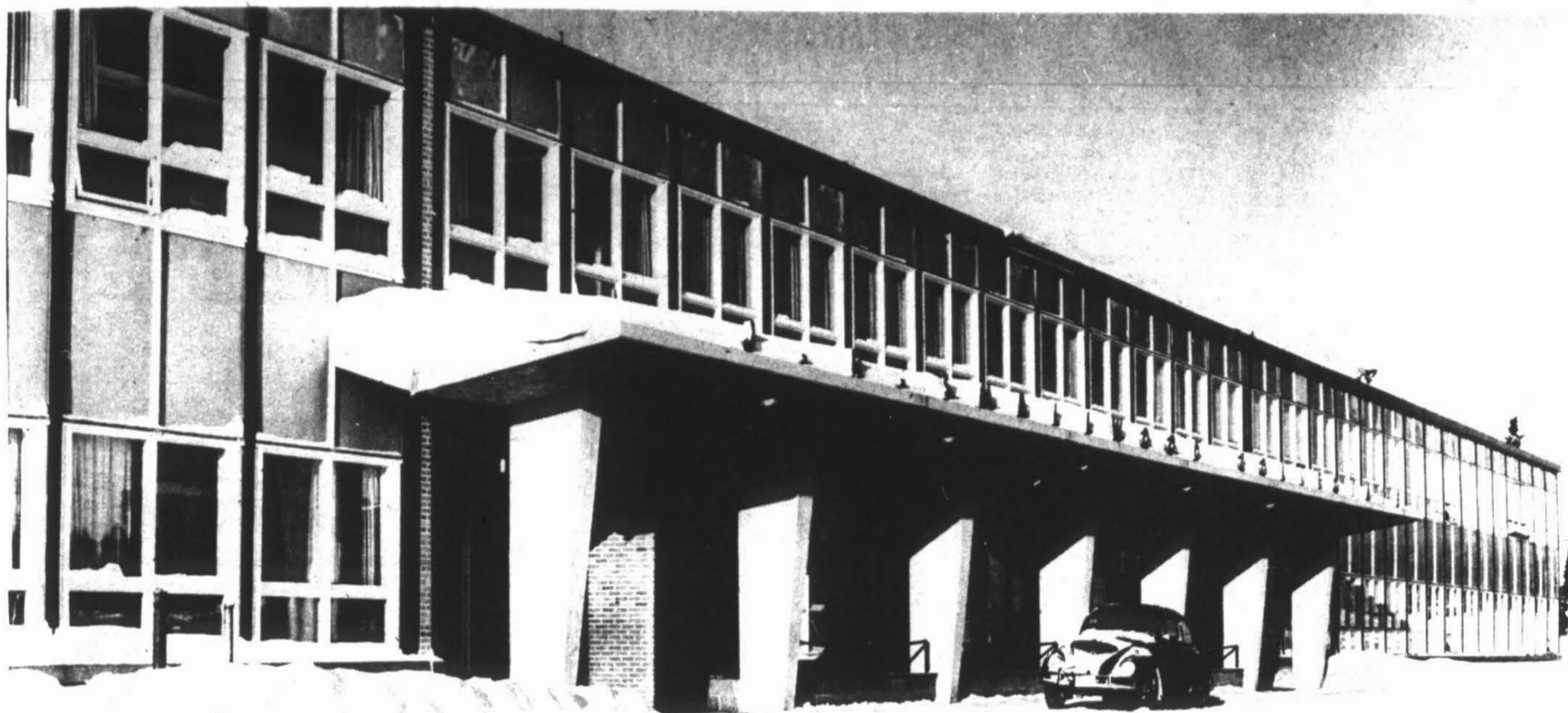

Collegiate has three sources of influence

The Labrador City Collegiate is a private school and has three sources of influence: The private school board, the principal and the teachers.

The board operates under a special act of government and the seven members are appointed by the Iron Ore Company of Canada. All are university trained, have broad experience and really have the interest of education at heart. All work in the interest of the all-around development of the child.

The school instructs all students from Grade 9 to 11 inclusive and is the only high school in Labrador City. Besides the Newfoundland Department of Education curriculum, they also teach all French speaking children under the Catholic-French curriculum of Quebec. The "Voix Images de France" series, with the aid of tapes, film strips and records, is taught to the other children learning French.

Besides the subjects normally available, a student so inclined, may also study Geology.

The school sponsors an adult education program offering subjects to qualify for Grade 11 certificates or for a junior matriculation diploma. A business education program is also given.

There are 232 students registered this year with 26 teachers and projected for next year are 340 students with 33 teachers.

The Labrador City Amalgamated School, an elementary school, has been

The Labrador City Amalgamated School, an elementary school, has been operating for two years and is primarily for Protestant and Non-Roman Catholic children. Classes are divided between the C.E. McManus building and the Labrador City Collegiate.

The 10 board members represent the United Church, Anglican, Salvation Army and the Pentecostal Church, which automatically includes the ministers from each.

For the 'learning-to-speak-French' program the school uses the "Bonjour Line" series for grades 3 to 6 and "Voix Images de France" series from grades 7 to 8. Students are

assisted with the usual audio-visual aids.

Construction of a new building is expected to begin this year which will provide 30 additional classrooms. There is speculation that the building may feature mobile walls which is the latest concept in classroom design. The school will still find it necessary to use the C.E. McManus building and possibly maintain some classrooms at the Labrador City Collegiate. The new site is to be between the Embassy apartments and the C.I.L. apartments.

There are presently 700 students registered with 36 teachers and next year they expect 750 children with 40 teachers.

Notre Dame Academy, Labrador City, is a Catholic school for the elementary grades and is jointly presided over, with the Sacred Heart section of J.R. Smallwood Collegiate, Wabush, by the same Local Committee operating under the Roman Catholic Consolidated School Board for Labrador. Committee members are gazetted by the Department of Education upon the recommendation of the Bishop.

French is taught, from grades 1 to 3, four times a week with the aid of the "Voix Images de France" series and associated audio-visual

N.D.A. is responsible for the Quebec French curriculum offered to all

N.D.A. is responsible for the Quebec French curriculum offered to all French students of Labrador West, in the elementary grades.

The school also operates the National Film Board Library for our area.

Ten new classrooms will be constructed this summer and ten more in 1970. These will be connected to the present structure.

Six hundred and eighty-four students are registered with 39 teachers and next year they expect 805 students with 43 teachers.

J.R. Smallwood Collegiate, Sacred Heart Section, Wabush, conducts its own elementary and high school programs, excepting the French students who study at the Notre Dame Academy or the Labrador City Collegiate.

"Le Francais Partout" series is taught to children learning French, up to grade 6 and thereafter the Department of Education requirements are adopted with special emphasis on aural-oral French. Subject teaching begins at grade 7 and is followed through to grade 11.

There will be another story added to the building this summer which will provide 16 more classrooms and will be shared with the Amalgamated section of the school.

There are 305 students registered with 25 teachers and next year it is expected to have 350 students with 28 teachers.

J.R. Smallwood Collegiate, Amalgamated Section, Wabush, primarily caters to the

Protestant population of Wabush and operates its own elementary and high school programs, excepting the French students.

As of July 1, 1969, the school will have a new integrated board with six elected representatives and four appointed members, representative of the four major Protestant denominations of our area.

French with the "Bonjour Line" series is taught from grades 4 to 6 and from grades 7 to 11 and the Department of Education text is adopted with special emphasis on the aural-oral. Subject teaching begins in grade 7.

There are presently 325 children registered with 27 teachers and next year 375 are

expected with 30 teachers.

In conclusion it may be safely said that the quality of education in Labrador West is better than most other centers. This is due largely to the financing available through the mining companies and the constant re-evaluation and implementation of the whole curriculum process, through the local curriculum committees.

As one school principal indicated, when he said, "When I pass a classroom door and there is only silence within, I worry, but if there are rumblings I am sure that the learning process goes on". Our educators are ever forward looking and the future looks bright for our children.

Who are the Kinsmen ?

The Kinsmen Club of Wabush Lake area was chartered in 1964. At that time it was the 397th club of its kind in Canada. Today, approximately 430 clubs with 14,000 active members are serving Canada from St. John's, Newfoundland, to Victoria, British Columbia.

Conceived and founded by Hal Rogers of Hamilton, Ontario, who set up the institution as a young men's organization in 1920, the Association of Kinsmen Clubs has become the largest of all Canadian service clubs.

Each of the 30 members of the Wabush Lake branch is extremely proud of the accomplishments of the Kinsmen Clubs across Canada and of the service work performed by the local club. From the beginning, the Kinsmen have spent most of their efforts on the youth of the area with such projects as sponsoring the Boy Scouts and Cubs of Wabush, with talent programs, and in the near future, with the assistance of the Local Improvement Board, with a children's playground.

Funds for these projects are raised in many ways, such as raffles, suppers and dances. The Kinsmen, therefore, are dependent on the co-operation and participation of the community.

An important date in the history of the Wabush Lake area Club was June 1966 when a Kinette Club was chartered for the wives of the Kinsmen. In many instances, their assistance has proven invaluable to the Kinsmen. Typical of a well

organized women's club, they work independently on such projects as operation beaver and tuberculosis association fund raising.

A sampling of the national club efforts will give some justification of the pride of being a member of such an organization.

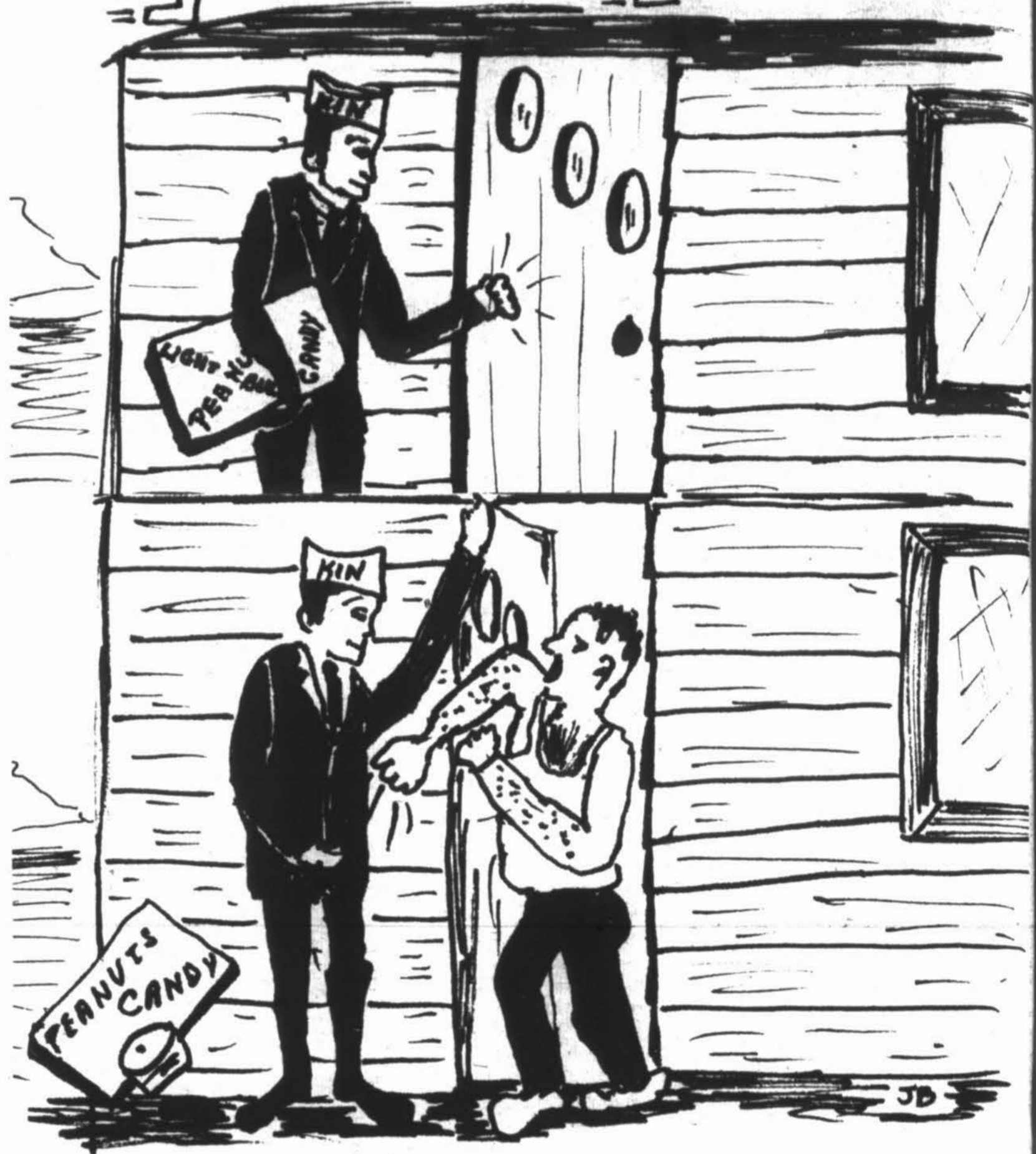
In mid 1940, at a national convention held in Edmonton, Hal Rogers was appointed chairman of a national war service committee.

During the first year, the Kinsmen built and financed the first mobile dental clinic in the British army. Some 65 tons of magazines were shipped to the merchant marines. Two hostess houses for the wives and families of troops were built in Shilo, Manitoba, and Deberd, Nova Scotia. The Kinsmen sold war savings stamps in special Kin folders in order to support these projects.

At another national convention held in 1941, the Kinsmen adopted "Milk for Britain" as the association's major war service effort. Through the participation of all Kinsmen, over 2 1/2 million dollars was raised in only four years. The result was that 50,000,000 quarts of milk were shipped to the children of Great Britain during and after the war.

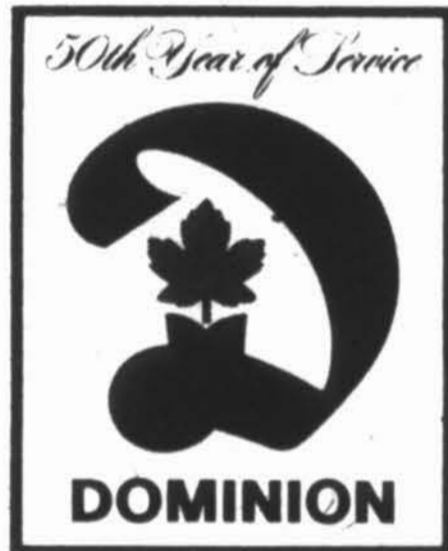
At present, an \$800,000 school is under construction in Ontario. Sponsored by Kinsmen, this school will train teachers to educate the approximately 600,000 mentally handicapped children and adults across Canada.

R.C. Baxter, the mine manager of Wabush mines said last week that if the strike of the Point Noire pelletizing plant continues and if railroad employees who are respecting the picket of striking dock workers at Seven Islands continues, the Wabush operation could come to a virtual standstill.

All mining operations ceased last week when an additional 110 men were laid off.

Tom Riggs, president of the local of the United Steel Workers of America, said the layoff is bound to have far reaching effects on the men laid off and their families.

Quebecair reports increased business as a result of the strike and the subsequent non-movement of rail traffic.

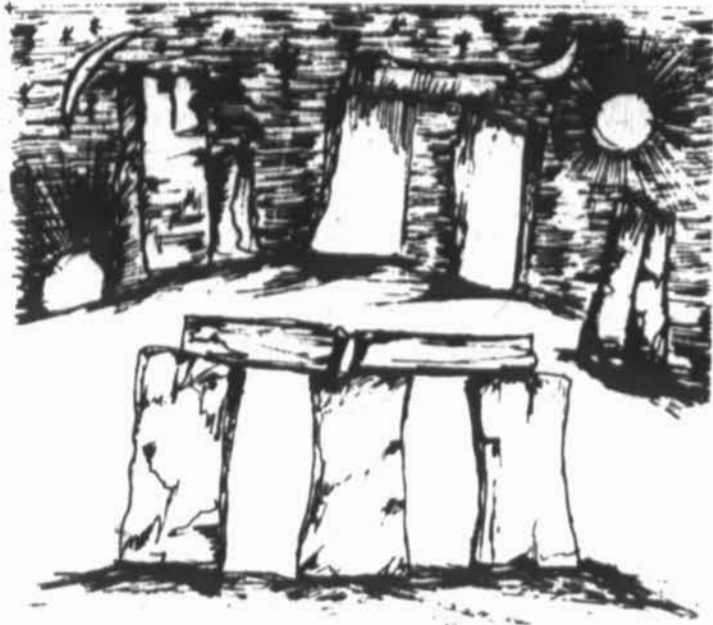

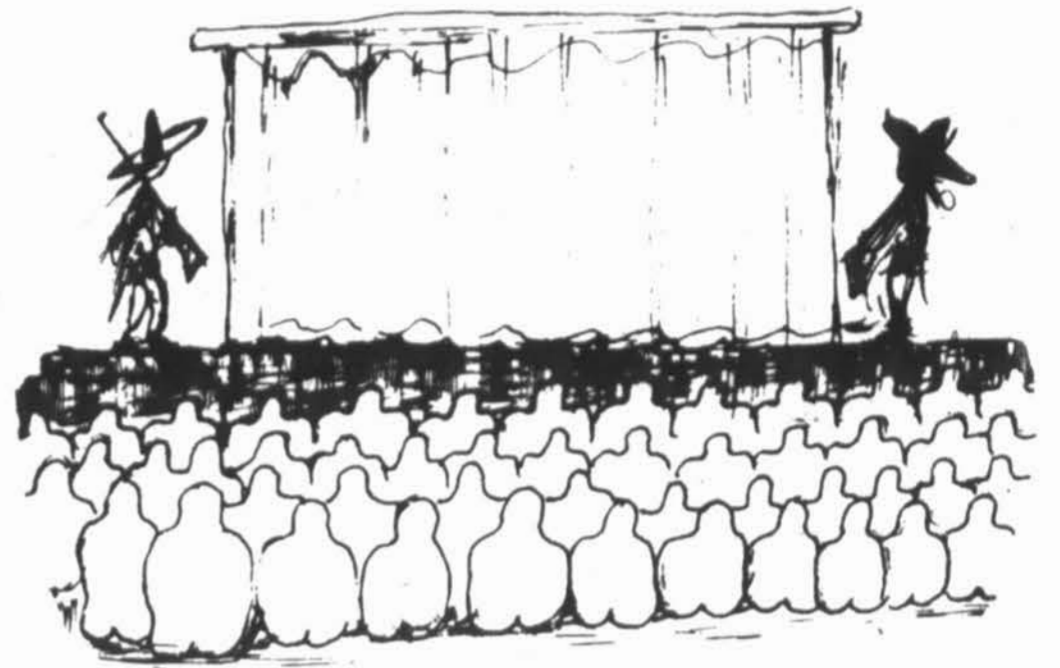
ANCIENT COMPUTER

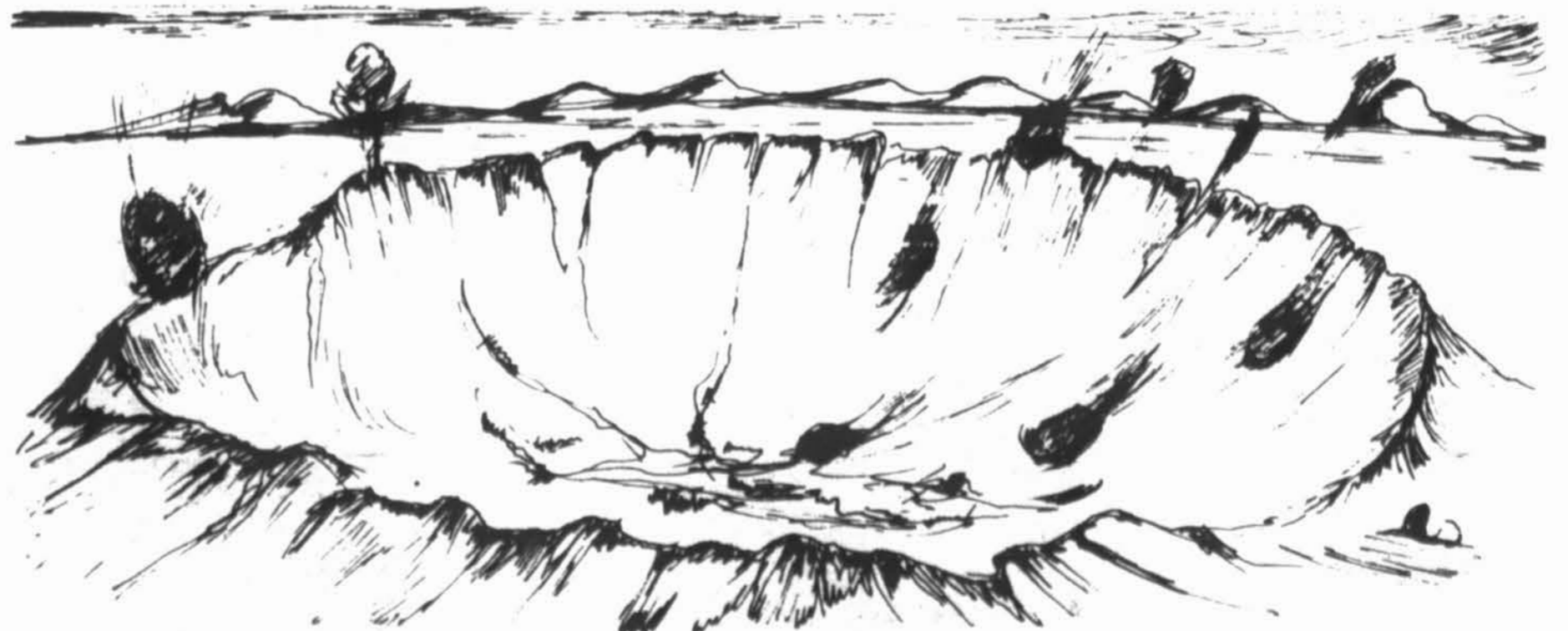

"Why... what do you mean by that?" Townsend sputters. "I mean that there's a flaw in your story that leads me to suspect you of having killed Mr. Phillips!"

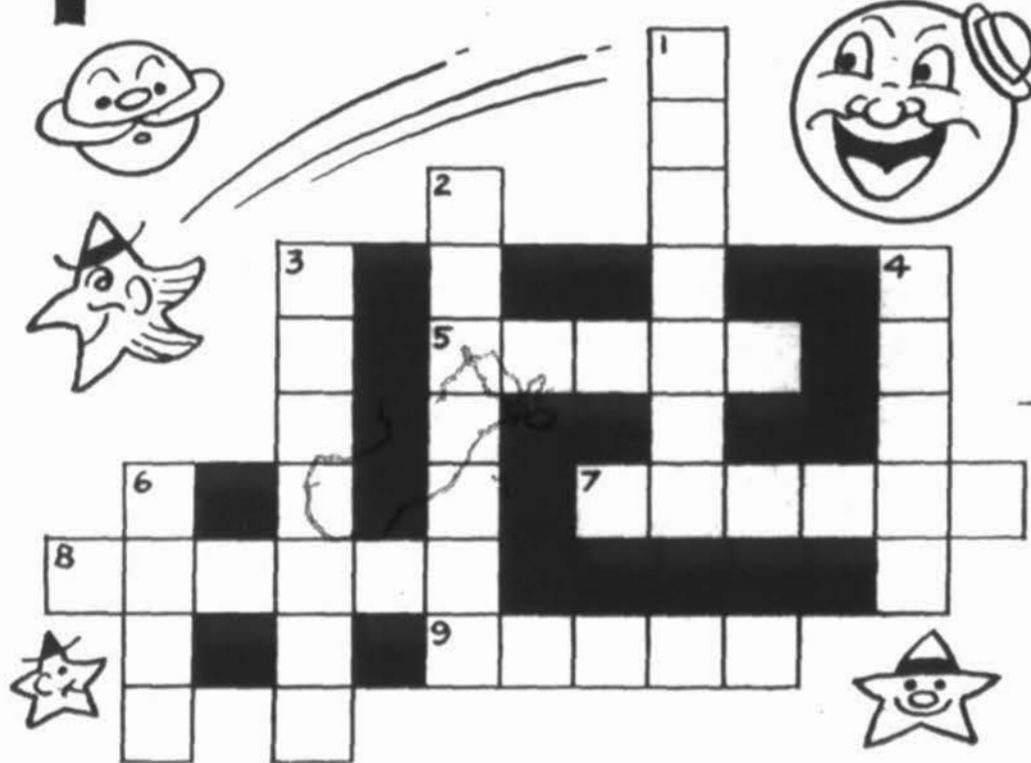
