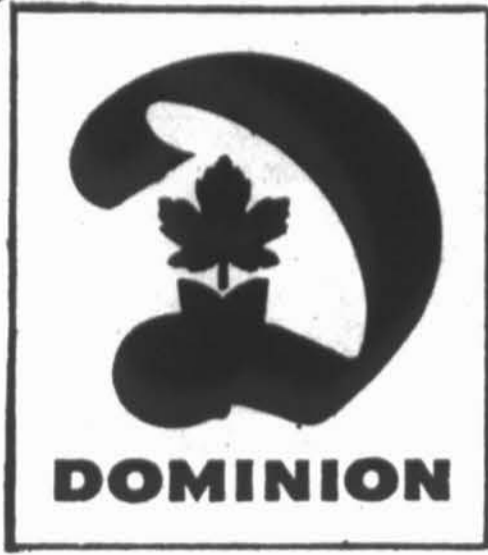

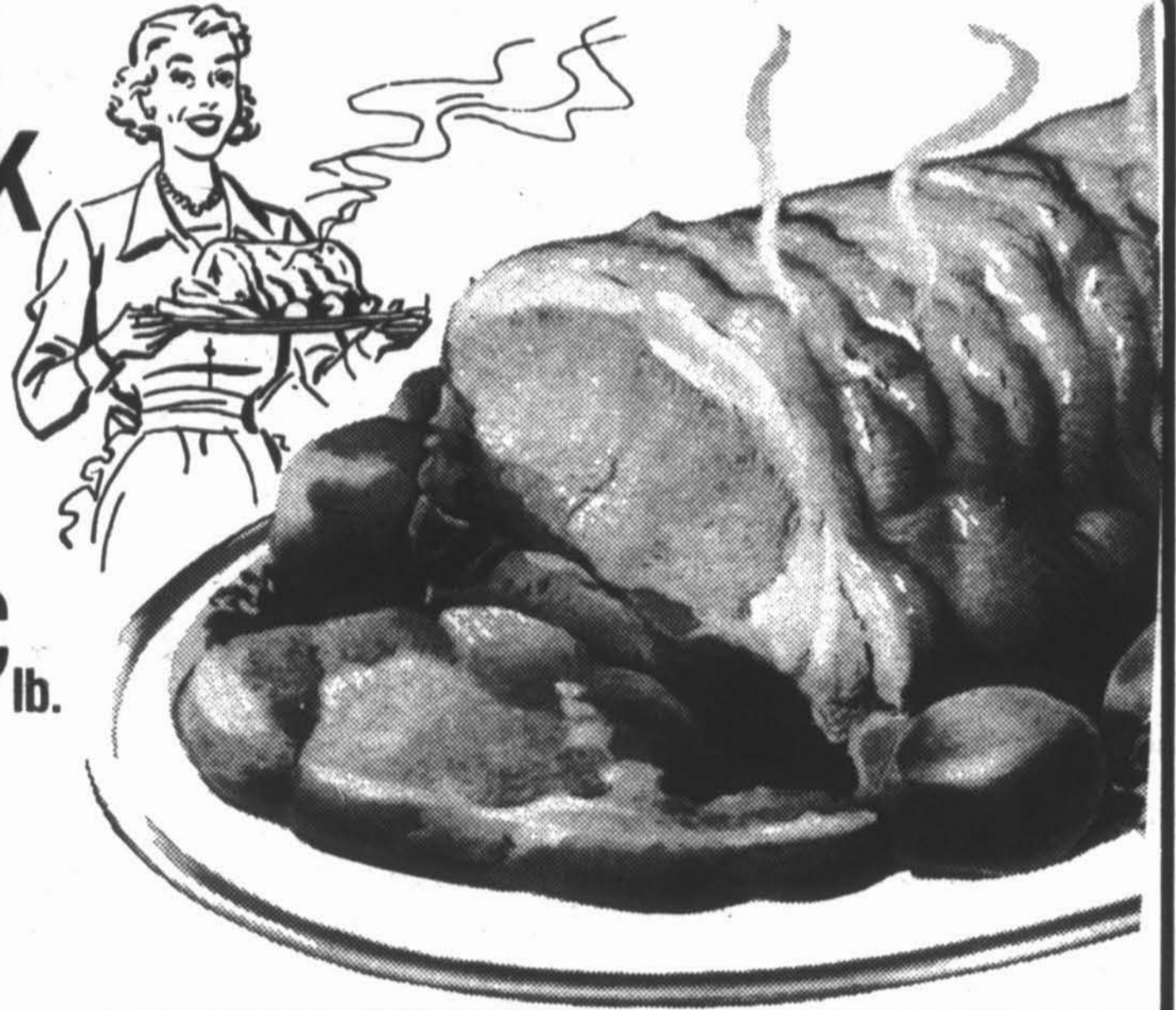

The Carol Players came in for a great deal of criticism with their presentation of Edgar Lee Masters, "Spoon River Anthology" at the Dominion Drama Festival in Winnipeg. The festival adjudicator, Mr. Guy Beaulne, Quebec's director general of theatre and drama conservatories said that the Carol Players presentation "a fascinating medley of ballads, poetry, confessions and meditations...remains at an amateurish level". Mr. Beaulne said he would not comment on the players individually as "it is difficult to appreciate the full quality of their interpretation", in only snatches of characterizations. He praised them for "a great deal of sincerity" in their effort to entertain. Frank Morris, entertainment editor of the Winnipeg Tribune, described Beaulne's adjudication as a "most wantonly cruel summation", and hoped that the Labrador Actors would go back with the feeling that "they brought to Winnipeg something very fragrant and very special, and I'm sure many, many of the audience shared these sentiments."

Tom Burgess, speaking on the Budget debate in the House of Assembly criticized the government for their neglect of Labrador. He said Labrador is a forgotten area where nothing is done to aid the people by the present government. He claimed that the Iron Ore Company and Churchill Falls Power Project would be providing close to 10,000 jobs this year, but added that only 100 of these would be filled by Labrador residents. He pointed out the high cost of

living, and said that it was unbelievable that a gallon of gasoline cost 67 cents and residents were forced to pay an extra forty cents a bottle on liquor, this extra amount claimed to be transportation charges. Mr. Burgess advocated that any highway project in Labrador should connect with the Quebec Highway system. He also wanted to know why the federal Maritime Freight Rates Act did not include Labrador. He informed the House that he had asked the CBC to build a radio station in Labrador West, and that the Goose Bay Station increase its power to cover all coastal areas.

The on again off again, hearing by the Royal Commission on Labour Legislation was held in the Town Hall, Labrador City on Monday. The United Steel Workers of America made a further presentation to their brief which was presented in St. John's last October. Hearings were scheduled twice, earlier this past winter and spring, but were cancelled. Scheduled hearing for Churchill Falls will not now take place, but a new date is expected to be set early next month.

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Editorially speaking

It has come to our attention that the Director of Labrador Affairs for the area is resigning.

There has been considerable discussion by politicians and the public in the past as to the usefulness of this Department, and it seems the general consensus is to abolish it.

With this we cannot agree, we feel that the Department of Labrador Affairs could be beneficial, provided the 'the powers that be' take a good hard look at reorganization.

First of all the two positions of Resident Directors for Labrador should be filled by competition, not political appointments, ability and familiarity with the areas concerned should be the deciding factor.

Secondly, the Resident Director should be a liaison between all departments of the Government and residents. Call the position a co-ordinator if you wish.

How many times do we see provincial civil servants with unlimited expense accounts, visit the area, presumably on business, yet in many cases they are wined and dined and off they go on the plane the following day without as much as moving out of the Hotel?

One glaring example of neglect of duty is health inspection. How many in the food service business would be closed for clean-up if they were inspected? I am sure you will agree that it is not necessary to go as far as the washrooms in some establishments to find reason why health rules should be enforced. This could also apply to washroom facilities in certain clubs in the area. A blind man could see the complete disregard for health regulations. This is only one area where the Department of Labrador Affairs, local Directors would be utilized. Why not have the various Inspectors etc., on their arrival report to the Resident Director and be responsible to him. In this way a certain amount of control would be exercised.

Labrador Affairs could very well be the direct link between us and the Government on the Island, a link that is urgently needed.

We suggest that the Department assess its own value and request the necessary budget to carry out the job.

Here 'n' there

London, England: A young woman who turned into a compulsive talker after an automobile accident was awarded nearly 3,000 pounds, (\$7,800) in damages by the High Court recently. Trudie Mundell, 23, told the court that after the accident two years ago she found it difficult not to "butt in" on other peoples conversations. Mr. Justice Sir Arthur James said that her head injury makes her easily emotionally excited and this shows itself in her compulsive need to chatter. Her husband said: "The only time she ever shuts up is when she is eating."

New York - Roman Catholicism in the United States last year experienced its first decline in membership in this century, a statistical summary showed recently. The new total is 47,872,089 a decrease of 1,149 members from the year before. The decline paralleled similar downturns in several major Protestant denominations. Roman Catholic infant baptisms last year dropped 8,314 to 1,086,848, and the number of converts to Roman Catholicism was the lowest in 24 years, down 10,195 to 92,670.

Belfast, Ireland - A helicopter spotter force may be brought in to help maintain order in Northern Ireland during general election next month. Apprehension rose sharply in Northern Ireland, torn by Catholic Protestant strife during the past 18 months, following the election announcement last week. Top ranking security officers will meet tomorrow to discuss how the potentially explosive situation should be handled. Northern Ireland will return 12 members to the British Parliament in the June 18th election. As an illustration of the potential trouble, one candidate is likely to be Reverend Ian Paisley, the anti-Catholic preacher who already is a member of the Northern Ireland legislature. A Paisley election campaign is unlikely to go on without some kind of provocative incident.

LISBON - A five man commission set up by the government has recommended that breasts, thighs and navels be kept hidden on Portuguese beaches, ruling out bikinis but endorsing modestly - cut two-piece costumes for women. The commission was set up in response to an outcry from travel agents against present stringent laws, dating from 1941, which say both sexes must wear costumes extending from neck to knee so as not to offend public decency.

LOS ANGELES - A 14 year

old boy who was struck on the left temple by a foul ball during a baseball game last Saturday at Dodger Stadium, died last week at the Children's Hospital. Doctors said the youth, Allan Fish, apparently died of head injuries but ordered an autopsy. David Schur, the neighbour, said Allan was struck by a foul ball hit by Dodgers' outfielder Manny Mota during the bottom of the third inning of a game with San Francisco.

COLESHILL, England - Truck driver Tom Bell says he would rather go to jail than send his son to school in short pants. Bell, 33, was fined 8 pounds, (\$20.80) in court last Monday, for failing to get the boy to school for five months. His eight-year-old son Lawrence was sent home in December for wearing blue jeans to class. The school uniform is short pants. "Lawrence will go back to school in big long trousers", Bell vowed. "I realize that I shall probably risk prison now, but that's the price I'm prepared to pay." Trouble began when Lawrence split his short pants. Bell said he could not afford to buy another pair at the time. "Long pants do not affect his education one little bit", Bell stressed. "The headmaster has been very dictatorial". Headmaster Samuel McDlelland threatened to quit if Lawrence is allowed to return to school in jeans. But he offered to have the school buy the boy another pair of short pants. "I have no wish to accept charity", Bell said. "This thing has become a question of principle."

TAMPA, Florida, - The hottest burlesque show ever seen in Tampa took place Tuesday when a \$85,000 fire drove half-dressed strippers from a burlesque house. "I had to run out without my clothes on", said exotic dancer Nala Apollo.

DIXO, California - A nine-year-old girl with a lot of questions have been told by the Nixon Administration to stick to her schoolwork "and let the president take care of decisions on national and international affairs." Pamela Cross wrote a letter to President Nixon as part of a fourth-grade class project designed to get youngsters interested in public issues. "Why are you spending all that money on war and not on schools, papers and books?" she asked. Why did you okay ABM and veto the school Bill? I think you should do something about the pollution. The hospitals need money, too." About eight-weeks later, Pamela received a letter from Washington, D.C. from Thomas Burns, acting associate commissioner for elementary

and secondary education in the department of health, education and welfare. "Dear Pam", wrote Burns, "President Nixon has asked me to reply to your letter of February 25th. Pay attention to your own learning activities, and let the President take care of decisions on national and international affairs. He is equipped to do this. Good luck in your studies."

CULVER CITY, Calif - And 1872 steam locomotive and tender that chugged through such movies as How the West Was Won, Anne Get Your Gun and the Return of Jessie James, sold for \$65,000 at an auction of old MGM picture props. The purchaser was a lawyer who declined to give his name.

OTTAWA - The birth control pill is here to stay in spite of publicity about its dangers, says Dr. Robert B. Greenblatt, inventor of the varieties now in common use. Dr. Greenblatt is so sure that he is pressing ahead with a new pill - a six month variety which a Canadian company now is working on. It involves implantation just under the skin of the abdomen of four tiny pellets of estradiol, a natural female hormone with suppresses ovulation. He told the Ontario Medical Association about the six month pill, another one-month variety undergoing extensive trials in the United States and other developments in birth control measure. Dr. Greenblatt developed the sequential pill which involves a daily dose of estrogen for 21 days followed by five days of a progestestogan pill. A Montreal native teaching now at the Medical College of Georgia, Dr. Greenblatt said all the fuss about the dangers of the pill obscures the facts that the death rate for pregnancies is 228 per 1,000,000 against a death rate for the pill of about 30 per 1,000,000.

OTTAWA - In the first major move to overhaul the Canada Elections Act in ten years, the government last week proposed a bill to lower the voting age to 18 from 21 in federal elections, place candidates party affiliation on ballots, and extend the vote to public servants and their families abroad. Many of the proposals reflect recommendations in March by the Commons privileges and elections committees. Jean Marc Hamel, chief electoral officer, estimated that dropping the voting age to 18 would add about 1,000,000 new voters to the election rolls. In the last federal election, June 25th, 1968, there were 10,880,000 registered voters. The bill also would lower the minimum age for candidates to 18. All election officials except the returning officer could also be 18 but the returning officer would have to be 21.

The student council of Labrador City Collegiate recently adopted a foster child through the International Foster Parents Plan. This is an international organization which has recorded history's of many needy family's in many under developed countries and it relies on voluntary support by people all over the world.

In the past week the student council received a letter from the foster parents plan, international headquarters in New York which gave the history of the adopted child and her picture.

The child's name is Rosario Basco, aged 6 and ½ years old and of Bolivian Nationality. In part the case history reads: Rosario lives with her family in a squalid barrio of La Paz known as Villa Fatima. Employment is low since the barrio is

isolated from any industrial or commercial areas by high, rocky mountain. Father struggles to provide for his family working as a mechanic. When work is steady the most he has ever made was about \$20.80 a month. Mother tries to augment his income selling vegetables. Her pitiful earnings are used to buy the family's food. Both parents are deeply concerned for their children's welfare and future, and have the will to improved the situation. However, this cannot be done without outside help.

Brothers Rodolfo (14) Johnny (5), sister Lucy (12) and our Rosario are attending school. Sister Judith (2) is too young and stays with mother. The children's health appears to be reasonably good, even though their diet hardly varies and much of it lacks nutritive value. Most of their clothing is well worn and inadequate for the

climate since the altitude is well over 12,000 feet high making the nights and some days extremely cold. A plan can help this family in many ways, especially availing to them more nourishing foods and proper clothing. Rosario's home is a shack, her parents own. There are no sanitation facilities or running water supply. Water must be carried from a public outside faucet. Because of their financial difficulties, a part of this shack was rented to another family. Monthly rent is not received but a deposit was given which they must return whenever the family moves. This form of living is known as a contract and done throughout many South American Countries. Their home is furnished simply and electricity was installed. However, many essentials are lacking for a reasonable standard of living. Your interest and concern enables PLAN to provide needed household supplies, in addition to letting them know someone really cares. Rosario is a shy, quiet child. She had an accident several years ago, and several scars still appear on her forehead and on her cheek. Mother

feels that these flaws have embarrassed Rosario and has greatly influenced her personality. In her 4th grade she is a good student and is gradually becoming more outgoing with her classmates. Your "adoption" of Rosario under PLAN provides a monthly cash grant, clothing and other important necessities. Medical care is available for the family along with the guidance of social workers. Your generosity will enrich Rosario's life giving her family added benefits they would not normally have. Not in the least, however, your friendship will have a great effect on her.

Last Wednesday afternoon the LCC had its annual road race for boys. Many of the boys had been in training daily by jogging up and down our long streets. The purpose of the races is to gain House points for your House. Everyone attending the collegiate is in a house. The members of this house work as a team throughout the year in all sports events to strive for the house trophy at the end of each school year. All participants in the race were awarded one

point for their house and the winner Bob Archer was awarded 10 points for his house along with a personal trophy. The racers who was unable to finish were driven back to school by one of the teachers. The runners who had completed the run from the bridge on the Wabush road to the collegiate were greeted by cheers and applause provided by their fellow students. Last period on Wednesday afternoon was free so the students could greet the runners to a warm welcome.

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Comments on the resolutions from the Conservative convention

Some of the resolutions affecting Labrador discussed at the P.C. Convention 16 May 1970.

RESOLUTION ON PROVINCE'S NAME:

Mr. P. Walsh, Labrador Vice-President of the Party moved that the official name of the Province of Newfoundland, thus dropping the present addition of Labrador. The resolution invoked the most

spirited debate of the convention. Many of the speakers, especially those from Labrador South felt the present name should be retained. However the motion carried. Speaking afterwards, on a local radio station, Mr. C. Devine, from M.H.A., Labrador West expressed the view that not only is Labrador separate from the island geographically but in many other respects and cited

postal designations, stating it was advisable to write Labrador on correspondence to insure reasonable service; as an example he mentioned Goose Bay, Labrador, Churchill Falls, Labrador as the normal designations for these areas. He concluded by remarking Labrador should be retained in official Provincial designations.

Following a discussion on Highways for Labrador, Mr. C. Devine remarked that some 7 years ago, he requested of the Smallwood administration that the gasoline tax in Labrador be resinded, at least reduced to a nominal 5c per gallon, until a provincial road system was established. The former M.H.A. stated, the Provincial Government recognizes that no such system exists, thus reduction in cost of driving and vehicle license's, for residents of Labrador.

Although the Resolution supporting a Trans-Labrador Highway and tunnel connection between Labrador & Newfoundland, was passed without discussion, several Labrador delegates from Happy Valley and Churchill Falls felt the resolution was meaningless. Speaking on a St. John's Television Station, Mr. C. Devine expressed the view that while such connections were desirable, it would not be financially feasible under present conditions. He stated there were many other pressing problems crying for solution, and

connections, as in the resolution, should rate low in priorities for Labrador. Mr. Devine continued, that communication deficiencies had already be well catalogued and there would be improvements by the new Progressive Conservative Government of Premier Moores, whom, he concluded was "the only man who could cool the unrest in Labrador West."

PROVINCE'S NAME

WHEREAS the name of the Province was recently changed from Newfoundland to Newfoundland and Labrador;

AND WHEREAS this change had tended to separate the people of Labrador from their fellow Newfoundlanders;

BE IT THEREFORE RESOLVED, that a Progressive Conservative Government would enact legislation to restore the name of the province to its original name, "Newfoundland."

"PREMIER MOORES"

As the announcement of his victory was made, the auditorium blossomed with "Premier Moores" buttons. The 187 delegates who voted against Mr. Moores were as anxious as his most fervent supporters to don the latest public relations stunt of his campaign. As Frank Moores said, the next step for the PC Party is the provincial general election.

National PC leader is Nfld. party head

Frank Moores, 37, the national leader of the Progressive Conservative Party and Commons member for Bonavista-Trinity-Conception, took a landslide win in the election for a leader of the Newfoundland Progressive Conservative Party, during the Leadership Convention held at The Canon Stirling Auditorium in St. John's, May 15 and 16.

Six hundred and twelve delegates cast their votes in the election for a provincial leader and Frank Moores came out with a total of 425 votes. All that was needed to win was 306 votes plus one.

Voting started at 4:35 p.m. and ended at 5:45 p.m. At 6:45 p.m. the official announcement was made.

Frank Moores received 425 votes. Dr. Hubert Kitchen, 91; Walter Carter 50; John A. Carter, 41; Joseph Noel and Hugh Shea each received two votes with Frank Howard-Rose receiving one vote.

The convention hall became a bedlam as Moores' supporters went wild. The new leader and his wife were almost mobbed before they could get to the platform.

On the platform, the winner addressed the convention delegates stating that it was a very momentous occasion for him and that it was just the first stage of things to come.

Mr. Moores said the Progressive Conservatives would adopt a policy suitable to all Newfoundlanders and that the next stage would be the provincial election.

"We must stand as a party, organize it, reactivate those areas that are lagging and cover all of Newfoundland and we must denounce the way of life that has been hurting us for the past 21 years."

"The time has come."

Mr. Moores said that it was the duty of the Progressive Conservative Party to make sure that Newfoundlanders can once again hold up their heads.

He added that Progressive Conservatives must all work together to pull Newfoundland out of the 'mire' that the present administration has brought the province into.

He said that the Progressive Conservatives must now form a government, a democratic government, so that Newfoundland and Newfoundlanders can be proud again.

He repeated that it was a happy moment for him, but that it was just the first stage. The second stage, he said, will be the general election and for stage number three, he said, a good government which will work hard.

He asked every Progressive Conservative candidate at the convention and those listening in on radio and TV to get out and work for the party.

He paid a special thanks to all those who helped in any way in his campaign, giving a tribute to his wife for her patience, thoughtfulness and consideration.

REGIONAL ECONOMIC EXPANSION

AND WHEREAS, Labrador has a great potential for economic development far exceeding the relative potential of the Prairie Provinces when railroads were established in those areas;

BE IT THEREFORE RESOLVED, that a Progressive Conservative Government strongly urge the Federal Government to establish a railway through Labrador to the Gulf of St. Lawrence in order that the people of the Province may enjoy the same benefits obtained by Sister Provinces when they joined Confederation.

Manpower Mobility Program

As our nation's economy changes and expands, Canadian workers are sometimes hurt in the progress. People lose their jobs and despite the talents they may have, are unable to find new job opportunities in their own communities. Besides the personal hardship involved, this is wasteful. The worker's abilities are lost to the economy although industries elsewhere may be hard pressed to find suitable manpower.

If you have been laid off from your last job, unemployed and unable to find employment your local Canada Manpower Centre may be able to help you get a new job in another community - and at the same time help an employer meet his manpower needs. The Canada Manpower Centre does this through the new Manpower Mobility program.

HOW DOES MANPOWER MOBILITY WORK?

The Manpower Mobility Program has been in effect since the beginning of 1966. On April 1, 1967, it was revised to make more help available to more workers. The loan scheme, which formed part of the original program, has been removed. If you are qualified, you can receive an outright grant

to help you resettle in a new community.

You may qualify for assistance if you are 18 years of age or over; if, because of the employment situation in your area, you have little or no prospect of suitable work in your home area; and if you either are unemployed or have received written notice from your employer that you will be laid off at some specific date.

WHAT HELP IS AVAILABLE?

Once you have seen your Canada Manpower Centre Counsellor and your eligibility has been established, you may qualify for any or all of the following grants:

EXPLORATORY GRANT:

This is a new type of grant designed to help you leave home for a short time to look for work elsewhere. You can get a grant to cover the cost of travel to the nearest area where a suitable job is available. Providing an employer wishes to interview you. In your absence, your family would receive dependency allowances for up to four weeks to help meet their living costs.

MOVING AND RESETTLEMENT GRANT

When a Canada Manpower

Centre has located a definite job for you, or when you have found one by your own efforts, you can qualify for grants to cover the cost of moving your household goods and travel costs for you and your family to the new location.

In addition to these moving costs, there is a resettlement grant, designed to help meet your costs in getting re-established. This provides \$100.00 for you, \$100.00 for your dependent, \$200.00 for your second and third dependent and \$100.00 for each additional dependent.

You may qualify for these grants, but the recommendation for assistance MUST come from your Canada Manpower Centre counsellor before you make the move to the new job. Each case is different and must be treated on its merits. Counsellors have complete information on the Manpower Mobility Program and how it can help you.

But remember they can't do a thing until YOU talk to THEM.

Our chef's specialities

BY THE S.W.G. CHEF Cheese of France

Another week has passed and I hope you have found the description and explanations of wines interesting and helpful. Now I will introduce to you a variety of cheeses from France.

CAMAMBERT: The well known soft cheese of Normandy, made from rich cows milk. Originated in the village of Camambert around 1791. Cambert softens on ripening and this should yield to the pressure of the fingers, which is an indication that it is ready for eating.

TOEM OF SAVOIE: With the wines covered with grape skins and seeds from the local wine pressing, and weighing about 4 lbs. each,

it is made in the Hauce Savoie district. The texture is white and buttery, flavour mild.

ERIE: Made in the province of Erie and adjoining districts. Of the same soft texture as Camembert and made from frick cows milk. Averaging 4 to 5 pounds, 15 inches in diameter, but for your convenience Erie is cut into smaller wedge shaped portions of ¼ to ½ pounds boxed.

ST. PAULIE: Made chiefly in the Northeast of France, frock rick cow's milk. A slightly pressed cheese, averaging 4 pounds, thin rind, close buttery consistency, mild flavoured.

PORE DU SALUT: Made from cow's milk, round in shape, weighing

approximately 3¼ lbs. it is similar to St. Paulin, but slightly stronger in flavour. It was originated and still is made, by the Trappist Monks at Entramasse, in the North east of France.

CABRE DE L'EST: A soft cheese from the Champagne and adjacent districts of North East France. Made from pasteurized rich cow's milk, and packed in square boxes. Like Cambert, it softens on ripening. When ripe, of a buttery texture and in mild flavour.

DEMI SLE: Made in Normandy from rich cow's milk, of white soft texture, rindless, and while slightly salted, mild in flavour. Square in shape, foil wrapped. Immediate consumption is desired in order that true delicacy of flavour may be enjoyed to the full.

BRESSE BLEU: A small blue veined cheese, made from rich cow's milk, averaging ½ pound, foil

wrapped soft buttery texture, thin rind, medium flavour.

DEMI SUISSE: Made in Normandy a small very rich cream cheese, freshly made and unsalted, or white creamy consistency. Cylindrical in shape, immediate consumption as Demi-Sol, is desirable. Delicious sprinkled with fine sugar and eaten with digestive biscuits.

RABLOCHON: From the Haute Savoie District, this small flat, thin rind, cheese weighs about ½ lb. each, is made from cow's mild. Of close buttery texture and mild in flavour.

PONT L'EVEQUE: A square cheese in a wood

chip box, named after the small town in Calcados from where it originates. Somewhat close curd, thin rind and flavoured on becoming fully matured.

BLEU DE CAUSSES: A rich blue veined cheese made from rich cow's milk of the Bordeaux District in Gascony. Weighing around 5 pounds each, foil wrapped, matured in local caves in which it develops its characteristic blue mold, of creamy texture, full flavour.

FROMAGE DE CHEVRE: These little cheeses, weighing between 3 and 8 ounces, made from rich goat's milk, are to be had in a variety of shapes, pyramid, long, cylindrical or small round cakes, produced in many regions of France. Thin white or blue mold covered rinds, the curd is close and white, of a mild flavour.

NEUFCHATEL: A soft curd cheese, slightly pressed made from cow's milk, cylindrical in shape and averaging about 3 ounces, it may be eaten when quite fresh or left to ripen when it will acquire a firmer consistency and a fairly pungent flavour.

FROMAGE DE MONSIEUR: Normandy made, with a little added cream, and weighing around 6 ounces, packed in a round wood chip box. When ripe is of a rich buttery consistency, medium flavour.

AURORA, LABRADOR, MAY 27, 1970-17

ROQUEFORT: The blue veined cheese made entirely of rich sheep's milk, it is the oldest blue veined cheese of France. It's production dating back nearly 2,000 years, made in the Aveyron District, South West France, where it is matured in the famous local caves of Roquefort.

Weighing around 4 lbs. foil wrapped, creamy but crumbly in texture, the flavour is delicious but somewhat pungent.

COULOMIER: Originated in the District of Seine et Marne, it is made from rich cow's milk and is round, flat and packed in wood chip boxes. Weighing around 1 lb., it is larger than a Camembert, but smaller than a Brie, ripening in a similar fashion.

PIPO CREM: A rich blue veined cheese, and from rich cow's milk in the Bresso district weighing around 5 lbs., and silver foil wrapped, or creamy texture and full flavoured. In future columns I will be presenting simple menus for the housewife, composed of a variety of items that can be purchased locally, for the family and entertaining of guests.

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Tips for gardening

Although many landscape architects do not recommend the use of shrubs with colored foliage in landscape planting, I feel that there is definitely a place for them. Of course, there is a big difference between planning a garden so that all materials will enhance and complement one another, and planning a garden for the plants and plantings you enjoy.

I do agree, however, that shrubs with distinct foliage colors may be disturbing to the eye of dotted about indiscriminately, and I would suggest that a border or bed be set aside for them in a quiet corner of the garden. Admitted too, they are not plants you would use to enhance the foundation planting, for they serve a better function — the purpose of providing color during dull periods when it may be otherwise lacking.

The first plants to come to mind are the shrubby dogwoods, among which are many with variegated foliage and colorful bark. Best of these are the Spaeth dogwood (*Cornus alba 'Spaethii'*) with yellow and green variegation and the variegated dogwood alba (*'Argenteomarginata'*) which has white leaves marked with a band of green. This is extremely attractive against background material which shows its colors to the best advantage.

The buffaloberry (*Shepherdia argentea*) has silvery foliage and stems which will stand out luminously among other shrubs. In the fall it produces shiny red berries and presents a picture of striking beauty.

The golden privet (*Ligustrum vulgare 'Aureum'*) can be a solid gold mass from spring to summer if you water it well and shade it during winter against the reflected sunshine. If a very severe winter occurs, it might suffer slight tip killing, but will soon revive and grow fast enough to cover its wounds before summer.

It always astonishes me when in early spring I view from a brief distance the golden ninebark (*Physocarpus opulifolius 'Aureus'*). At first it has every appearance of a golden-flowering shrub in all its glory, but upon closer inspection it will be seen that the flower effect is produced by its newborn foliage.

Many people are often disappointed when they buy the golden mockorange (*Philadelphus coronarius 'Aureus'*), for they expect to see it produce yellow flowers. However, the golden foliage, for which it is named, adequately

makes up for any illusions they may have had. It is an outstanding rugged shrub and will withstand full sunshine with no fear of leaf burn. The few creamy-white flowers it produces may not be showy but will make their presence felt by their extremely strong, but pleasant odor. Plant this shrub on its own where you need a good rounded specimen, or use it to bring out the bronze, silvery or red foliage effect of other colored plants.

For a tall shrub or tree, I would not hesitate to recommend the golden poplar (*Populus alba 'Richardii'*). It does not have the stupendous vigor of the common poplars and bears golden leaves which look like those of a small maple, but have woolly surfaces on both sides, although almost

velvety underneath.

The best and most reliable purple-leaved plum is the Cistena plum (*Prunus cistena*) which not only produces deep purple leaves all summer, but in spring will bear white flowers with purple stamens. A similar tree which would be admirably suited for planting near the patio is the purple-leaved chokecherry or the Shubert chokecherry (*Prunus virginiana 'Shubert'*), which has large purple leaves all summer long. This tree will be in every nurseryman's list in a year or so, since it is ruggedly hardy and quite distinct.

It would be difficult to find a faster growing purple-leaved shrub than the Arctic willow (*Salix purpurea 'Gracilis'*). This graceful small shrub makes a good hedge or specimen shrub and may be pruned to any

definite shape when it is quite young.

The elders, which have some good color forms, are brightest in the sun, but will withstand shade. The golden elder (*Sambucus nigra 'Aurea'*) has yellow foliage, and the variegated elder (*Sambucus nigra 'Alba Variegata'*) has white and green leaves of distinctive form. The berries of both shrubs will,

if you can gather enough, make good elderberry wine, since these are forms of the European species. The feathery golden elder (*Sambucus racemosa 'Plumosa Aurea'*) has feathery golden foliage and bright red fruit.

There are many cultivars of *Euonymus fortunei* with colored foliage. Many are vines, others ground covering plants, and some dwarf erect shrubs. 'Emerald n'Gold' is a dwarf erect shrub that in eastern Canada and milder parts of British Columbia will prove quite hardy and make a refined dwarf hedge of gold and green. A new Canadian introduction from Cookville — 'Gold Tip' will be available soon. This splendid cultivar will make a very showy silver and gold ground cover in most southern Ontario gardens. It has not proven hardy at Ottawa but if your garden is located in a milder climate it will be well worth planting.

The royal purple smoke bush (*Continus coggygria 'Royal Purple'*) is perhaps among the best of all shrubs for colored foliage with its beautiful deep purple leaves and reddish plumose flower stems produced in July and lasting well into September. This delightful shrub has no period during summer or fall when it is not attractive.

Lastly, but by no means the least impressive, is a little shrub that blooms almost continuously all summer and yet has distinctive variegated foliage. This is the variegated dwarf weigela (*Weigela florida 'Variegata'*), not a rapidly growing shrub, but one which is bound to please all those who want a plant to place in front of the border.

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Rabbit stew . . .

Or the luring, securing and enduring of wild Rabbits - By Charles Rendell.

The lugging home of one's first wild rabbit is a sort of primeval achievement in the life of an outport lad, a prime satisfaction known only to those who have outwitted one on Nature's wary ones or else have happened upon a sanctuary for paralysed older members of the species. It sparks a catching fire of self assurance, and highstrung individuals are always turned on and sustained by considerable voltage. Take the case of Eleazer for instance, he had just arrived home at late evening with his first catch.

"Mom", he shouts, flinging the furry one nonchalantly upon the kitchen counter.

"Mom, tell the meat man to cut off the 'fresh' right away and not to bring anymore until the snaring season is over."

However such 'rabid' confidence should rather incubate a feverish feeling of inadequacy, feathered and all, if the rabbit's destruction was engineered by his best friend. Such haste to cancel beef requirements for Sunday dinner could well result in a lack of protein over the weekend.

Time was when rabbits were apprehended by a progress known as "slipped up". I say apprehended because this is exactly what it amounted too. The animal was simply brought up by a round turn of twine which went skyward after the manner of the sapling to which it was attached. This "bender" sprang straight after being sprung and dragged the twisting rabbit after it so that it stayed there jiving on its hind legs until the trapper arrived and conducted the final obsequies. Slipping up was a real decent way to describe the action, for you could say that you had slipped up a dozen times in a week without suffering the slightest twinge of conscience. I tried a good many times but never did get a rabbit until a more experienced buddy set a slip for me. Thus my efforts never caused a backdating of the seasons opening nor yet precipitated a closed season in the interest of conservation. Maybe our rabbit population associated my name with preservation as a more illustrious forebear introduced the game animal to this province some ninety years ago and expended great energies toward nurturing their propagation.

And now to describe 'slipping up' in detail for the benefit of all Newfie Baymen who would like to know what they should already: Before beginning, however I

have to admit that I never did see a wild rabbit alive in its natural habitat until two years ago.

Imagine my consternation when a couple of dozen rabbits got to cavorting around us while we were supper picnicing in a well-used provincial park! Somebody said, they were 'in heat'. All very well I answer, but we were all high roasted on the hot August evening. But did we take to chasing one another, hoppity hop all over the green? Not at all! We ate and then lay down in the shades.

We are heading across the open barrens towards a droke of woods armed with twine, a sharp pocket knife and high expectations. We talk cautiously upon entering the wood so as not to walk on any trails. A rabbit will quickly unjog himself backwards upon discovering a strange impression on his run.

Paths of 'hopped down' moss meander here and there so you start scouting for additional signs. I've seen chaps select a spot where not even a trail exists but I feel that if they're passing along these routes then they must be flying. No it's the trails you have to concentrate on, a good trail is one which will have the grasses, leaves and braches of young birch and alder cut off cleanly with a single slip all along the right of way. The rabbit eats some of these shoots and sharpens his incisors on others. A trail currently in use will have bright, clipped ends showing, rather than dull and weathered stained ones. So we look no further, soft moist droppings along the way guarantee our suspicions.

Now to set the slip. We look for some spot where the path funnels between the trunks of two closely set trees. Here is a likely point as the runner will have little lateral movement. We cut down and clear an inch thick branch, or better still, pick up a similar one and fasten its ends to the tree trunks about a foot above ground level. This is the cross bar, now we need a bender. Incidentally this has nothing to do with bottled merriment. Rather we are looking for a stout spruce or fir which must be so positioned that we can bend its top down to the cross bar. The stronger the bender the better, within reason of course, as its job is to lift the rabbit off the ground and so strangle it. We are not attempting to put the rabbit in orbit. Careful now, keep your feet apart and don't step onto the path. Now tie one end of the two foot long twine to the top of the bender and bring its tip down to the cross bar. Hold it there with a slip knot. This is the most ticklish part of the operation as benders have a habit of uprighting themselves with some vigor just when you feel the slip knot is holding.

Once the bender is held we form a slip knot noose at the business end of the line, and circle it between the cross bar and two door boughs. Door boughs are two sprigs of spruce or fir branch so placed as to steer the

rabbit's head into the noose. Now the trap is set. Clear away all foreign objects and see that there's a big enough pot ready when you get home.

Hoping for good luck can be aided and abetted by wishing and charming if you've a mind to. First you can wish for a calm, still, just about freezing night with plenty of stars out. You may also wish that they'll be frolicking with great abandon over the heath because there seem to be nights when they are not; probably because they are resting up after the previous nights activities. Indeed goodlucking is about sure to help; such things as walking backwards six steps from the slip in either direction, i.e. either in the direction from which you approached or from the opposite one where you are not. To tie a half granny knot in a supple new branch of an alder is also good practice especially if the alder is all by itself with no other tree quite near it. Spitting against the wind has been known to help also, but you can leave it out if there isn't any. All this and everything else aside,

my only rabbit came from a trap which was set in its entirety by my good friend, I never did catch one on my own. For sometime afterwards I tried to decide what he had done that I hadn't. Surely goodness there must be something different. It certainly hadn't required any more time as he had situated the run and set the slip in a couple of minutes and I had noticed that he never even bothered to clean up the path afterwards. He hadn't been the least bit subtle about it at all for while warning me where to stand, he himself had trodden the run without the least concern. He never even stopped to fluff up the moss before leaving, which leads me to believe that a rabbit's wibbly wobbly nose is not as sensitive to smell as I've been lead to believe. The noose he left all collapsed so that I remember thinking that the animal would have to stop and deliberately widen it in order to get strangled. And yet on the very next afternoon there was a huge, clever looking rabbit, dead in the slip. But there was one rather important difference, he chose to set in a clearing between trees with no protection thereabouts. Because there was no bender available he cut a tout young birch and rammed it in the moss. When I asked why in the open, he replied, "oh well, they'll be really hopping here, whereas in the woods they are mainly sitting up munching leaves and sizing things up for danger. He must have been right.

Rabbits are food for eating if you can keep your mind off cats and believe me this takes a barnful of negative concentration. For you just must not think of a cat under any circumstances, not even a teeny weeny bit. Not even while skinning off the fur, looking at the whiskers, nor yet while quartering and readying for the pot. And don't think of anything else. While looking at the freshly stewed eyeless head. Indeed you may not even mention milk, or purring or anything else that cats love during the meal-time buntering. Sorry folks, I meant to say bantering.

round-up

The Minister of Labour, the Honourable W.J. Keough, announced recently that the Department of Labour received \$6,813.27 in unpaid wages during the month of April. Under the Minimum Wage Act 16 employers agreed to pay a total of \$4,367.51 to some thirty employees. Two employees received amounts exceeding \$800.00. In addition to the voluntary settlements, one employer was convicted in court and ordered to pay 2 employees a total of \$2,195.41. The magistrate also levied \$300 in fines for breaches of sections 11(1), 13(1) and 19 of the Minimum Wage Act, these sections refer to failure to pay the prescribed minimum wage. Two employers paid a total of \$172.35 to two employees as a result of action taken under the Industrial Standards Act, while another employer paid \$78 to an employee under the provisions of the Workmen's Wages Act.

From the EPA Newsletter passenger traffic statistics show that the number of passengers carried is continuing to show a marked improvement over last year. During March 1970, EPA carried 13,757 passengers, and increase of 5,539 over last year's 8,218, which is a healthy 67.4%

increase. For the first quarter of 1970 the increase was 69.75% over the same period last year. Up to the end of March EAP carried 37,761 passengers for the year.

The provincial government has announced that it intends to raise the minimum wage, from \$1.10 to \$1.25 an hour for men and from 85 cents to \$1 an hour for women. General reaction from all parties in the house seem to be favourable, however Mrs. David Rendall, president of the Association of University Women expressed dismay at the disparity between the minimum wage paid to men and women. Mrs. Rendall claims that it is a violation of the human rights brief which was presented to the Human Rights Commission.

The 52nd Annual Convention of the Newfoundland State Council of the Knights of Columbus took place in Gander from May 22nd to 24th. Publicity Chairman Kevin F. Dormody said the convention would centre around Msgr. E.J. O'Brien P.P. of Northern Bay. Msgr. O'Brien was guest speaker at the State Banquet held last Saturday, he was also presented with a monetary gift by the State. All thirteen councils in Newfoundland held an

"O'Brien" Night" and made a contribution for this purpose. The presentation was in recognition of his many years of faithful service to the Knights of Columbus in the Province. This year marks Msgr. O'Brien's Diamond Jubilee as a priest and he plans to retire to Carbonear later this year. He is 85 years old. O'Brien Hall, home of the Knights of Columbus in Labrador City is named in honour of the Msgr.

While some people in the Corner Brook area may find joy in shooting moose out of season, there are others, according to the RCMP detachment who get a kick out of stealing horses. Monday night a Lark Harbour resident had two of his horses stolen. However, they came back the next morning. The same thing happened again Tuesday night, but this time they didn't turn up. The RCMP said this has been going on for quite some time and it appears that residents of Curling who visit Lark Harbour at night have no transportation back so they do the next best thing, take a horse to their destination then let it go hoping that it will find its way home. A complete investigation is now underway by the police and it's expected that charges will be laid.

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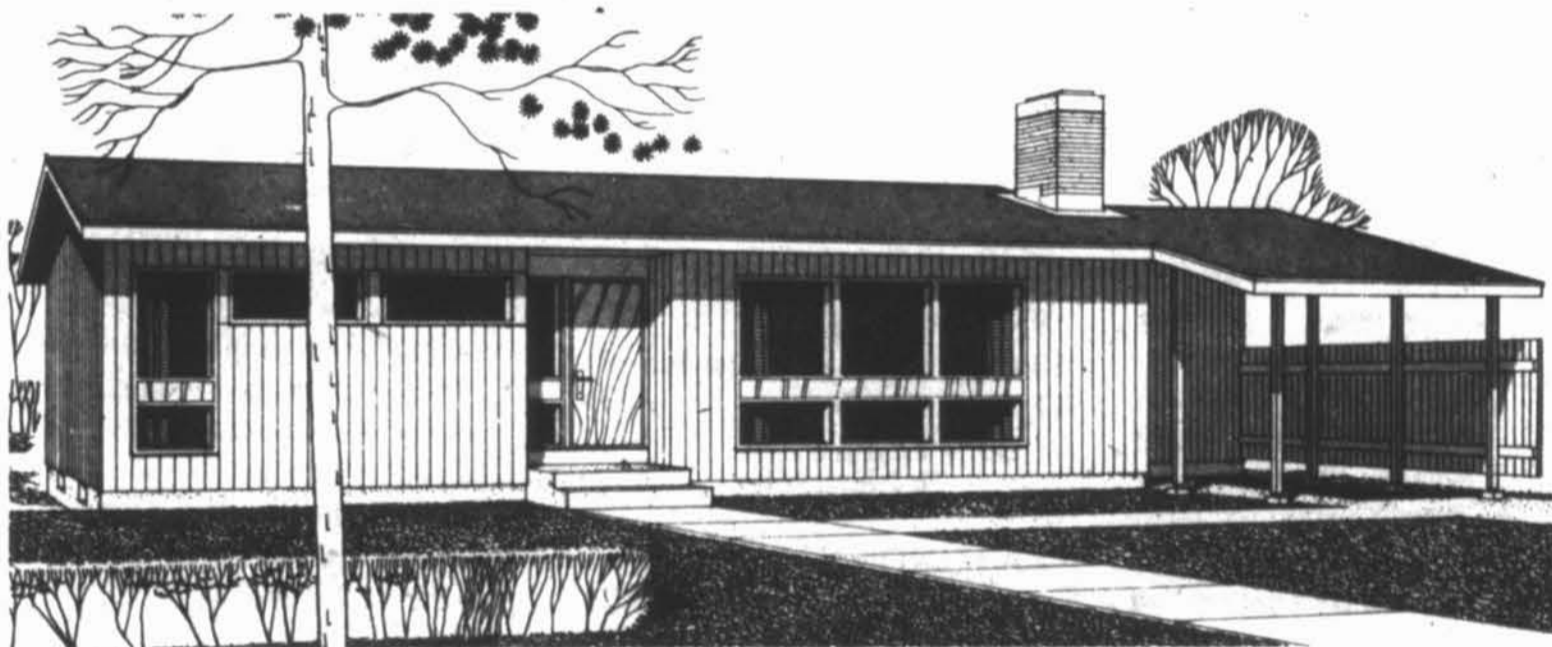

What's new in home designs?



NEW HOUSE DESIGN — This 3-bedroom bungalow, designed by Central Mortgage and Housing Corporation, provides a clear and insulated division between the living and sleeping areas. The rooms are well defined, giving a sense of spaciousness.

Kitchen, dining and living rooms are open to one another for ease of movement and furniture arrangement. An open hearth enhances the living room. Laundry and heating are grouped at the foot of the basement stairs, leaving the remaining space to be partitioned as desired. A useful storage area for outdoor equipment forms part of the carport.

The floor area is 1,072 square feet; the exterior dimensions are 53 feet eleven inches by 32 feet five inches. Working drawings of this house, known as Design 232, are available from Central Mortgage and Housing Corporation at minimum cost.

A variation of this plan, Design 231, is also available. The two are identical except for window arrangement and external finish. In Design 231 there is no carport thus giving external dimensions of 41 feet eight inches by 24 feet four inches.

VICTORIA, B.C. — The British Columbia Attorney-General's Department is to contact Quebec Justice officials to urge them to reconsider their decision to award no compensation to a BC civil servant who was beaten by police in Quebec City on February 1. Attorney General Leslie Petterson said recently he has instructed his department to appeal the Quebec Justice department's decision on behalf of Walter Redel, B.C. lands director. He suffered facial injuries requiring an operation when he was mistaken for a bank-holdup by two plainclothes Quebec Provincial Police Officers. Mr. Redel said his Quebec lawyer is prepared to proceed with a suit against the QPP.

OTTAWA — Budgie birds needing vacation shelter and poodles to be minded during shopping excursions are among the clients eligible for service from Sitters Unlimited. The agency founded in 1949 by Margaret Ormsby, takes on just

about anything that needs looking after. Besides looking after children and pets, it will provide sitter companions for the elderly, housekeepers by day or week to care for a home when the family is out of town, and practical nursing attendants for hospitals and nursing homes. Some are hired to guard wedding gifts and pick up mail. Children of course, have top priority, and women who work for the agency — no teenagers are hired — must pledge to be awake, alert and watchful, until the parents return and must know where to get in touch with them, as well as the doctor, police, fire department and poison control centre. On duty they wear a blue smock, refrain from smoking and supply their own tea or coffee. Business was conducted at Mrs. Ormsby's home for the first 10 years, and at one time she had five women working for her in shifts. Now the agency has about 200 sitters on call and handles about 100 requests a day. "The sitters themselves are the backbone of the agency and it is a battle to keep the calibre high," she says.

ATTRACTIVE KNOBS

You can add a handwrought appearance to plain wooden drawer or cabinet knobs by denting the knob faces with a ball-peen hammer. This can best be accomplished first by drilling a hole in a block of wood to accommodate the shank of the knob, and then tapping the face of the knob lightly with the ball part of your hammer to dent the wood fibers. 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Scanning the market

As the market continues to plummet into the six hundreds, fewer and fewer voices are heard "a turnaround will commence soon." However, more and more we hear "are we on the road to financial collapse and a depression?" As recently as April I would have said the latter is impossible; but not so today. The troubles of the giant Investment-Overseas-Services and "King" Barney Cornfeld plus a big sell-off in Japan were not even faintly envisaged just weeks ago. U.S. Banks are now quite worried that their liquid cash position may not be strong enough to withstand a "heavy run" by depositors. World-wide business failures are on the increase and instead of the usual pick-up in spring employment, the picture has been stagnant and in certain areas, has even increased. Thousands of graduating students are finding it extremely difficult to obtain satisfactory positions. Early retirement is being encouraged.

In the market itself losses have covered all sectors and not even the "blue-chips" have been spared; with shares of many of the old

established corporations selling at prices comparable to the 1950's. In summation the market, has reached a point, at present, where investment can only be recommended for the "strong of heart and cash."

This week rather than comment further on the current market we will continue with our investment terms and definitions:

Q: What does the stock broker do?

A: The stock broker, as such, usually has nothing to do with the creation and distribution of NEW issues of investment securities. Rather, he is mainly concerned with securities, mostly stocks, which have been previously distributed and which investors may want to buy or sell. The broker, then, acts as a middleman or agent who brings together the buyer and seller of existing shares and receives a commission for his services. The market place for trading in such shares is usually a stock exchange, whose membership is composed of brokers. The investment dealer, on the other hand, operates independently and has no such central meeting place for the conduct of his business. Instead, a complex telephone and teletype network linking hundreds of investment offices across Canada and abroad serves as a dealer's "market place."

Q: How does the investment dealer handle buying and selling orders for outstanding stocks listed on an exchange?

A: Most investment firms operate an affiliated brokerage firm or have some working arrangement with an independent broker to handle their stocks.

Q: In what respect do the functions of the investment dealer and the stock broker overlap?

A: Sometimes the stock broker is called upon by the investment dealer to assist in the initial distribution of new security issues, particularly stocks which are to be subsequently listed for trading on a stock exchange. The reason for doing so is to obtain broader public distribution of the shares and to create wider interest in the security when it is later traded on the exchange.

In Canada, bonds are not listed for trading on a central exchange. Consequently, one of the functions of the investment dealer is to maintain a market for the convenience of investors who wish to buy and sell outstanding bonds. Hence, he brings the buyer and seller together and may either charge a commission for his services like the stock broker, or, as is the more common practice in his business, purchase for his own account and then resell the bonds at a profit, in much the same way as any merchandiser of goods. In the latter instance, the investment dealer at some stage of the transaction owns title to the securities and may carry them in inventory for some time before the process is completed.

Mining briefs

STEEL PRODUCTION UP: Steel production was up in March to 1,075,335 tons from 1,022,559 tons in March, 1969, the Dominion Bureau of Statistics reports. Canadian pig iron Production climbed to 815,601 tons from 768,830 in March last year.

NO "SPECIAL AID" FOR MINING INDUSTRY: The federal government recently announced that 22 "special areas" will be designated under the regional disparity program for special aid, including incentives for primary industry. Under the federal Incentives Act, mining and oil refining projects are not eligible for assistance.

In some of the 22 new areas, special incentives will be provided for primary and services industries. But the government has not yet indicated any relaxation of its ban on mining and extractive industries.
