SCULLY MINE FIRE - February 7th, 1966

An investigation is presently being conducted on the fire in the Scully Mine mill building at Wabush Monday, February 7th, 1966 at approximately 4:30 pm. The following information is available at this time; the plant will be out of operation for an indefinite period however it is hoped to be in partial production in a few months. We were fortunate in that there were no personal injuries.

There is no lay-off planned for personnel at Scully Mine, personnel will be utilized in clean-up and in re-construction.

The excellent work of the Labrador City Fire Brigade and Wabush Fire Brigade assisted by others confined the fire to the spiral concentrating area and to the mill roof.

COMMISSION ON TRANSPORTATION

The Commission on Transportation arrived in Labrador City on Wednesday, February 2nd to hear briefs presented by groups in the area. Since this Commission is also concerned with communication, it was thought that there would be a sizeable turnout for the hearing. However, due to LACK of adequate communication on the short notice given by the Commission, only a handful of inadequately prepared people appeared before the hearing. We applaud those who took part for their attempt to discuss a major area problem as best they could under the circumstances and hope that other groups in the Town will get a better chance to speak before Government representatives before final decisions are reached on the subjects, all important to this area, of transportation and communication.

The Commission was under the chairmanship of the Honourable P. J. Lewis.

Mr. David Bowring, Manager of Bowring Brothers Ltd. presented a report on behalf of the Carol Merchants Association of Labrador City. The merchants are mainly concerned with obtaining better rail service from Ross Bay Junction to Labrador City for their goods, especially perishable items. They feel that they would rather pay a small additional charge and obtain better service than the system which is presently in use.

Mr. Paul Penney spoke on the radio and television situation in the Town and the Commission stated that there was a possibility of a private station being constructed here.

REPORT FROM THE PROVINCIAL CAPITAL

A continuation of a speech given by Mr. Charles S. Devine, M.H.A. (Independent-Labrador West) on Thursday 20 January 1966.

Newfoundland's minimum wage law allows 50¢ an hour for women and 70¢ for men; he termed this unrealistic in view of the present cost of living and called for an immediate increase to AT LEAST 70 cents an hour for women and 90 cents an hour for men. Noting that the Federal Government recently raised to 1.25 the minimum wage in the National Civil Service. "An overall general wage increase is badly needed in Newfoundland and Labrador or our trained people will be lost" he warned. "Are there any statistics available as to the number of our technical and college graduates who have left the Province in the past year?"

The Independent Member, a long-time critic of Eastern Provincial Airways, says the service has improved in the past year but still leaves much to be desired. "Passenger fares, in spite of the promise of reduced rates, remain outrageously high", he said and called for Federal or Provincial subsidized fares and cut rates for students and families.

In conclusion Mr. Devine referred to the Russian system to encourage people to go north; the incentive was simple "they pay them more", wages averaging 80% more, than people with similar occupations working in Moscow. There is also a tax rebate and bonus policy. He noted the cost of living for northerners is equalized by subsidized housing, heating, food, and transportation. Adding that if Canada is to develop its North to the extent the Russians have, an equalization policy will have to be implemented by the Federal Government.

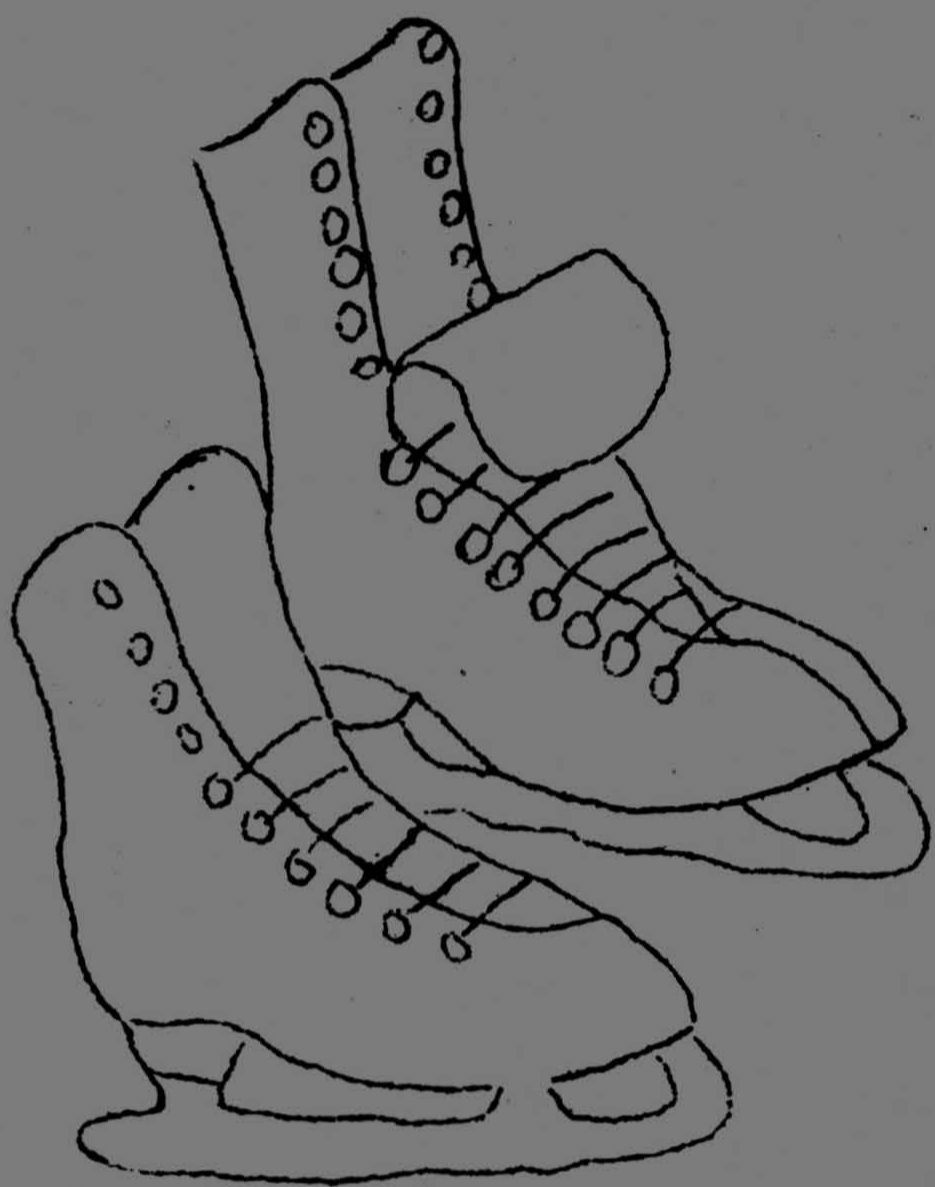
