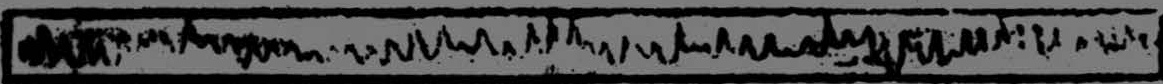

## COME HOME YEAR - 1966

Now that most local vehicles have been licensed for 1966 it must be apparent to all residents of the Labrador City area - if in fact there were some who were not aware of it before the 1966 license plates were issued - that the year 1966 has been designated as Come Home Year in the Province of Newfoundland and Labrador.

It has been said - and it is possibly nearer the truth than most people believe - that there are more Newfoundlanders living in Boston than there are Newfoundlanders living in the Province itself. And the same could be said for Toronto and other areas on the "Mainland", including the Maritimes. This, then, is the main reason for 1966 being declared as "Come Home Year" in Newfoundland and Labrador.

But, one might ask, what does Come Home Year have to do with us here in Labrador? We are home - this is Labrador City and Labrador City is in Labrador and Labrador is part - (and an important part to say the least) - of Newfoundland. Only last year the official name of the Province was changed by the Provincial Legislature to include Labrador, hence, the reference in the first paragraph of this article to the Province of Newfoundland and Labrador.

Generally speaking, home to a Newfoundlander is where he or she was born. There are people living in Toronto or Halifax or Montreal or Boston or New York or a lot of other places in North America (and outside it) who were born in Newfoundland and moved - some, five years ago, some ten, some twenty, some fifty and some sixty five or more years ago, and have "settled" in these other places and lived there and worked there and raised their families there, and some even who have second and third generations living there - but to all these people "home" is still Newfoundland. Some have been "going home" for years; others have been planning to "go home next year" for years, but due to circumstances - financial and otherwise - have had to "put it off".

This, then, is one of the reasons why this is Come Home Year in Newfoundland. By radio, by television, by newspaper, by magazine, by every form of advertising and publicity, Newfoundlanders everywhere are being advised - or reminded - that this is the year to "Come Home".

As noted earlier, home to a Newfoundlander is where he or she was born. Therefore "Come Home Year" does not apply only to those who have left the Province and have gone "up-a-long" to the "Mainland" or the "States". It is also meant for those Newfoundlanders who have moved to other parts of the Province away from their birthplace. This is where "Come Home Year" applies to us here in Labrador City. Except for young children who were born here over the last five or six years (and there were many), this is not home in the sense referred to in this article. Sure, this is home now, but "home" - our real "home"

is still that place we talk about frequently when we say "we must go home next year". Then we are talking about Bonavista, or Corner Brook, or Stephenville Crossing, or Trinity, or Cuslett, or Barneed, or St. John's, or Marystown, or Bell Island, or Lawn, or Tickle Harbour, or Joe Batts Arm or any of the other thousands of towns, settlements, or "outports" where we were "born and bred". This is the other reason for "Come Home Year 1966". It is to get these people also, these people who have moved - within the Province - to come "home" in 1966.

In this article we have tried to explain the "why" of Come Home Year in Newfoundland and Labrador. In future articles, as space permits in this weekly news, we shall try and set out the "how and wherefore" of "Come Home Year 1966". We shall try and set out what is planned and what to expect. But before closing this already over-long article, we would like to stress one of the things that Come Home Year does not mean.

To stress this, we quote from an article in the November, 1965 issue of the 1966 Come Home Year Newsletter which is the official publication of the Provincial Come Home Year Committee. The article read as follows, quote:

NO REDUCTION OF FARES

It has been brought to our attention on many occasions that people are expecting a reduction in the price of fares, gasoline, accommodation, etc., for Come Home Year. Such rumors are false and misleading. We wish to make it very clear that the Government of Newfoundland and Labrador will not be subsidizing any such expense during the Come Home Year.

Unquote.

This is self explanatory and means exactly what it says. It must be clearly understood that there is no - and we emphasize, no, - subsidization of any items whatsoever by the Provincial Government, regardless whether the car you are driving has Newfoundland license plates, or Quebec or Ontario or other Canadian or U. S. license plates.

Of course this does not interfere with any special, family or excursion rates that any transportation company or hotel or motel operator might be offering. These would still be applicable, as would any special charter rates or group rates that any airline or other transportation company might offer on request of any group. But this is an item that could be dealt with in future articles.

During this Month, the various Local Branches of the Canadian Red Cross Society appeal to the General Public for funds to meet the cost of providing Red Cross Services. Donations are transferred to each Province's Divisional Headquarters from where they are distributed as needed throughout the Province.

Briefly, the purpose of the Red Cross Society in time of Peace is to "Carry on and assist in work for the Improvement of Health, the Prevention of Disease, and the Mitigation of Suffering throughout the World". This work is organized and maintained on the International, National, Provincial, and Community levels. Red Cross has been organized in both Labrador City and Wabush. The Campaign Chairmen of both Communities have designated Tuesday, March 1st as the date of our Local Campaign for funds. 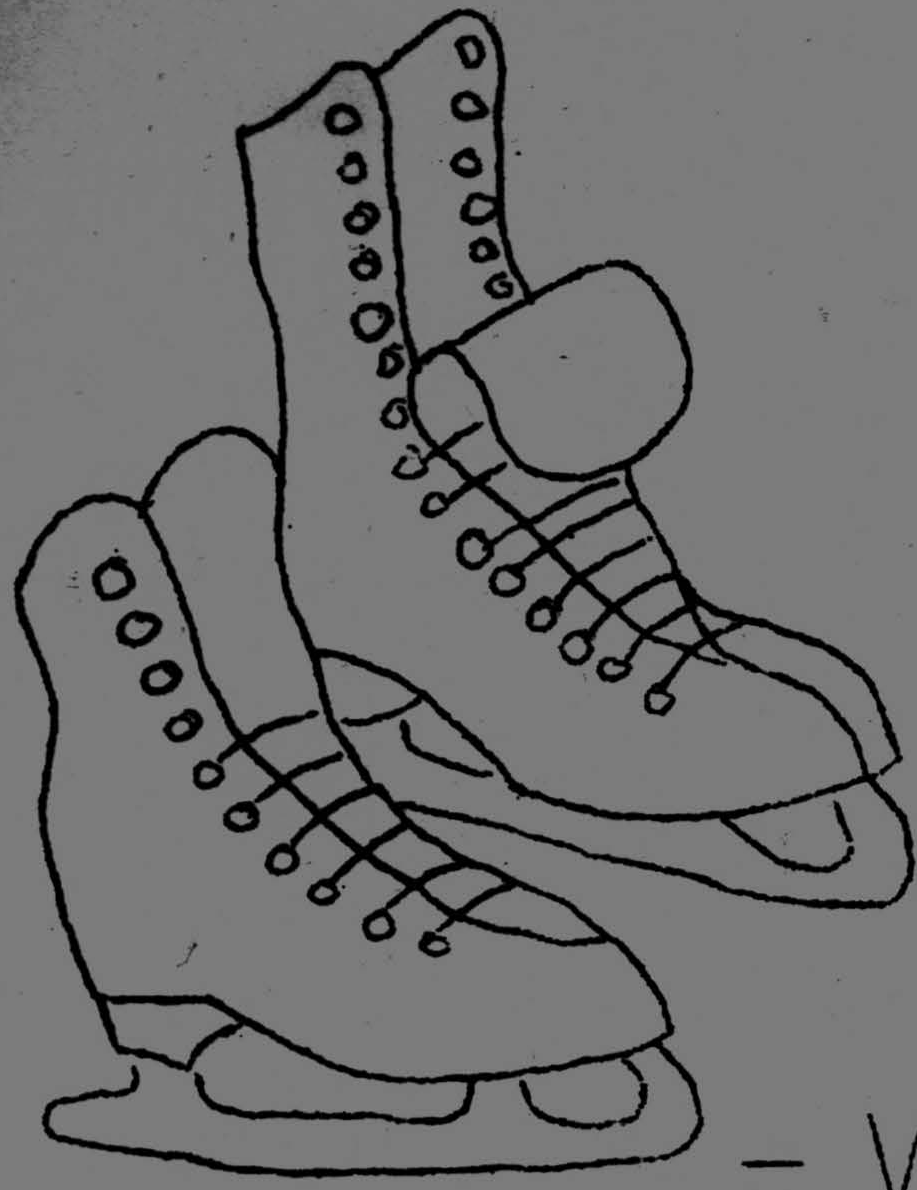
