MANY THANKS TO PASTOR HARTWELL FOR THIS WEEK'S EDITORIAL

It is a great privilege to present this brief History of the Pentecostal Assemblies of Newfoundland in this guest editorial at the invitation of the Editor.

On Easter Sunday, 1911, the first Pentecostal Assembly in Newfoundland was opened on New Gower Street, St. John's. Miss Alice B. Garrigus from Hartford, Conn., was the person responsible, who also was the pioneer of the work in the Province, in response to the call of God to take the message to Newfoundland.

During the Fall of 1925, with Robert C. English as President and General Overseer, the Pentecostal Assemblies of Newfoundland was registered as a movement. In 1927, Eugene Vaters took over this position and continued there-in for 35 years, the present General Superintendent being Pastor A.S. Burse.

The summer of 1932 saw the first Pentecostal ministers visit Labrador. In the Winter of 1931 Pastor William Gillett, assisted by others, built a boat, "The Gospel Messenger", to be used in the spread of the Gospel on the Labrador Coast.

The growth of the movement has been phenomenal. Today there are 126 Assemblies in Newfoundland and Labrador. Our day schools number 57, employing 182 teachers, with a pupil enrolment of 4,700. An annual old fashioned Camp meeting is held at Camp Emmanuel, Long Pond, Near St. John's and in the near future, a Senior Citizens Home to care for the aged will be erected in the beautiful town of Clarke's Beach,

In Labrador, there are six assemblies, the last to be established being the one here in Labrador City. The first Services were conducted in a hut on the Old Camp Site in 1960 by D.R. Parsons, a Pastor was appointed in 1961, Pastor E.G. King. Various places were used for Services until 1963, when the present Church on Hudson Drive was opened and dedicated. Most of this data has been compiled from the Come Home Brochure issued by the head office in St. John's; Newfoundland.

FAREWELL TO COLONEL HANNAH JANES

Just over a year ago Colonel Janes came to Labrador City from St. John's to open and administrate the new Captain William Jackman Memorial Hospital. To begin at the grass roots, to organize such a complex operation as a hospital and to staff and oversee the various departments is a very demanding task, but for this, she, more than any other, was uniquely qualified.

Colonel Janes has given forty-two years in active service with the Salvation Army, with a number of these as the Administrator of other hospitals, and before her official retirement was the Women Social Secretary for all Canada. In this capacity she was responsible for the oversight of all Salvation Army Hospitals, Unmarried Mothers Homes and Homes for the Aged - forty-three Institutions in all with over 3,500 officers and other personell answering to her.

A short time after her retirement at the end of her career, she once more responded to the call of need for her services and left the comforts of her home in St. John's and a well deserved rest, to come to Labrador City to assume once again the responsibilities of a demanding life. She had only one purpose - to be of service and make a contribution.

In the space of a year Colonel Janes has become a well-known figure in Labrador City. She often could be found on the job at any hour - and always when the need of the moment demanded her presence and aid.

All who have known her, worked with her, and the many who met her through her ministry in the hospital want to voice their gratitude and thanks before she leaves us on thursday August 25th, to enjoy a well earned rest.

To you, Colonel Janes, we say "THANKYOU FOR A JOB WELL DONE AND GOD GO WITH YOU."

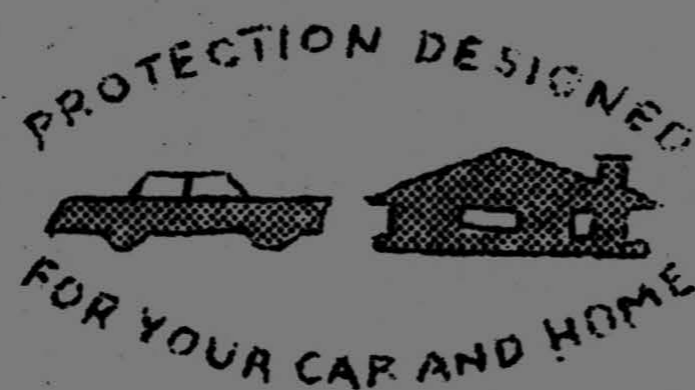

PUBLIC EXAMINATIONS - 1966

RELEASE

The Honourable Minister of Education wishes to inform the public that the results of this year's Grade IX and Grade X Public Examinations will be released today, Friday, August 12th, to the individual schools attended by the students. All students should obtain their results from the schools they attended.

Because of pressure of work involved with Scholarships and Bursaries, it will not be possible to obtain any Grade IX or Grade X results direct from the Department of Education during the next two weeks. As already stated these will have to be obtained from the students own school.

The Grade XI results are in the process of completion and the Department is hoping to be able to release them to the public on Wednesday, August 17th. As soon as the Grade XI results are ready a further statement will be issued. The Department of Education has done its utmost to make all examination results available at the earliest possible date.

The overall result of the Grade IX and Grade X examinations is as follows:

INFLATION IS A SERIOUS PROBLEM:

Economic opinion in Canada seems to be that we will be fortunate to keep the RISE IN THE PRICE LEVEL FOR 1966 as a whole BELOW 4%. This compares with 3% last year, and according to A.T.Lambert, Chairman and President of the Toronto-Dominion Bank, the ADVERSE EFFECT ON SAVINGS IS CAUSE FOR CONCERN.

Will a person who purchased a \$1,000 Canada Savings Bond last year really make \$45 interest (4.5% the first two years .. an average of 5.03% if held to maturity) on his money? An editorial in the Edmonton Journal (October 1965) points out that inflation alone will mean the bondholder will be swindled (sic) out of at least \$30 of the value of his bond ... and he must pay income tax on the full \$45....which means that HE WILL BE LUCKY TO NET 1/2 of 1%. HE MIGHT WELL LOSE: the real value of his bond plus one year's interest could be less than the amount invested after taking into account his LOSS THROUGH INFLATION.


