WE HAVE BEEN ABLE TO WITNESS PART OF THE CAREER OF, A BRILLIANT SOLDIER, STATESMAN AND ABOVE ALL, A DEDICATED CANADIAN. HE FILLED OUR NATIONS HIGHEST POSITION IN A WAY THAT WILL BE REMEMBERED BY GENERATIONS OF CANADIANS TO COME. TRULY, WE HAVE WITNESSED THE PASSING OF ONE OF THE GREAT MEN IN OUR HISTORY. DANCERS AND AUDIENCE

ENJOY SHOWS

Aside from the winning of the Grey Cup, Regina had its most fun in a long time Saturday, when Les Feux-Follets played two jam-packed performances at Darke Hall.

And the internationally renowned, Montreal folk dance troupe had almost as good a time as the audience.

For brilliant color and skilled dancing, the two-hour show was entertainment hard to beat anywhere.

The repertoire ranged from Indian religious dances to rock n'roll. Director Michel Cartier does all his own research. All costumes are authentic for period style.

The show opened with a Plains Indian betrothal ceremony.

A brave inherits the powers of a giant eagle after he kills the bird. He defeats a rival for a maiden's hand and betrothal ceremonies follow, to be disrupted by the coming settlers.

For sheer dazzling colors, the Indians' costumes were tops. Some wore feathers of brilliant reds, oranges and blues. Others dressed in long, flowing buckskins.

The segment dealing with the settling of the West was probably the audience's favorite--it received the loudest applause. After the settlers made camp for the night they square danced to the beat of a home-made band--blowing over the mouth of a bottle, scratching a wash board and banging of pots and pans.

The only weakness in the entire program, however, was in the costuming of the western number. No self-respecting cowboy would be caught in such dress. The costumes were right out of a Roy Rogers' movie.

But the number was the best received. The audience was obviously thrilled. For all the hundreds of times Les Feux-Follets must have performed it, it still remained fresh and spontaneous.

A Klondike gold rush sequence showed a Buster Keaton - type prospector panning for and finally striking gold. He was immediately pounced on by a string of dance hall girls.

The scene meshed into a 1920s routine complete with scarlet-dressed flappers; into a 1940s number with girls in shaggy dog sweaters jiving with zoot-suited partners; and finally into a contemporary routine complete with the appropriate coffee house patrons.

And the little old prospector lost his steam as the dancing picked up speed.

In a segment portraying the New Canadians, the most delightful probably was a Dutch number in which the performers did a fast-moving dance in wooden clogs.

O A West Coast Indian dance performed during the salmon spawning season also provided bright costumes and masks--in particular a sun god and a giant, luminous frog.

N This segment was the most serious of the performance -- being in essence a religious dance in which the chief's son is inducted into a secret society. The son defends the tribe against evil spirits and a dance of celebration follows.

L The Scots in the audience were given a stirring number in which kilted dancers marched on stage in a torch parade, went through several flings and climaxed the number by dancing in a giant circle wrapping themselves in a ribbon of various plaids.

D In an Eskimo hunting segment, an audible "Oh" came from the audience when the hunter slew a walrus.

C The funniest number was clearly a Laurentian hunting scene in which the dim-witted rifleman almost eliminates himself and comes close to blowing the head off a drummer in the red-shirted orchestra, before he finally brings down his caribou.

R However, all ends well. The caribou is skinned and prepared for stewing. But all, including the caribou join in a rejoicing dance with the womenfolk around the cauldron.

T The final segment -- Kebec, Evening on the Shores of the St. Lawrence -- was a close second for the favorite of the evening. There was rousing applause for a peasant dance number as performers swirled about in bright costumes.

M The number climaxed as the dancers came crashing to the front of the stage in a foot-stomping run, and shouted: "...and so we hope you liked our show."

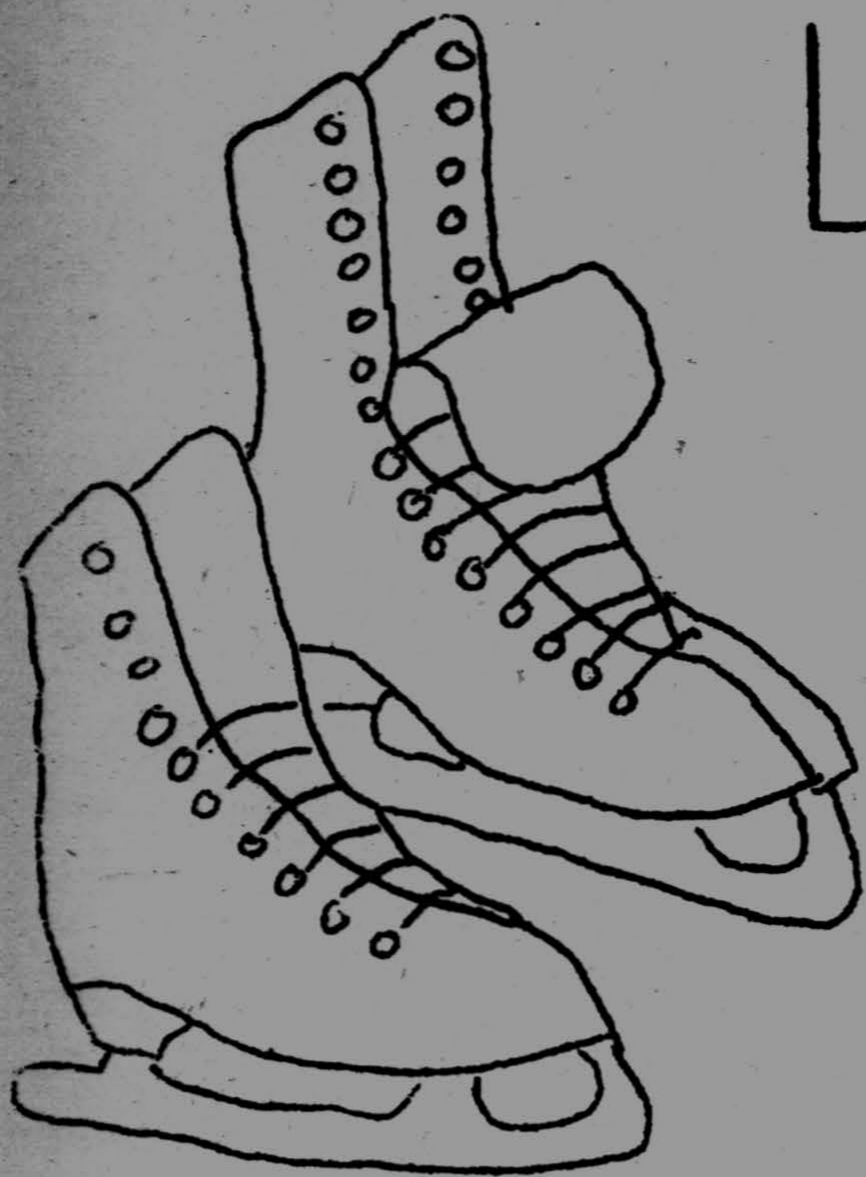
H Obviously, the audience did, bursting into shattering applause that was not to end for almost a minute.

T An encore -- then a standing ovation that lasted another minute and a half. After the second encore clapping still continued at a furious pace when the curtain came down.

S If Les Feux-Follets is an indication of what Festival Canada has in store for Western Canada in months to come, it's going to be some Centennial Year.
