THE CANADIAN RED CROSS SOCIETY IS CONDUCTING ITS ANNUAL CAMPAIGN FOR FUNDS ACROSS CANADA THIS MONTH. THE SOCIETY APPROACHES THE GENERAL PUBLIC DURING MARCH, WHICH IS DESIGNATED "RED CROSS MONTH" FOR SUPPORT IN THE ANNUAL FINANCIAL DRIVE.

THE LABRADOR CITY BRANCH, ALONG WITH BRANCHES IN 60 OTHER COMMUNITIES IN THE PROVINCE, IS A MEMBER OF THE NEWFOUNDLAND DIVISION, WHICH HAS ITS HEADQUARTERS IN ST. JOHN'S. MONEY COLLECTED IN NEWFOUNDLAND AND LABRADOR IS ADMINISTERED BY HEADQUARTERS TO SUPPORT RED CROSS ACTIVITIES IN THE PROVINCE.

DURING 1966, OVER 13,000 PEOPLE IN NEWFOUNDLAND AND LABRADOR RECEIVED DIRECT ASSISTANCE THROUGH THE BLOOD TRANSFUSION, SICKROOM SUPPLY, RED CROSS HOSTEL, DISASTER, EMERGENCY AID, AND WELL BABY PROGRAMS. AN ADDITIONAL 8000 PEOPLE RECEIVED TRAINING IN CARE IN THE HOME AND WATER SAFETY COURSES.

ALL RED CROSS WORK ON THE BRANCH LEVEL IS VOLUNTARY. WHEN YOUR CANVASSER CALLS ON MARCH 29, PLEASE SUPPORT RED CROSS

THE FIRST HOME NURSING CLASS BEING CONDUCTED BY THE LABRADOR CITY BRANCH OF THE RED CROSS WAS FORMED ON MARCH 7, WITH 15 LADIES OF THE COMMUNITY ATTENDING. MRS. BERNICE JAMES WHO IS ORGANIZING THE COURSE, IS BEING ABLY ASSISTED BY MRS. A. BLUNDON, MRS. E. HARDIE, AND MRS. M. MURPHY. IT IS CERTAINLY GRATIFYING TO SEE SUCH AN EAGER RESPONSE TO A COURSE OF THIS TYPE, AND I SINCERELY HOPE THAT THIS WORK WILL BE CONTINUED IN THE FUTURE.

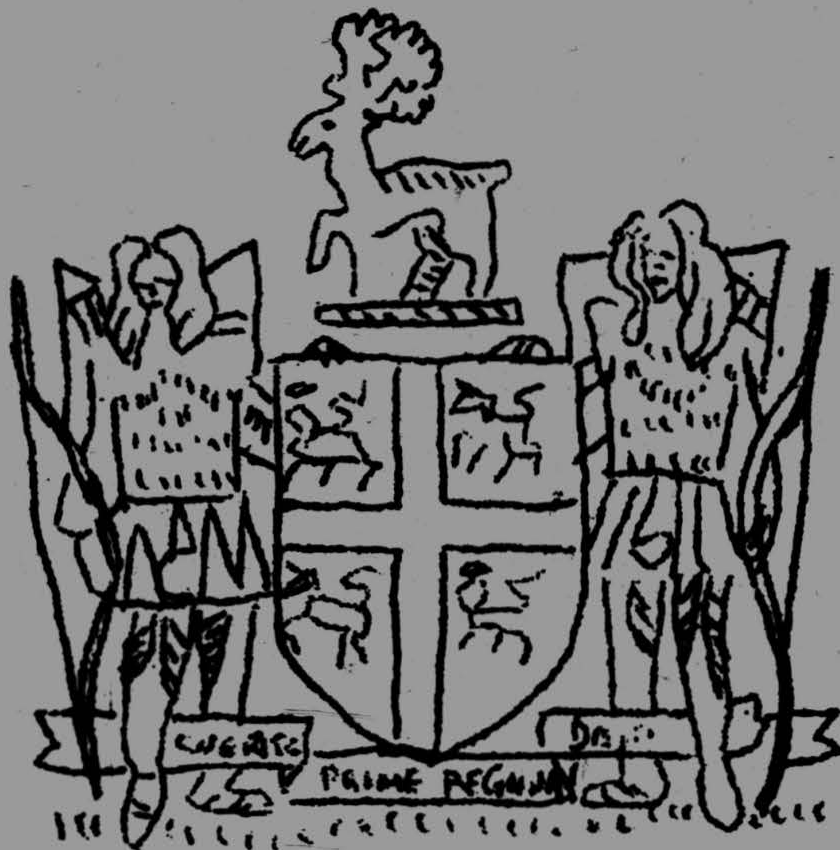

FROM THE SCHOOL

This being the first edition of "The Carol News" in which Labrador City Collegiate has run a column, we would first like to thank Mrs. Smith for allotting this space to us.

We aim to use the space to inform the local public of the happenings within the school. It would probably be best to first introduce you to the council which helps us in most of our activities, that being the Student Council. The council consists of a president, vice-president, secretary, representative from the french section, four house representatives, and three staff advisors. The functions of the Council are as follows:

1. To co-ordinate activities of all student organizations with staff approval.
2. To afford a means whereby there may exist a greater degree of co-operation between the staff and the students through negotiations on problems which may arise. To represent the student body to the administration through the appointed advisors.
3. To receive and administer any funds that may become the property of the council.
4. To regulate and control the various student activities so as to ensure that the interests of the student body of the High School may be safeguarded. To obtain this aim the following committees were created: a) awards committee, b) sports committee, drama committee, d) dance committee, e) newspaper, f) charming secretaries, g) canteen, h) yearbook.

Each is formed of staff members and student Union members. The vice-president of the Council is an honorary member of each group and co-ordinates activities. One member of the Council is a member of each group and is responsible to the Council and to the student's on this groups affairs.

But enough for the function of the Council. It is felt by all, that this year's student council is doing an extremely good job of carrying out their duties. Meetings have been held once a week plus meetings called to attend to emergency business. The Council has run a canteen in the school, during recess, from which students may obtain food stuffs. The Student's Council has also held dances for the students on weekends whenever it was possible to obtain a band, and when no other use was planned for the gymnasium for that particular night. The student Council has added to the success of the dances by trying to get different bands each time.

Support has been given to the following causes by the Council: the school newspaper, the yearbook, curling draws, the boy's varsity hockey team, and the drama club. In the case of drama, the council will be awarding cash prizes to students holding various distinguished positions in the One-Act plays which are to be held on March 21.

In summation on the student Council, it may be added that the student body is conscious of the hard tasks which the council has to face, and appreciated the job it has done so far this year.

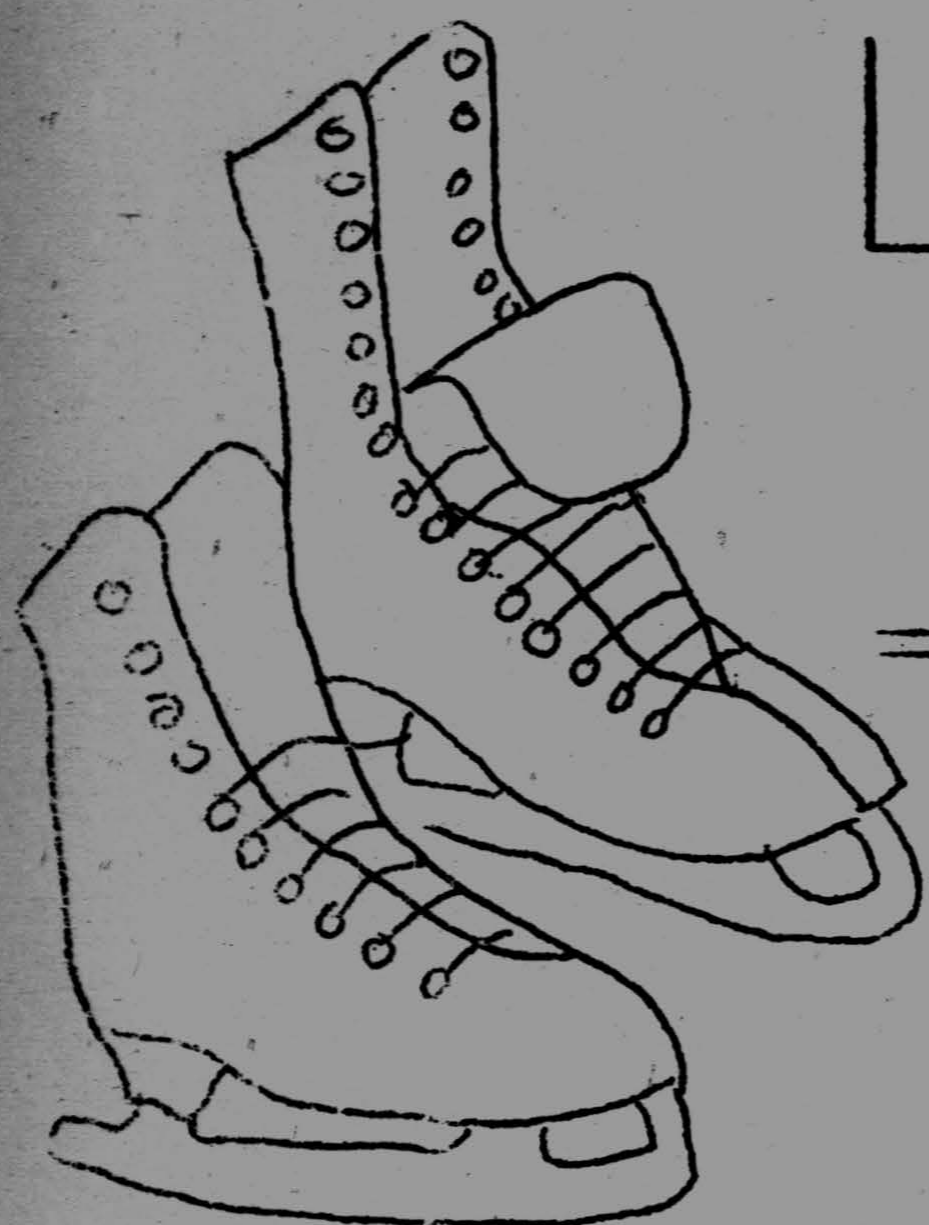
The top boys are to be congratulated on the effort and results of this tournament.
