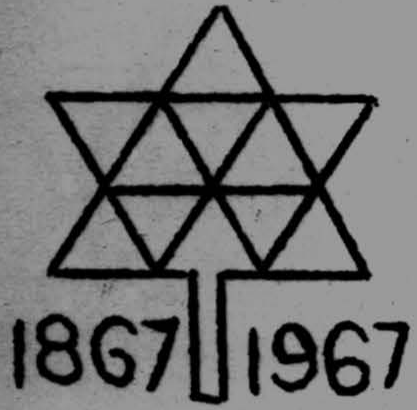

EASTER ALREADY! IT SEEMS THAT CHRISTMAS IS JUST OVER. CERTAINLY IT DOES NOT GO UNNOTICED THAT EASTER IS NOT SUBJECT TO THE LONG PERIOD OF HIGH POWERED COMMERCIALISM THAT CHRISTMAS IS.

YET EASTER DOES NOT COME UNAWARES. THE CHRISTIAN CHURCH HAS THROUGH HISTORY, PREPARED FOR THE GREAT FESTIVAL OF EASTER BY THE SEASON OF LENT. IN THESE LATER YEARS IT HAS BEEN SUGGESTED FROM VARIOUS QUARTERS TO SHORTEN LENT FROM ITS PRESENT FORTY DAYS TO SAY THE TWO WEEKS IMMEDIATELY PRECEDING EASTER. WE ARE NOW IN THE FINAL WEEK OF LENT - HOLY WEEK - WHEN CHRISTIANS REFLECT AND MEDITATE UPON JESUS' LAST DAYS ON EARTH AS MAN.

ON GOOD FRIDAY - THE DAY OF HIS CRUCIFIXION, THE BATTLE OF LIGHT WITH DARKNESS SEEMED TO PREVAIL BUT THE WORDS "IT IS FINISHED" SPOKEN FROM HIS CROSS, DENOTE A RING OF VICTORY. BY THE RESURRECTION OF CHRIST, GOD HAS GIVEN THAT UNCONQUERABLE HOPE WHICH SHOULD BE THE MARK OF EVERY CHRISTIAN. FOR THERE CAN BE NO DARKNESS BLACKER THAN THE DARKNESS OF CALVARY - YET OUT OF IT SHINES THE EVERLASTING LIGHT.

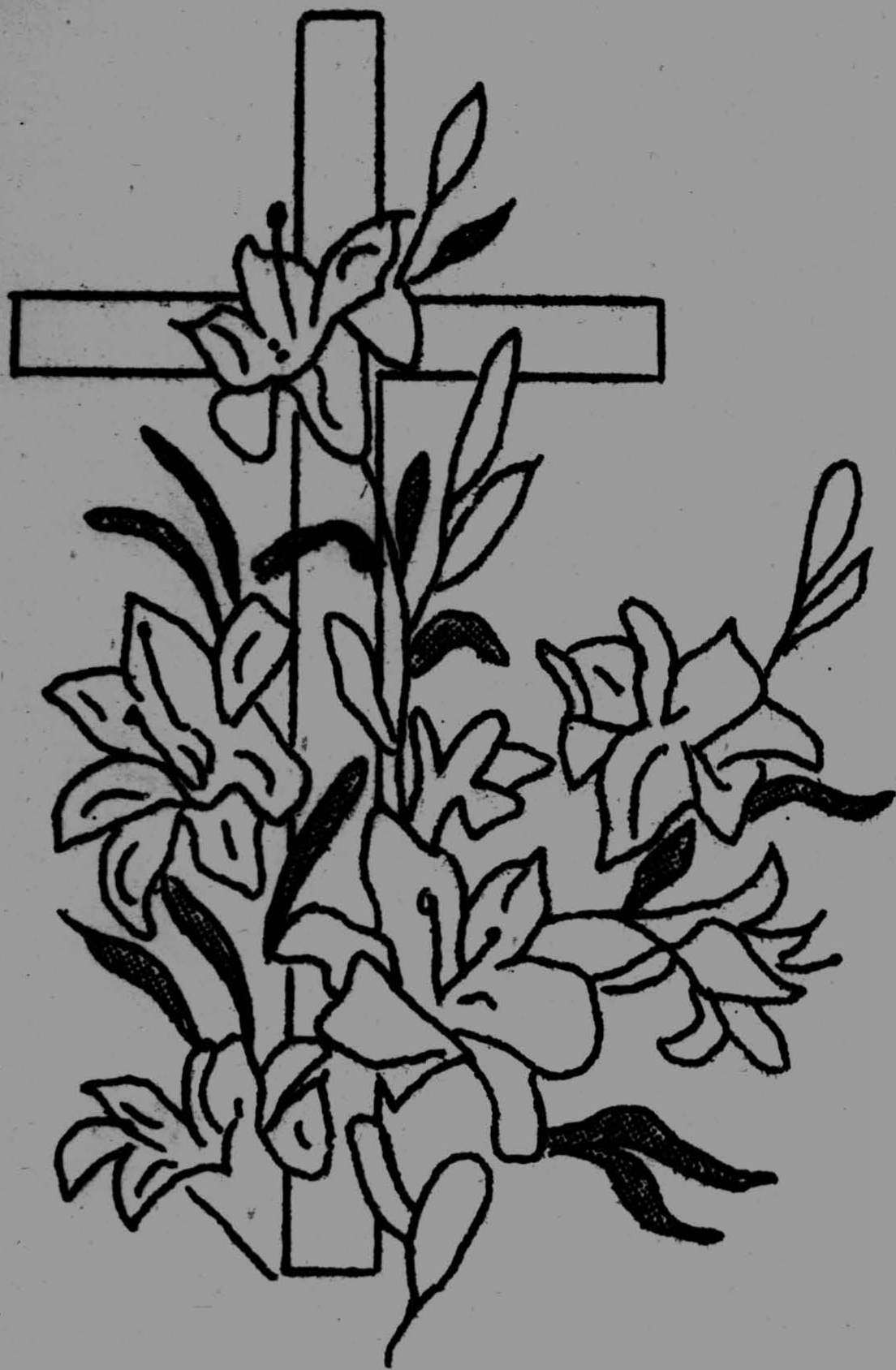
MARCH IS RED CROSS MONTH

The Administration of Labrador City Collegiate was sad to announce last Thursday that it was impossible to get transportation to Montreal, for the one-hundred students who had planned to visit Expo from May 3 to May 10, on the Remsdale Plan.

Due to these circumstances the administration will have to cancel all previous arrangements.

The Iron Ore Company, however, announced in a press release in Montreal a few weeks ago that they had planned to send 2,000 students, from Grades 5 to 11, to Expo, for two days, from Labrador City, Seven Islands, and Schefferville. This plan would go into effect on May 16. The Iron Ore Company will provide a Super-Constellation jet to take the students to Montreal. Approximately 120 students will be taken in each trip. This plan will cost the Iron Ore Company in the vicinity of about \$100,000.

Since it is impossible to send all students before the Summer recess, The I.O.C. will commence to send the remaining students in September.

PENNY DRIVE...

Last week, Monday through Friday, a penny drive was held in the L.C.C. High School. This drive was held with the purpose of using the collected money in aid of the payment of this year's yearbook. 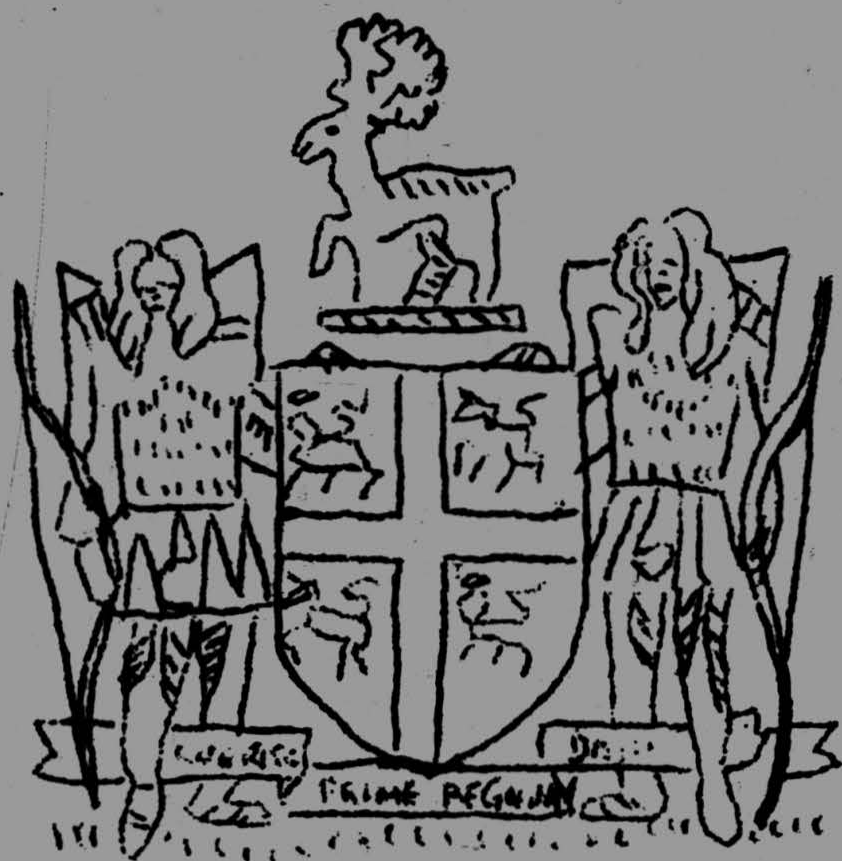

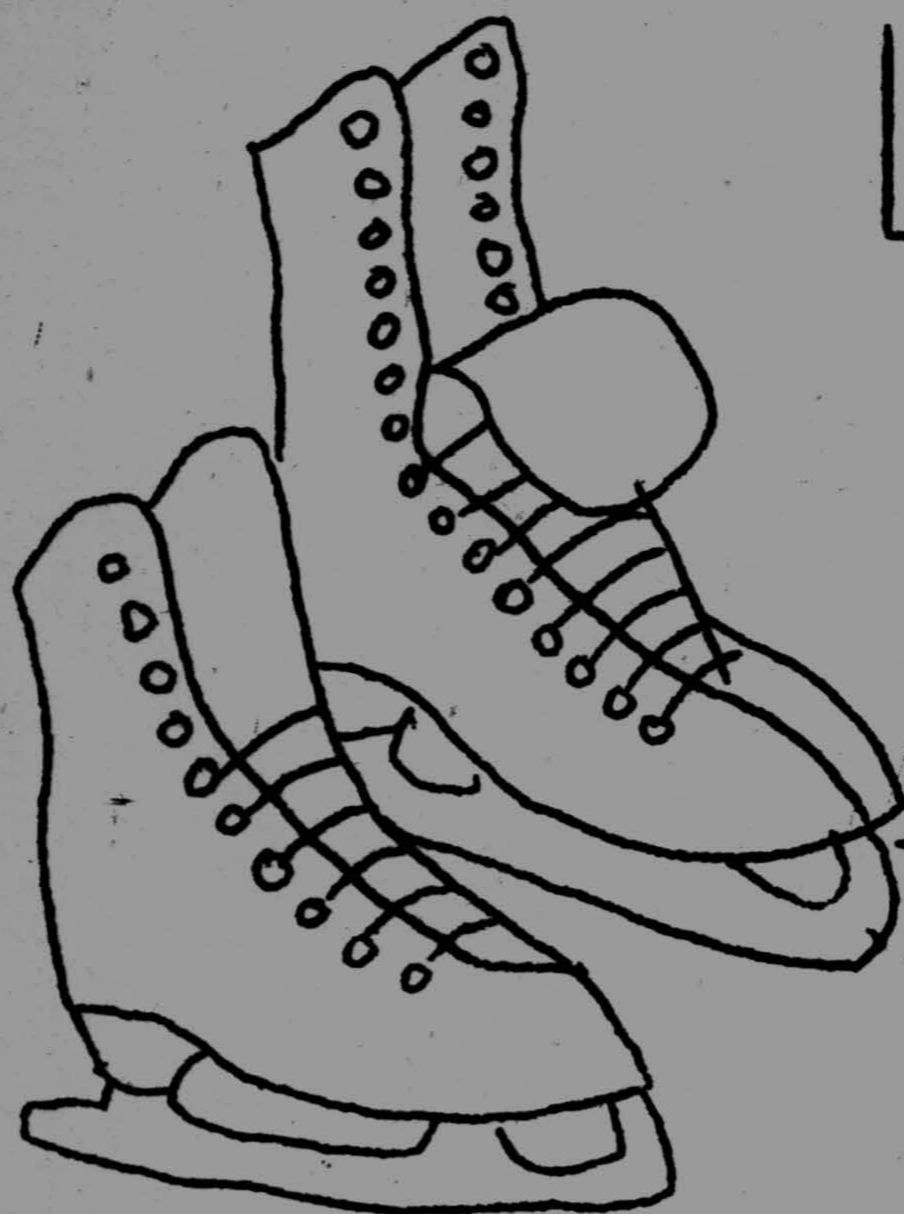
