The following editorial was kindly sent to me by a visitor to our town, Mr. Elmer Harris, News Director, C.K.C.M. Radio, Grand Falls. The editorial came in two parts, the second of which will be published next week.

To me as a tourist and observer, Labrador City portrays one of the greatest examples of planning and co-operative enterprise found in Canada.

This relatively new town affords a unique experience and example, which could lay the cornerstone for other areas of this great nation. Indeed the whole continent could learn a great lesson from a study of the life and composition of this town.

Here you have a bicultural and bilingual town growing with a least amount of friction, language and race differences appear to have been minimized to the extent that they are insignificant.

Canada as a developing nation will only progress toward its second Centennial with pride and the respect of the world, if each individual town and city creates and retains a spirit of accord and unity.

Labrador City is advancing in the right direction and each individual citizen owes it to himself and to his nation to prevent any moves which would retard this progress.

Economically Labrador City is no doubt one of the most stable and wealthiest in Canada and figures significantly in Canada's balance of trade. Your town will continue to contribute to Canada's economy throughout our second century, and, from all appearances, the nucleus of this wealth could have no better parent than the Iron Ore Company of Canada.

From an educational and spiritual standpoint, Labrador City is equipped with the facilities to ensure its maturity. Your school system, I am sure, is competing and probably surpassing that in most areas of Canada.

I had the opportunity of visiting your town four years ago and the improvements here since that time are outstanding. So much so, that it is difficult to recall the changes in specific areas. The physical changes most notable, of course, are your paving, sidewalk and housing construction programs.

Yet there is another change, which while inevitable, is of lasting importance. Labrador City is losing that pioneer spirit of adventure. Your town is taking on that spirit of a settled town, a town that has a goal and is exercising its efforts toward that end.

The economic and cultural importance of this northland has been discovered (ironically in the same generation that man is opening the door to outer space) and because of its discovery every citizen of Canada is the richer.

You have every reason to be proud of your town and I am proud to have had the opportunity, along with my wife and son, to become acquainted with the development of Labrador City. I could go further and say that every citizen of Canada could gain a greater appreciation for this nation by visiting your town. The responsibility rests on your shoulders to keep it that way.

Beware of glare this summer, warns The Canadian National Institute for the Blind. When driving, boating or on the beach, protect your eyes from that too bright sun with good quality sunglasses.

Don't throw bottles or cans on the campfire warns The Canadian National Institute for the Blind. The heat may cause them to explode showering potentially-blinding fragments of glass or metal.

Protective glasses with plastic lenses and safety frames should be part of every fisherman's gear, says The Canadian National Institute for the Blind. Barbed fish lures, needle-sharp hooks and those heavy metal sinkers, are all potential eye hazards. So be a wise owl - protect your sight with safety glasses.

Cutting grass seems like a harmless task, but too often power mowers throw up small stones which can damage the eye. The Canadian National Institute for the Blind warns everyone to guard against accidental eye injury this summer.

The Canadian National Institute for the Blind reminds parents that fire-crackers are not toys to be carelessly tossed about by children. They should be taught to safeguard their own and their companions' eyes by careful handling of these dangerous missiles.

HOUSEHOLD TIPS TO CUT OUT AND KEEP

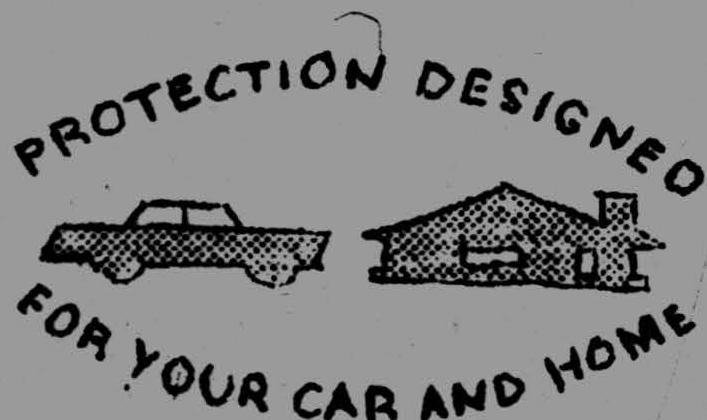

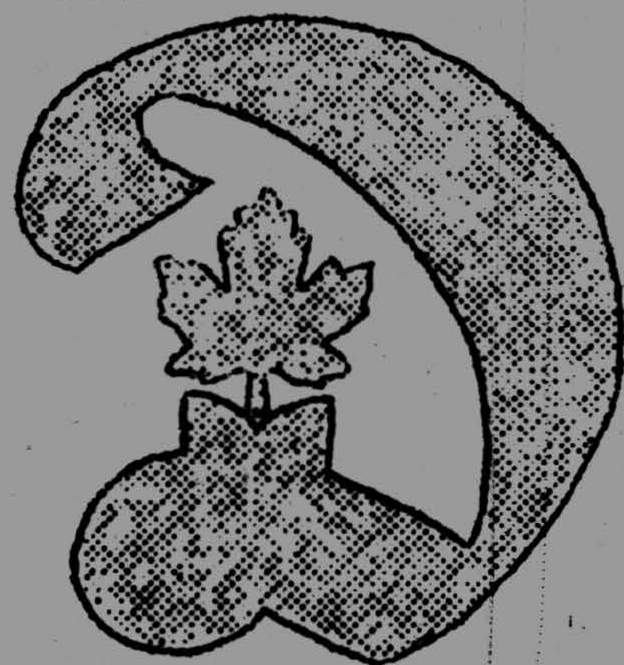

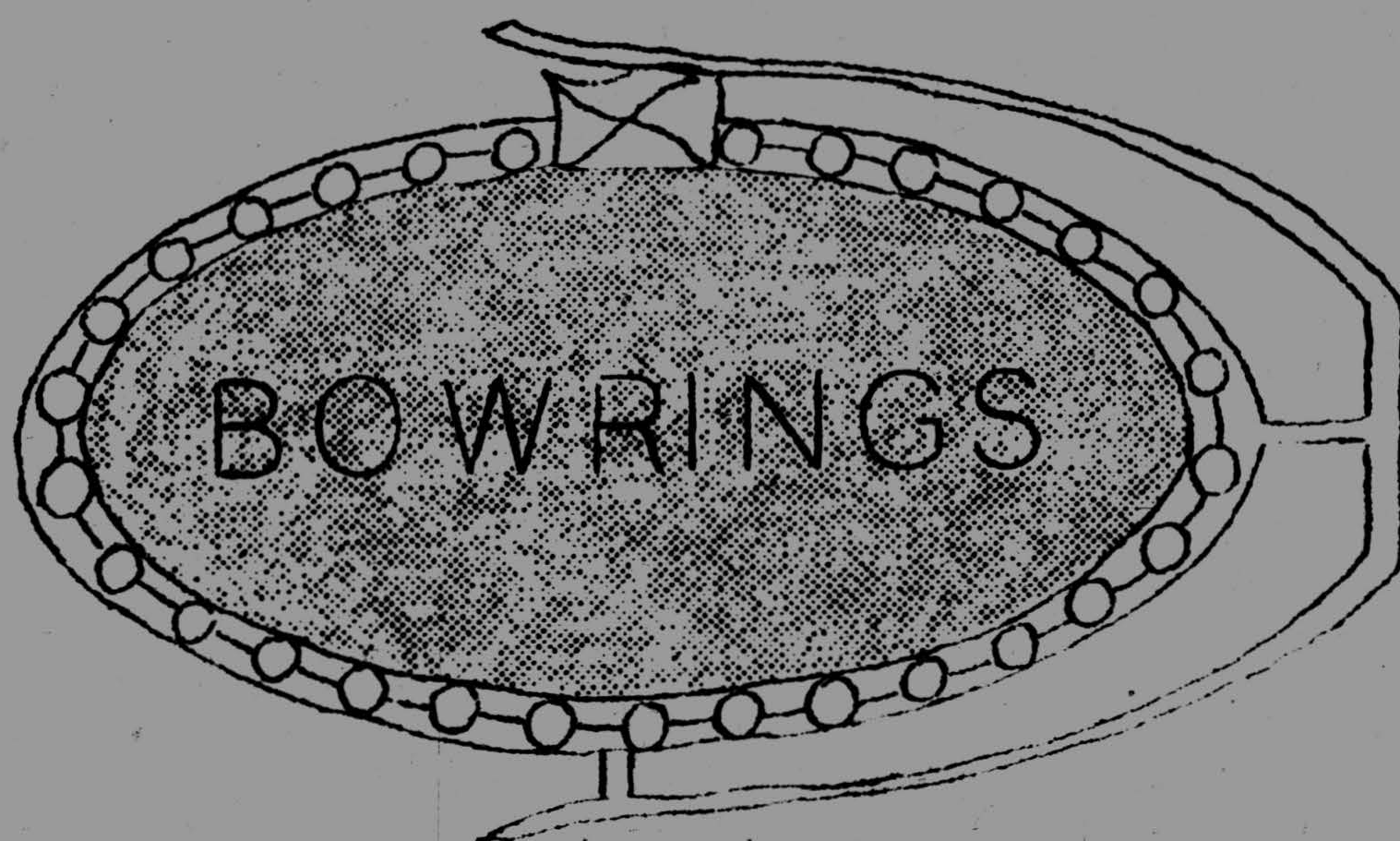
