A LETTER FROM THE LABRADOR CITY
YOUTH ASSOCIATION

TO THE TEENAGERS AND PARENTS OF TEENAGERS OF LABRADOR CITY

Parents! If you do not mind your children "hanging around" the streets; if you do not mind whether or not your child has a decent place to spend the evening; if you simply do not care about your children or where or how they pass their time, then, please, disregard this letter.

But, if your count yourselves among those precious people who love their children enough to want them to grow up spending their time honestly, among their friends in their type of surrounding, then, take heed:

We, the executive of the L.C.Y.A., are but a handful of teenagers, naive and inexperienced in the ways of big business, and without your support we are helpless.

At the present time, we are attempting to raise funds for the construction of a youth centre, and in this project we hope that you will be generous and lenient.

But, we must ask for more than just your money. We desperately need your moral support, your understanding, and your blessings.

It is true, that we once had a teen club - a make shift shack on the outskirts of town. It is also true that, because of certain people, we were forced to close the doors of our "old teen club", but with what result? The teenagers are now in such a sorry predicament that we must once again attempt to open the doors of a new youth centre. We freely admit that the last teen club was poorly administered and greatly lacking in many ways. In the first stage of its organization there were some incidents of which we can not be proud. One was an essay contest for which we placed, as first prize, a \$100 bond. From the ranks of our THREE HUNDRED MEMBERS, NINE PEOPLE STEPPED FORTH. Co-operation and participation were greatly lacking. However in the Spring of '65 a complete re-organization took place and within five months, we had disposed of a \$500 bill and we had \$150 in the bank. In September and December of that year we held two banquets which were hailed, by both parents and teenagers, as a shining example of perfect order and control. Then in January our club was taken over by a new president and in the next month our club was closed.

We now have our president back, a little more wiser and a little more determined. Behind him are ten executive members. All are working for a common goal. If you, the parents and leaders of this community, are willing to give us another chance, there are some teenagers in this town who will truly work to see their dream of a decent youth centre become a reality.

WE NEED A YOUTH CENTRE - A DECENT PLACE UNDER THE SUPERVISION OF AN HONEST AND UPRIGHT MANAGER.

WE NEED A YOUTH CENTRE AND WE NEED IT THIS YEAR !!!!!

The membership for the new proposed youth centre will go on sale in early October. The fee, per year, is \$12.00 for students and \$15.00 for non-students, with special rates for large families and young married couples. We sincerely hope that you will not simply give your child the money for his membership. The new membership will be a priceless thing, for it will open the door to all decent teen activity for many years to come. We hope that your child will earn his membership, so that, by working for it, he will learn to respect and honour it.

Parents, have faith in us and what we are striving for. We are placing our faith and hope in you!

TEENAGERS! How many of you have complained about 'nothing to do' and 'no place to go'? God helps those who help themselves, but if we cannot obtain YOUR support there can never be a youth centre, NEVER!

We have received support from the Provincial government, The Iron Ore Co. of Canada, The United steel Workers of America, and a number of local business firms and organizations. THEY are helping YOU, so what are YOU doing to show your appreciation for their aid????

We, the executive, have learned that, on one hand, there are quite a number of extremely ungrateful people in this town and on the other hand there are still a few people with the patience, sincerity and hope to continue to strive for and achieve their set goal - the establishment of a youth centre in Labrador City.

So far this fall, we have tried to succeed in two major projects. The first was the building of a float for the Labour Day parade. In this endeavour, we would like to thank the TWO people who turned out to help us. Where were all the teenagers on that bright sunny morning? Where were all the people who had promised us their support?

The second and most recent project was our proposed "March of Quarters". In this effort we would like to thank the "Soul Deacons" from Wabush and "The Marothons" from Labrador City Collegiate. Of all the teenagers who committed themselves, these two groups were the only ones who showed the proper initiative and interest. We would also like to thank all the people who "backed out" on us and who helped to make this project such a huge flop. We would like to thank these people for showing us who the real friends of the teenagers are. Again, we must ask: where were all the teenagers - recovering from moonlight swimming?

For those of you who think that this last project and its failure was a 'big joke', who will be laughing if the club project falls through?

Teenagers, do not completely blame us, the executive, if we do not obtain our youth centre - remember, Let him how has no sin cast the first stone!

We seem not only to lack the support from the adult and parent generation, but there is a seemingly ever present lack of enthusiasm and support from our fellow teenagers.

Well, teenagers, maybe you really do not want a youth centre! Maybe you are quite content to keep going along your merry way from home to school to a restaurant, to an odd dance and back home again.

The decision is yours. You can sit back and watch a handful of teenagers and parents beat their heads against the wall of an unfinished youth centre. You can stand by and see all our plans crumble and decay. Or, you can do your part to make this a better place for teenagers, past, present, and future.

We, the executive, are trying our best to see the completion of our youth centre. We are not looking for praise for what we are doing. We need no pat on the back, no handshake, or words of kindness, WE NEED SUPPORT. We are too few to work for so many.

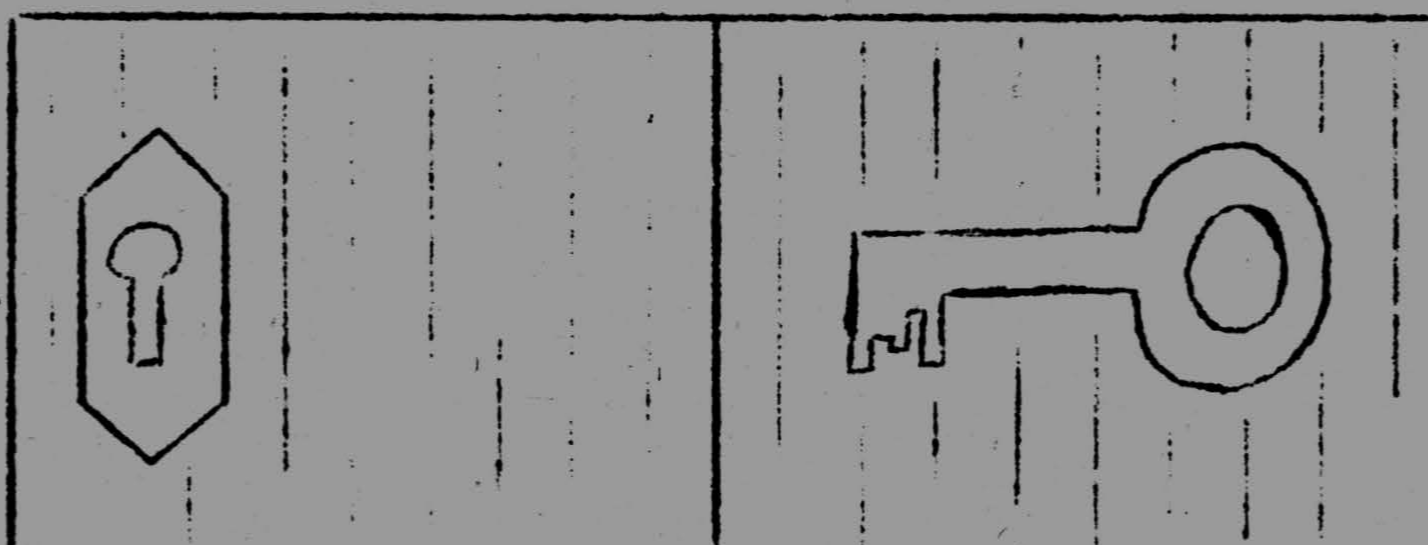

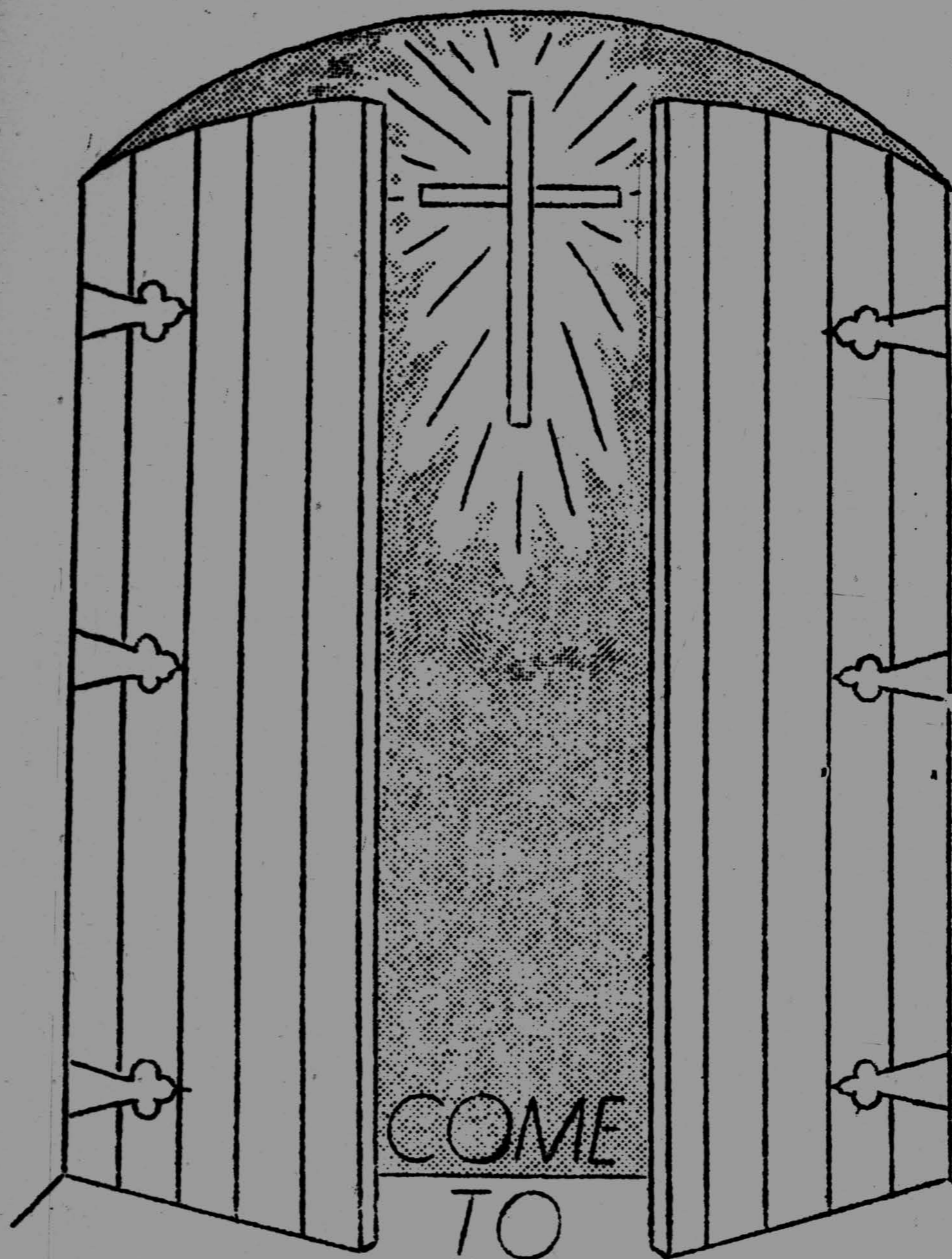

THE CANADIAN NATIONAL INSTITUTE FOR THE BLIND 'AMBLYOPIA' SURVEY

The St. John's Lions Club today threw substantial support behind a proposed Province wide attempt to help save the sight of hundreds of pre-school aged Newfoundlanders. Newly elected President, James Pike, presented a \$1,500.00 cheque to The Canadian National Institute for the Blind enabling CNIB to purchase 10 recently developed sight screeners designed to help detect the presence of Amblyopia, lazy eye blindness. The ten screeners will be placed across the Province into the hands of CNIB trained technicians who, during the next 12 months, will test thousands of youngsters between the ages of 3½ and 7. President Jim, and Lion Lou Fennell made the club presentation to CNIB Superintendent Joe Caruk.

"The screeners will have their first real test this October, the Superintendent stated. "We are now ready to launch our pilot screening programme in Labrador City and Wabush". Plans for the iron ore town's survey began in July when a Steering Committee consisting of representatives of the Iron Ore Company of Canada, Wabush Mines, local doctors and interested citizens met with the Superintendent to discuss the possibility of conducting a trial run on new screening techniques. Since that time, plans have been laid and completed for Amblyopia screening of 1,000 boys and girls 7 years and younger.

CNIB Supervisor of Eye Services for Newfoundland and Labrador, Miss Allison Sayers reports she is delighted with the enthusiasm and thoroughness of the Steering Committee. At least 40 volunteers will contribute to the success of the survey. Mothers will teach their children to play the "E" game, the game which may save many the sight of a weakened eye. Other volunteers will babysit for mothers who must bring "older brother or sister" to the survey centres. Still others will provide transportation. Registered Nurses, now busy wives, will return briefly to their profession and serve as screening technicians. Their efforts will be further re-inforced with voluntary clerks and recorders. Miss Sayers will direct the experimental project.

The new screening device, purchased with the Lions donation, will enable the screening team to test at least 40 pairs of eyes each hour of the six hour survey days. The project will take three weeks to complete. Every child failing his first test will receive a second during the three week activity. All who do not make the grade then, will be thoroughly examined and treated by a St. John's eye doctor who will join the survey team on the final week of the project.

REPORT

A full endorsement of the activities of the Labrador Citizens' Committee and their efforts, and recognition of the committee by Premier J.R.Smallwood, highlighted a recent visit to the provincial capital by committee chairman, Mr. Bill Hogan and Mr. Tom Burgess, MHA:

Meetings were also held with members of Mr.Smallwood's cabinet, resulting in the following:

1. A better understanding on the part of Government powers of the problems confronting Labrador City residents, such as the high cost of living, lack of communications, transportation, roads, health problems and housing.

2. There will be greater attention paid to secondary roads in the area.

3. A health inspector has been stationed in Goose Bay, and Labrador City will receive frequent visits in future. A second inspector will be appointed soon and between them they will inspect local grocery outlets, restaurants and cafeterias.

4. The Minister of Labrador Affairs, the Hon.Charles R.Granger and the Newfoundland representatives in the House of Commons in Ottawa are working very closely together in an attempt to improve radio and television in this area. Constant criticism from Mr.Burgess and local residents are finally bringing this matter to a head.

Meetings were also held with regional and provincial C.B.C.officials and Mr Keith Murrow, provincial manager of C.B.C. impressed Messrs Hogan and Burgess with plans and proposals for radio and T.V. in this area. If this area is brought under his jurisdiction, vast improvements can be looked for. However the success or failure of this enterprise cannot be left to one man - if you have any proposals to make or feelings to express, send your letters to:

In the near future we will see more and more radio originating from the Island of Newfoundland and, we hope, T.V. from the C.B.C. in St. John's. It is believed that Mr Murrow has the backing of a number of influential people which should help tremendously to achieve satisfactory results.

There are meetings scheduled to take place in November between our local representatives, officials of the C.B.C. and the government in Ottawa. So don't just kick around your T.V. set or sit there grumbling to yourself, do something constructive and send in your letters to the above address.

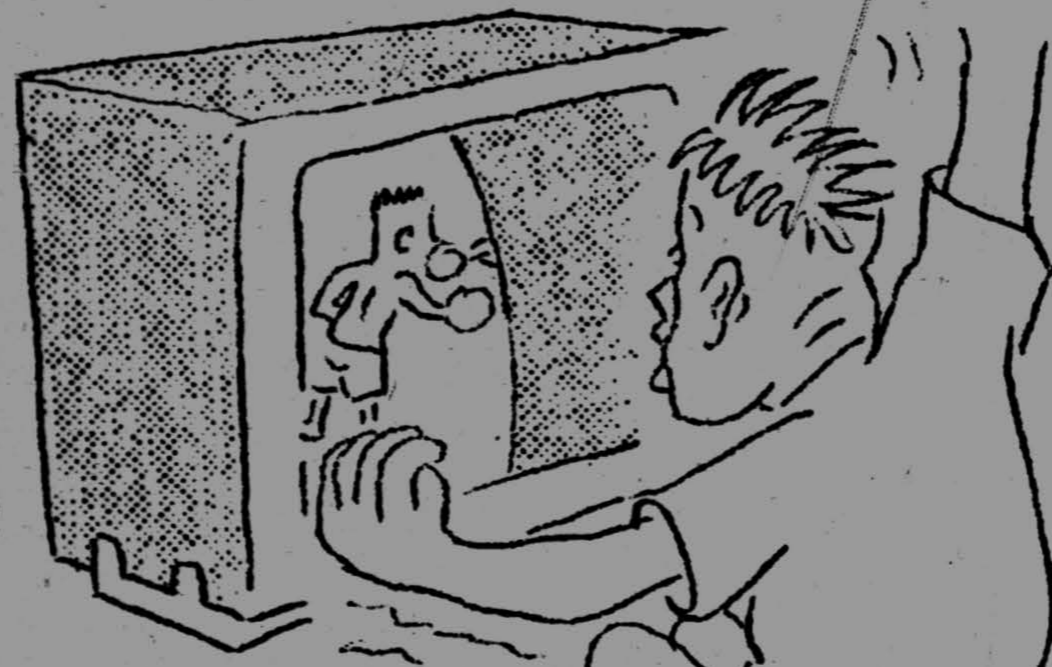
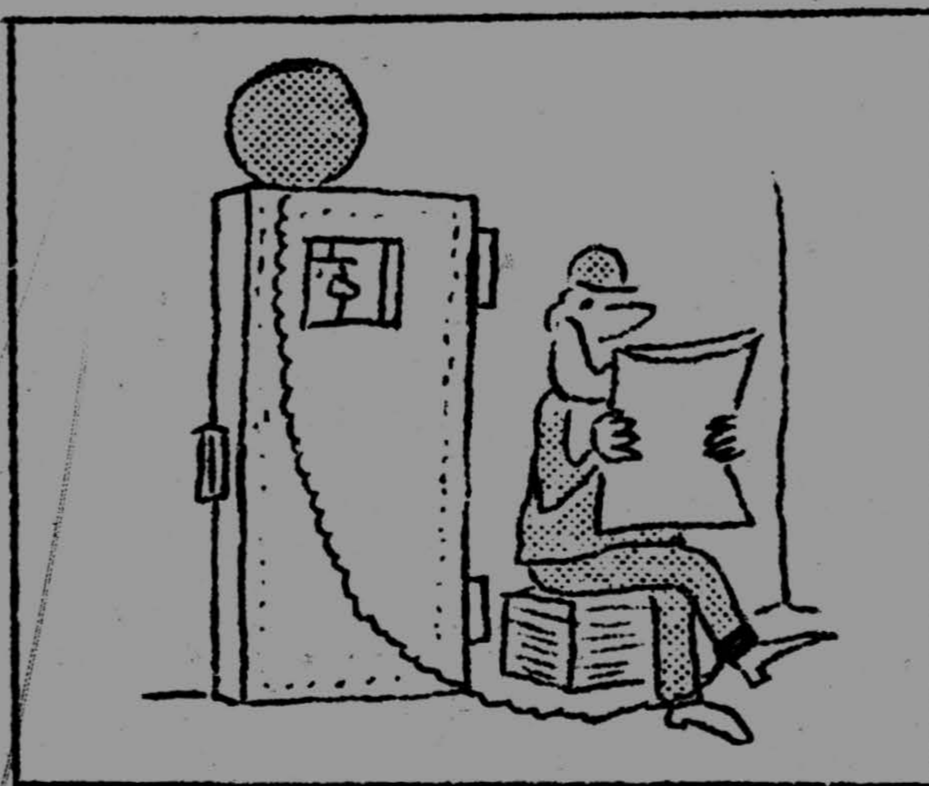

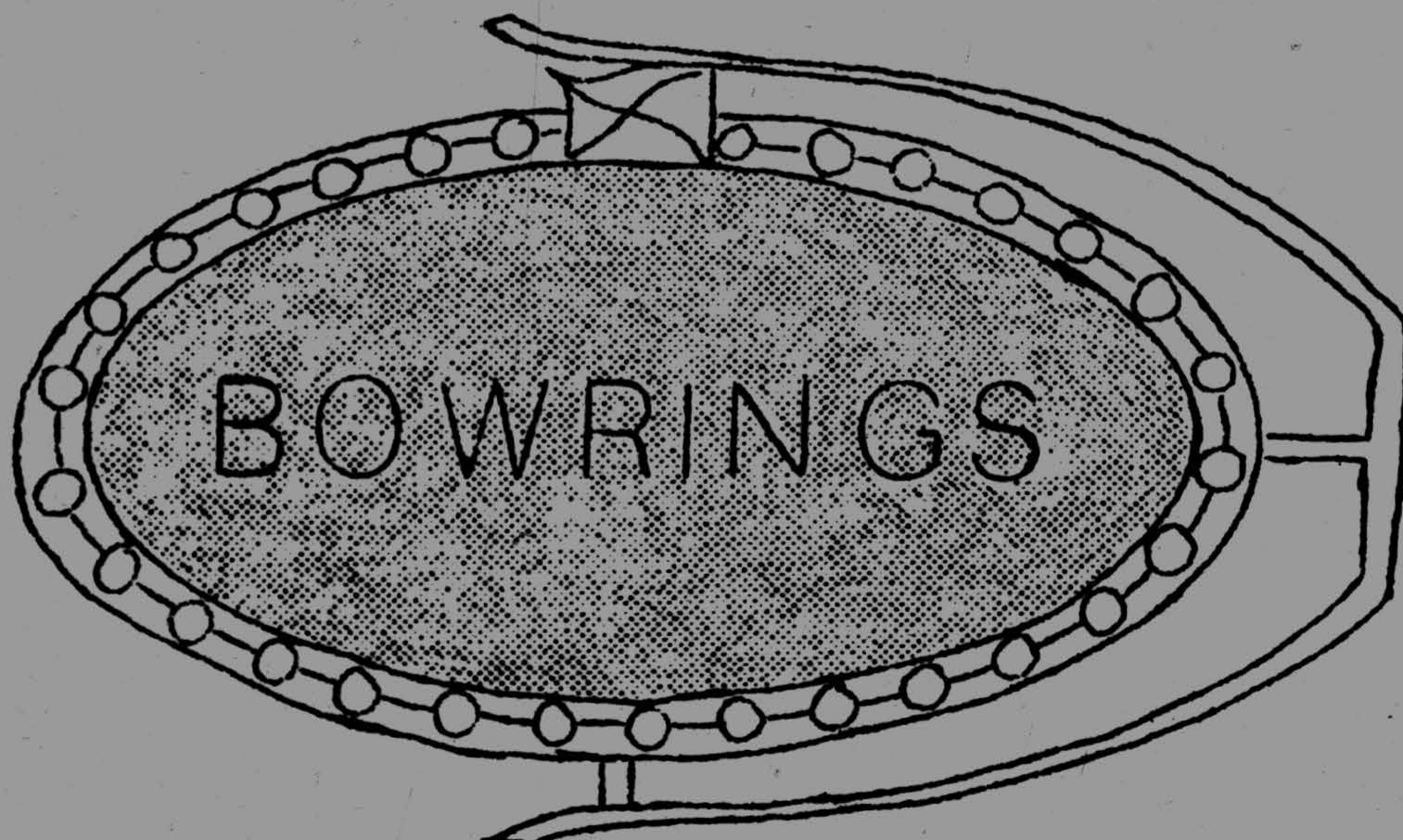
