With the coming of winter, it is time to look into some of our driving habits.

Winter brings snow, bad visibility, icy roads and other hazards and probably the most important thing any driver can do is to SLOW DOWN. Ease up on the gas and stop lightly on the brakes.

However, there are some aspects of our traffic problem that are not confined to winter driving. Our shopping centre parking lot reaches the point of chaos at its peak periods. Many times we see a car half-way out into the traffic stream and unable to reverse any further simply because very few people seem to have the time or inclination to stop for a matter of 15 seconds to allow a driver to get his car out of his parking place. A little thought and a little courtesy would work wonders here.

While on the subject of the parking lot, the roads are not very wide, particularly in the new section; and the practice of driving both ways has increased tremendously in the past two or three months. Surely this is one area which cries out repeatedly for ONE WAY signs.

There is a tendency for many of our drivers too, to drive along in front of the stores, calmly stop the car in the middle of the roadway and disappear into the store to pick up groceries etc... Surely this practice is not necessary. One does not have to walk any more than a hundred feet, I would think, from a regular parking spot. Meanwhile there is no snarl-up in the traffic stream.

For the people who use Humber Avenue repeatedly for their cars, there are two additional hazards presented by parked cars. At the intersection of Humber and Hudson one can always see several cars parked in front of our Municipal Buildings. This practice cuts down the access from Humber into Hudson tremendously, and with our narrower Winter roads this hazard increases.

A similar situation presents itself at the other end of Humber, turning into Avalon, here we have cars parked opposite the intersection in front of the apartments.

In both instances there is an Off-the-road parking lot within fifty feet.

Let's do a bit of thinking about our driving habits and keep the accidents down to a minimum.

I am often reminded of a statement made to me when I was learning to drive:
- DRIVE YOUR CAR AS IF YOUR FAMILY WAS IN THE OTHER CAR ON THE ROAD.

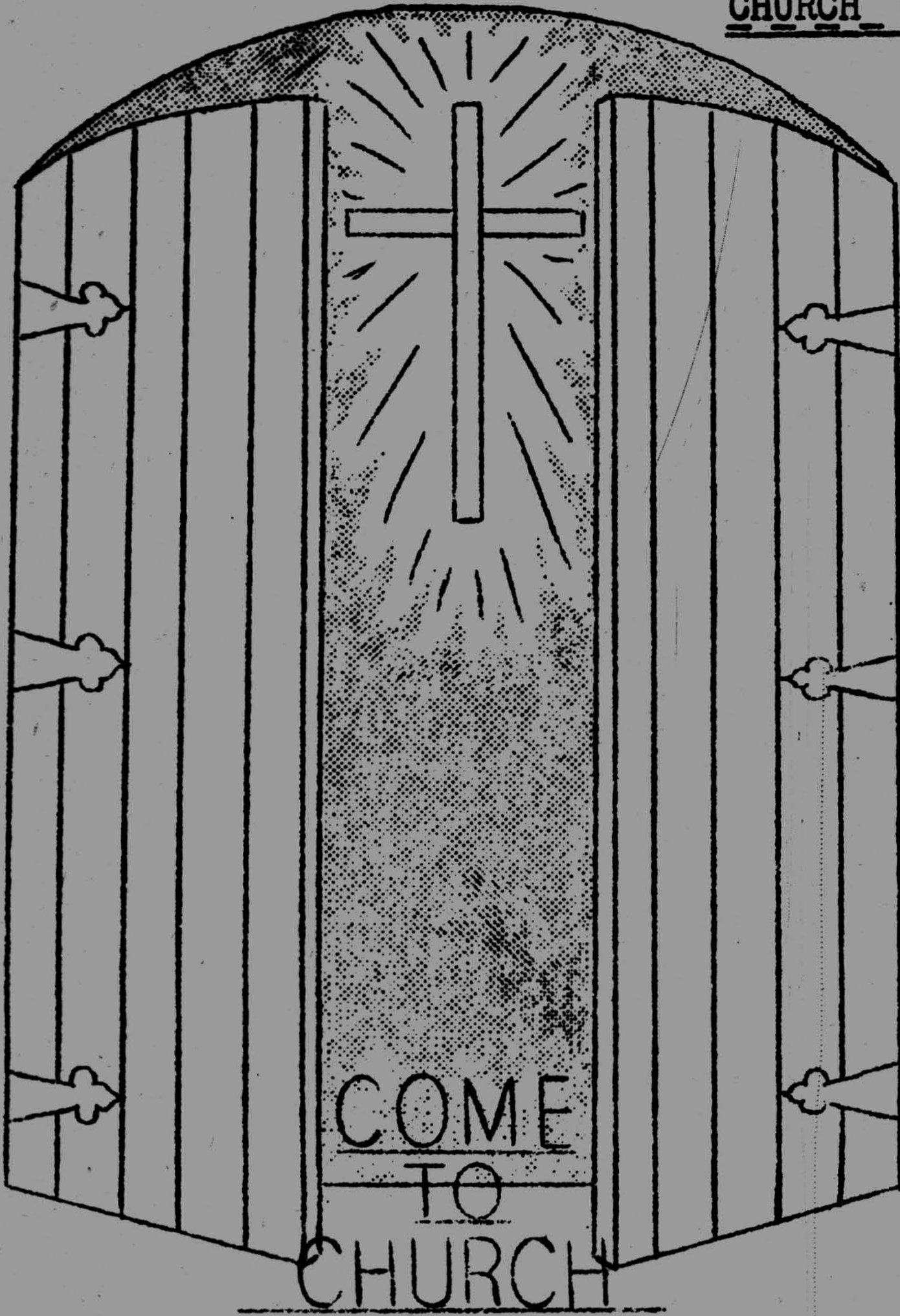

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WORKSHOP ON THE EMOTIONAL PROBLEMS OF CHILDREN

The Labrador West Branch of the Newfoundland Teachers' Association in conjunction with the Canadian Mental Health Association, plan to hold a one day workshop on Friday October 27th, 1967, for all teachers in the Labrador City - Wabush area. Plans have now been finalized to have Professor Howard Stutt and Dr. Pottle as consultants for the workshop. Professor Stutt is a Professor of Education at MacDonald College, McGill University. He is a psychiatrically oriented Guidance Counsellor. Dr. Pottle is a psychiatrist from the hospital for Mental and Nervous diseases in St. John's.

A full day's programme has been planned with registration at 9:00 am. on Friday morning. There will be a main speaker for the morning followed by discussion groups and a question period. The morning session will end at 12:30 pm. The workshop will resume at 2:00 pm. for the afternoon session when there will again be a main speaker, group discussions and a question period. The working sessions will end at 4:30 pm and the conference will close with a banquet at the Sir Wilfred Grenfell Hotel at 6:00pm.

The prime purpose of the workshop is to help teachers become more aware of the ever present emotional problems of children. The local branch of the N.T.A. feels this is one type of inservice training that teachers today need more than anything.

The Workshop has the full support of all local School Boards and the mining companies in the area.

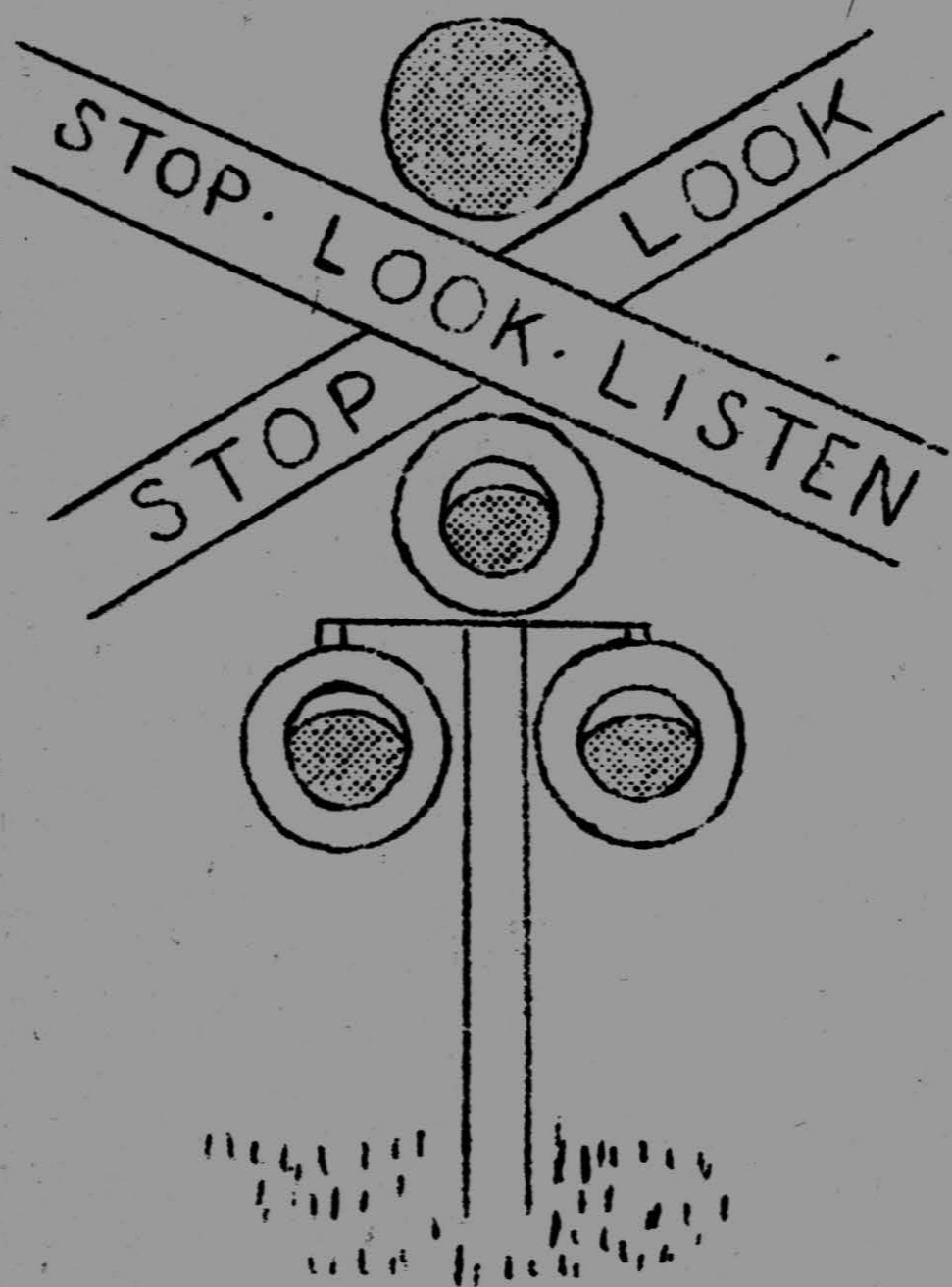

"CAMPFIRE CHATTER"

This Saturday night the scouts of the Carol Scout Group will put on their dancing shoes and take their girl friends to a dance which they are holding at the Scout Lodge. Several weeks ago, the boys decided that they would like to have a dance and invite their female friends, so they approached their leaders who, after some thought and consideration, gave their consent. The age limit for this dance will be twelve to sixteen years and the admission fifty cents. The affair will be chaperoned by the scouters and their wives.

The annual Scouters Conference will be held in Corner Brook this year from the eleventh to the thirteenth of November. Each year a conference is held in a different city or town bringing together scouters from all over the province to discuss scouting, its problems, changes, and new ideas. This is the second time Corner Brook has played host to the Scouters Conference in the past four years, the first time being in the fall of 1963. It was decided at last Friday night's Scouters Council meeting that Mr. C. Brown, C.M., and Mr. Wm. Soper, S.M., would represent the Carol Scouters Council at the 1967 conference.

Each year in more than eighty countries around the globe, ten million scouts and leaders try to raise funds for training and civic projects. The methods used are many, for example, when boy scouts in Warialda, New Zealand had to spend \$220 for repairs to their meeting quarters, they promptly erected a wooden tower, 30 feet high in front of the local police station. The scouts elected to send their scoutmaster to the tower top with instructions to remain there until enough public donations were received to finance the expense. Hundreds of townspeople gathered to view the scout leaders vigil. During the night thunder showers fell, but the Warialda leader remained perched atop the tower. By morning, a generous public had contributed \$520 to one of the year's most novel scout fund-raising campaigns.

A United Church-sponsored scout troop in Alberta has gambled \$150 with hopes of returning \$300 by Christmas. Scout organizers withdrew \$150 from the troop's bank account in June and distributed five dollars to each of the thirty scouts, asking them to invest the cash.

"The scouts may enlist the advice and help of their parents in the investment project" explained a scout organizer. The project aims to encourage thriftiness among the scouts.

Each year vast changes are taking place in scouting. Scouting today is not what it was years ago when, on a week-end, scouts went hiking, camping, or attended a training session. Today there are many distractions from scouting such as T.V., movies, football, hockey, bowling, swimming and many others too numerous to mention. In this modern era of "go-go" we as scouters have to look at scouting from the boys' viewpoint if we are to keep them interested in the 60 year old movement. Today, we have to "feel out" the boy and find out what he thinks scouting is and what he wants to do as a scout. If we push nothing but scouting down his throat, naturally, he is going to rebel and before we know it, scouting will be a thing of the past.

One of the biggest changes in scouting as far as the boy is concerned is the addition of long pants as an alternative to short pants, to the scout uniform. So, now that we have two possible dresses, which is going to be worn. I feel that this decision be left up to the scouts themselves as they are the ones who will be wearing the uniform. However, whatever their decision should be, it should be such so as every boy will wear the same uniform. At present, scouts, when appearing in public or just at ordinary meetings are not uniform as far as uniforms go. So let us all get together and dress in uniform uniforms.

" And now until next week, when our trails meet again, good bye, good luck, good scouting, and remember always to BE PREPARED." dd.

For the benefit of Minor League Hockey players, the next 8 issues of the 'Carol News' will carry basic hockey skills. Cut these skills out and get your parents and coaches to explain them to you and more important - **PRACTICE THEM EVERY CHANCE YOU GET.** This week we'll start with the most important skill, SKATING.

YOU NEED TO KNOW HOW:

- (a) TO START AND STOP QUICKLY
- (b) TO TURN EITHER WAY WITHOUT LOSING BALANCE OR SPEED.
- (c) TO SKATE BACKWARDS.

EXAMINE YOUR SKATES FIRST. THEY SHOULD FIT SNUGLY WITH A SINGLE PAIR OF SOCKS. FIRM LEATHER BOOTS EXTENDING WELL ABOVE THE ANGLE BONE DO NOT NEED ANKLE SUPPORTS.

HERE ARE SOME GOOD POINTERS ON SKATING:

- (1) LEAN FORWARD FROM THE HIPS TO HELP YOUR BALANCE.
- (2) KEEP YOUR FEET ABOUT SHOULDER WIDTH APART.
- (3) BEND YOUR KNEES AND KEEP THEM FLEXIBLE.
- (4) USE SHORT, DIGGING STRIDES TO PICK UP SPEED QUICKLY.
- (5) BE SURE YOUR REAR KNEE IS BENT TO GIVE YOU THE THRUST AS IT STRAIGHTENS. POWER COMES FROM THE DRIVE OFF THE REAR FOOT.
- (6) AVOID SWINGING YOUR ARMS FROM SIDE TO SIDE BY CARRYING A STICK IN BOTH HANDS, KEEPING THE BLADE ON THE ICE AS YOU SKATE.
- (7) TURNING WITHOUT LOSS OF SPEED IS DIFFICULT FOR MANY SKATERS. DON'T COAST AROUND THE CORNERS ON YOUR SKATE EDGES. PLACE ONE FOOT OVER THE OTHER DIPPING THE INSIDE SHOULDER. YOU CAN ACTUALLY GAIN SPEED BY A LIGHT HOPPING OR RUNNING ACTION ON YOUR TURNS. ADD A LITTLE MOVEMENT OF BOTH SHOULDERS AS YOU DO THIS, AND NOTICE HOW YOUR SPEED INCREASES. BE SURE TO PRACTICE TURNING TO THE RIGHT AS WELL AS TO THE LEFT.
- (8) SKATING BACKWARDS IS A GOOD BALANCING EXERCISE, AND AN ESSENTIAL SKILL FOR DEFENCEMEN. ADOPT ALMOST A SITTING POSITION WITH THE WEIGHT FORWARD ON THE BALLS OF THE FEET. GET SPEED BY INCREASING THE HIP-SWING AND THE TWISTING SHOVE-OFF WITH EACH OUTSIDE FOOT. IF YOU PLAY DEFENCE, PRACTICE SKATING FORWARD AT TOP SPEED, JUMP TURN TO SKATE BACKWARDS, AND FOLLOW THAT WITH A JUMP TO THE FORWARD DRIVE AGAIN.
- (9) STRENGTHEN WEAK ANKLES BY HOPPING, TOE-AND-HEEL RAISING, AND SIMILAR FOOT EXERCISES.

Next week we'll take a look at stickhandling, to be followed by, passing, shooting, checking, playing goal, defence and forward. In the write-ups I am assuming that you are a left-hand shot, if you are right-hand then apply opposite directions.

That's 'thirty' for this week, and remember, "IF YOU CAN'T TAKE PART IN SPORT, BE A GOOD ONE ANYWAY".

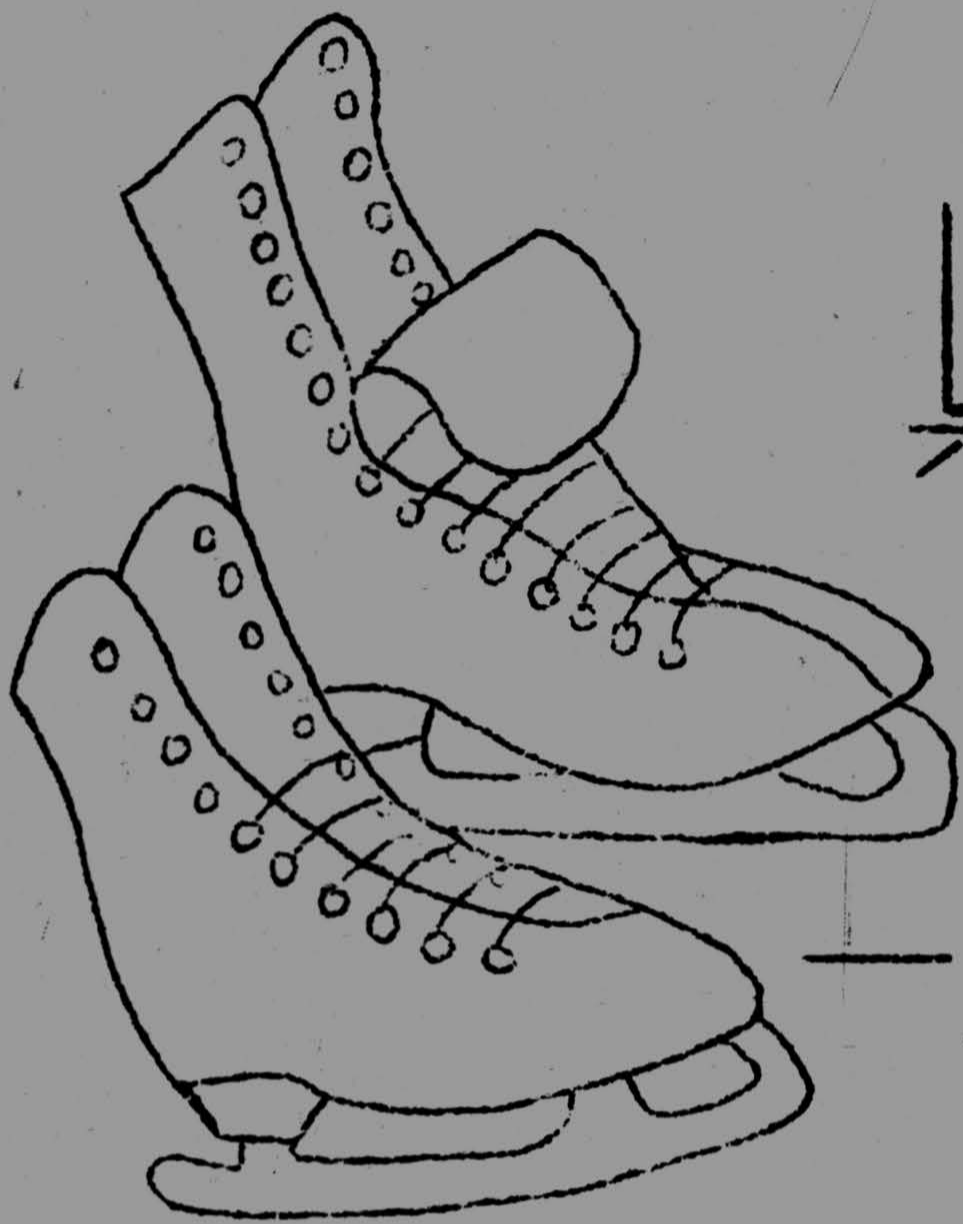


The first idea of the paper is to provide a service to our community, therefore your club, church and Group notices are most welcome and help to make the paper all the more interesting and informative.

His Excellency made many new young friends as he sat chatting to the children in the midst of a very busy schedule, posing for photographs and signing many of their Confirmation souvenirs. When asked if he wasn't tired of signing his name, he replied that he was so used to signing diplomas at the University that by now he was quite used to it.

Bishop Lagare will be returning to this area in November, when he will be visiting the Schools.
