To mark this occasion, the Secretary of State the Hon. J. LaMarsh is to visit Labrador City and Wabush on Monday, November 13, 1967 and will be accompanied by the Hon. Dr. F.W. Rowe, Hon J.R. Chalker, Hon. Dr. A. Frecker and Mr. & Mrs. A. Chatwood. During her visit, the Hon. Judy LaMarsh will attend several official functions including the unveiling of the Plaque at the Labrador City Centennial Playground at 10:40 am. followed by a tour of the Centennial Caravan in Labrador City at 11:00 am.

The Centennial Caravan, comprising of 8 - 50' trailers covers the full spectrum of Canada's development with particular emphasis on the last 100 years. Starting with a conception of the Ice Age and finishing with Canada today, you will see the railroads being pushed westward, a replica of the first sleeper car, and the Gold Rush era. You will walk through the trenches of the 1st World War, the depression of the thirties, and on into the 2nd World War with wailing sirens and exploding bombs.

During its 6 week stay on the Island of Newfoundland, 290,000 people out of a total population of approximately 500,000 visited and toured through the caravan and it was hailed as one of the most outstanding presentations of their Centennial Celebrations.

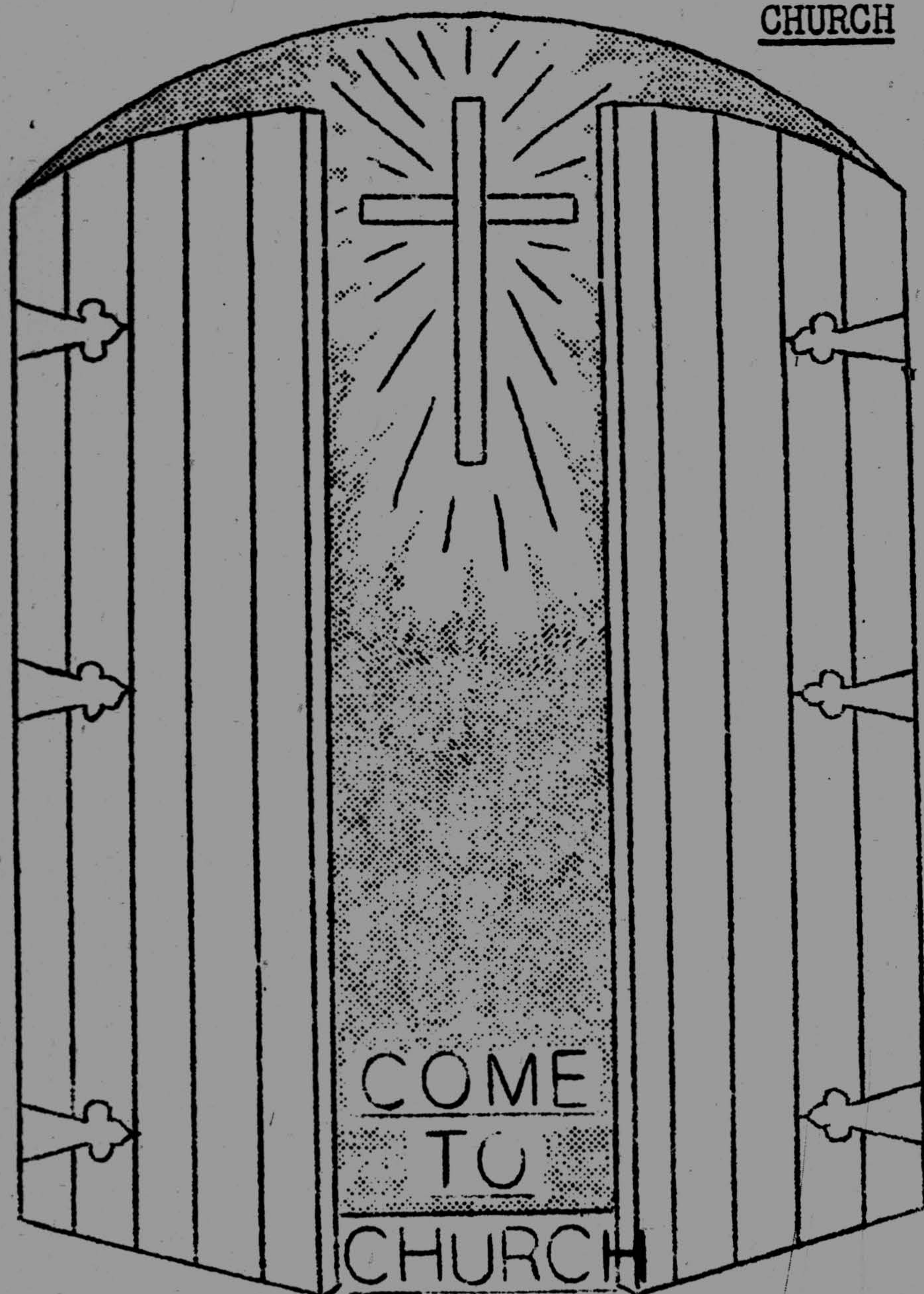

SIMPLE RECIPES TO CUT OUT AND KEEP

SCOTCH EGGS

1 lb beef sausage meat  
1 teaspoon tomato ketchup  
1 oz. plain flour,  
5 or 6 HARD BOILED eggs  
1 beaten egg  
approx. 4 tablespoons browned breadcrumbs.  
deep fat for frying.

Mix the sausage meat with the tomato ketchup. Divide into 5 or 6 portions. Form into rounds on a floured board, shell hard boiled eggs and roll in flour and stand on the sausage rounds. Then work the sausage meat evenly and smoothly over the eggs. Coat with beaten egg and toss in breadcrumbs. Place in frying basket, lower carefully into hot fat, fry till golden brown and cooked, about 5 minutes. Drain on crumpled kitchen paper. Serve hot with vegetables or cold cut in half with salad. Serves five or six.

A LETTER FROM THE MINISTER OF EDUCATION

The Honourable the Premier has asked me to rectify an inaccuracy, which  
he believes has crept into one report of his recent reply to a query regarding  
the Government's Scholarship policy in relation to free tuition at the  
University. The actual situation is as follows.

Originally, University Government Scholarships were worth \$600.00.  
Several years ago they were raised to \$800.00, and out of this amount  
students were expected to pay their tuition amounting to some \$400.00.  
Students who did not win scholarships were given free tuition.

At the beginning of the present academic year, in fact on September 7th,  
the Government decided that scholarship winners would be given a scholarship  
to the value of \$600.00 and in addition to this that they would receive free  
tuition. Thus all winners of these particular scholarships, classified as  
Electoral and Centenary of Responsible Government Scholarships, will be \$200.00  
better off than was previously the case.

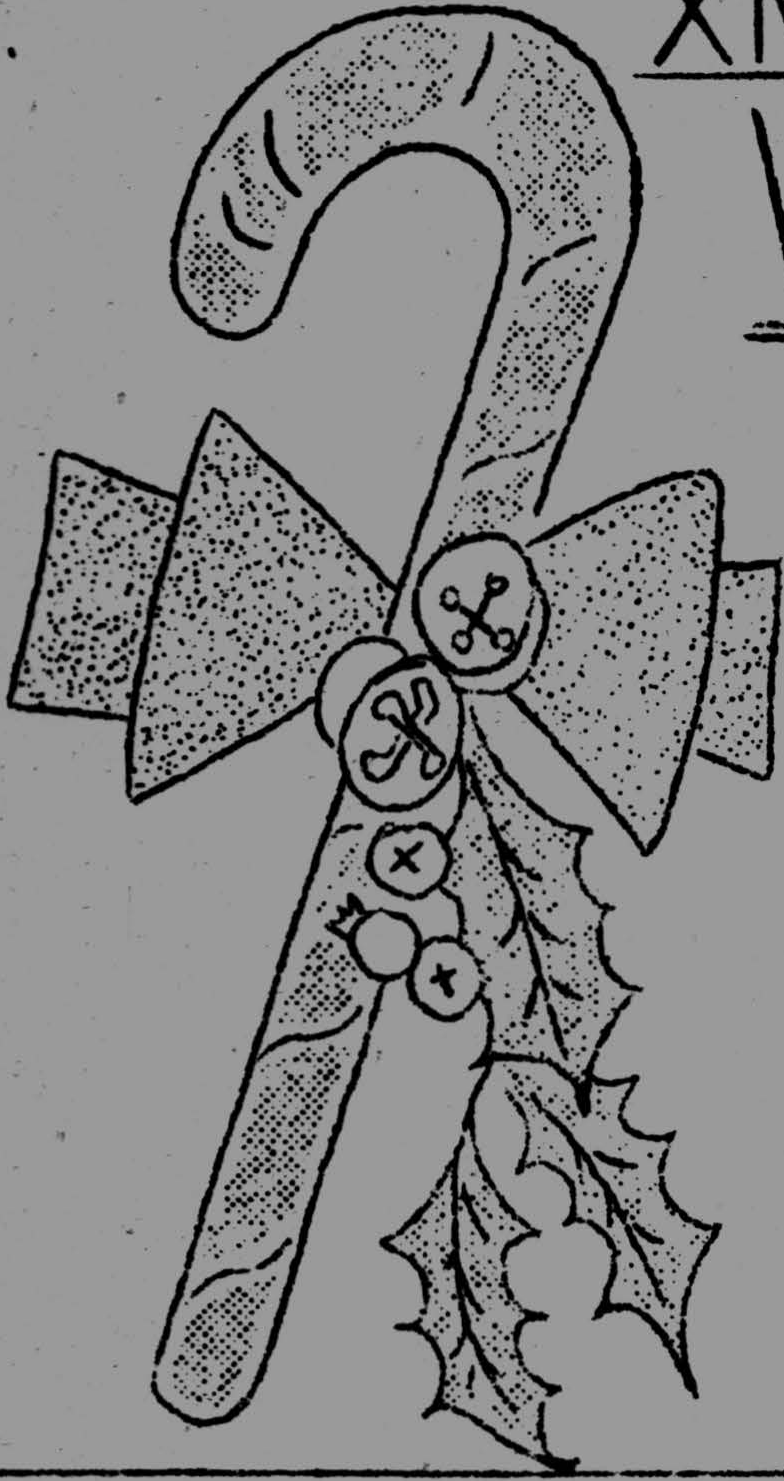

A REPORT ON THE MEETING OF AMALGAMATED SCHOOL BOARDS HELD IN ST. JOHN'S OCT. 25, 26, 27/67

**THEME:** The Re-organization of Education in Newfoundland as outlined in the Royal Commission Report on Education, Volume I.

Local delegates missed the mornign session October 25, due to transportation difficulties, including the opening address by the Honourable Dr. F. W. Rowe.

Press reports indicate that the minister and government look favourably on a consolidation of schools, and recognizes a need for the reorganization of the Department of Education. Most significant in his address was that he felt it would be irresponsible for the government to make any decisions on Volume I which deals primarily with the reorganization of the Department of Education and School Boards, without considering the contents of Volume II which deals primarily with financing.

The Association of Amalgamated School Boards who represent 17% of the School population of Newfoundland, after w days of discussion adopted the Commission Report with a recommendation to government: for an immediate start on the reorganization of the department of Education, as outlined in Chapter IV.

Factors leading to this discussion may be outlined as follows:-

Discussions on the recommendations of the Royal Commission Report which pointed uo the assistance a reorganized department could give to School Boards

2. The announced intention of the three major Protestant denominations to integrate their school services both at the school board and departmental level. They have recently approached both the Roman Catholic and Pentecostal Groups to participate in talks toward total integration.
3. Consolidation and centralization of schools in the last school year reduced the total number of schools by 105.

The Case for the reorganization of the department is quite obvious, one administration to replace the five administrations presently constituted would obviously eliminate the present duplication of services and make possible the establishment of specialist departments on curriculum, administration, school design, and construction, examination boards, to name only a few.

It should be pointed out that without reorganization at the department, the remainder of therecommendation will be extremely difficult if not impossible to institute.

The consolidation and centralization of schools and School Boards could be put on a planned basis with professional assistance.

The announced intention of the Anglican, United Church, and Salvation Army to integrate school services will in any case streamline and destroy the department as it is now constituted.

1. Mr. Acreman of the United Church felt that integration by three churches would be a poor choice to the functional department as proposed by the Royal Commission.
2. Mr. Roebottom, Anglican Superintendent, pointed out that the present trend to amalgamation and consolidation would in the near future leave those groups involved with a department and no schools to superintend.
3. Dr. Cooper of Memorial University felt the Commission Report did not go far enough
  - a. School Boards should be consolidated in law.
  - b. Interdenominational School Boards are unsatisfactory, and members should be elected.
  - c. Money spent paying students to go to University who drive to school in Mustangs is wasted, and would be better spent on elementary education.
  - d. Mr. Robbins - President of the N.T.A. pointed out the overcrowding of most Newfoundland Schools and lack of facilities in St. John's, as well as elsewhere as being the prime reason for low standards obtained in Newfoundland Schools. Only 25% of all Newfoundland students in Newfoundland in Grade II in 1952 passed Grade XI in 1963.

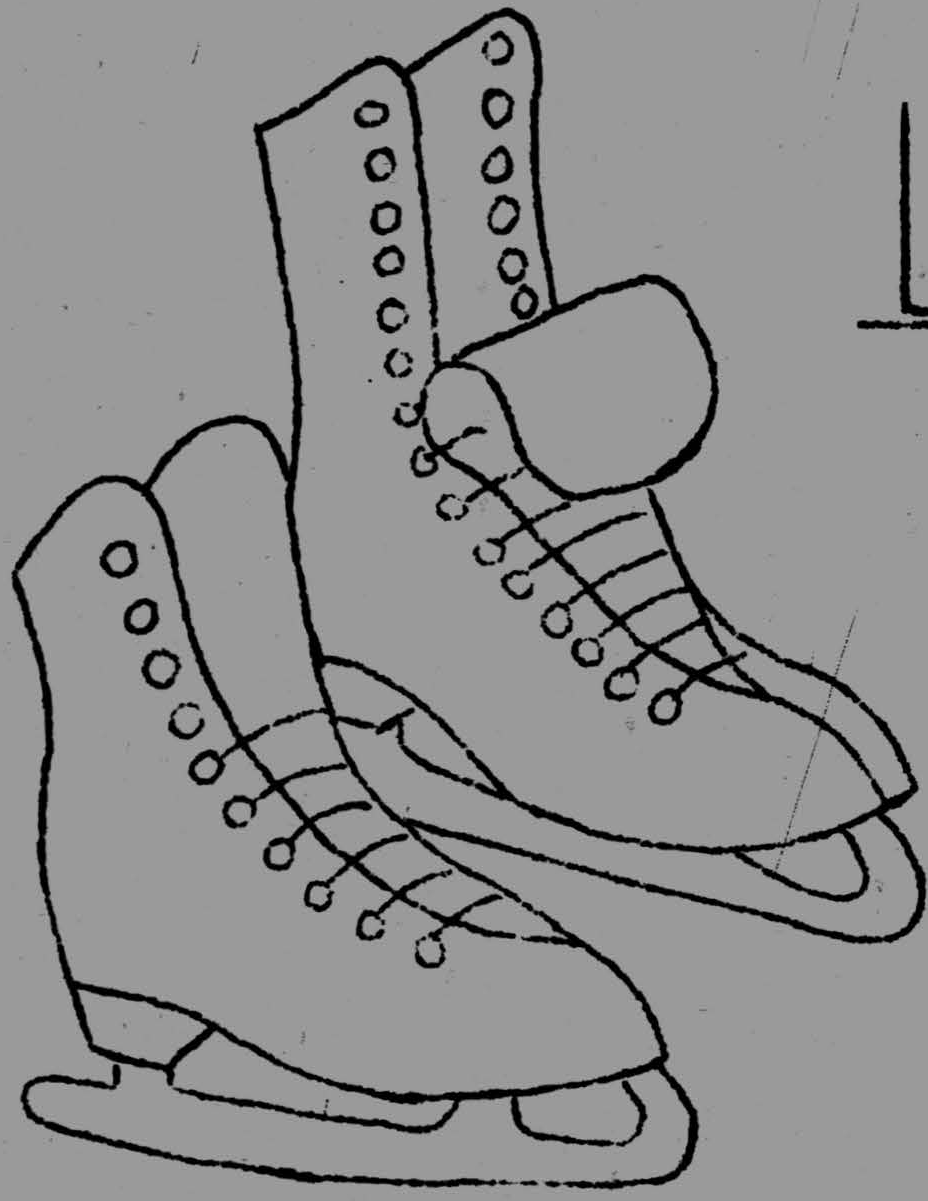

# SPORTS BEAM BY "DON"

When you listen to the power of some of the veteren fighters it really makes you wonder whether a guy like Clay could ever have become champion in another era.

In the minor hockey section this week we deal for a while with PASSING. To be a proficient passer, you need to know how.....

- (a) To make a pass forehand and backhand.
- (b) To receive a pass forehand and backhand.
- (c) When to pass.

#### POINTERS ON PASSING ARE:

- (1) Use a smooth sweeping motion
- (2) Release the puck from the toe of the blade
- (3) Follow through with the blade flat on the ice.
- (4) Keep your head up, looking at your target, never passing blindly.
- (5) When receiving a pass draw back the blade of your stick, "giving" with the puck at the moment of contact.
- (6) Tilt the blade over the puck to trap it when taking a pass.
- (7) Never slap or bang a pass.

You will want to use a pass to get around an opponent moving to check you. The fastest way to advance the puck is by a pass to a team-mate breaking out ahead. Always give it to the "head man" you will need to pass often when clearing out of your own end. When being checked you must be careful not to pass blindly. Finally in your opponents end, use a pass to a teammate in a better scoring position than you are. At rare times, when right in on the goal-keeper, a passing to a teammate flanking you will leave the latter an open net, for a goal.

Next week a look at the methods to use when shooting the puck.

The various hockey teams in both the A & B leagues have been practicing hard the past couple of weeks and working themselves into shape for the coming hockey season. To date it looks like three teams in the "A" league with Bill Hogan's Braves looking great, and a good bet to skate off with top honours this year. The Wabush team are once again experiencing coaching problems but you can rest assured that they will be icing a competetive team, come opening game. Last years champions the Royals are rounding into shape with quite a few untried but experienced players attending practices. They hung back all last year until the play-offs, so don't count them out.

A little early yet to comment on the "B" league, suffice to say the Indians are practicing 5 hours a week. There will be four teams in competition and after last year's play-off, it is anybody's guess who will be victorious.
