- LABRADOR CITY STUDENTS TO VISIT EUROPE -

Approximately twenty-five high-school students from the Labrador City Collegiate will have a chance to see Europe this summer and learn to speak French to their compatriots in this area. They will partake in a summer programme offered at the Ecole Supérieure de Commerce in Neuchâtel, Switzerland, where they will board in pairs with a French-speaking family. While there they will have to converse in French in order to make themselves understood.

Leaving Labrador City on July 11, they will fly on E.P.A. to Gander, where they will board an Air Canada flight to London. After a two-day sojourn in London, during which time they may visit such famous buildings as Buckingham Palace, a D.E.A. flight will carry them on to Geneva, whence they travel to Neuchâtel by train where they begin studies for four weeks. August tenth to eighteenth will be a recess period, when they will first of all journey to Zurich by train, where they will board a plane to Hamburg. Four days are to be spent in and around Hamburg, an important European seaport, and four more days in Frankfurt, a small town situated in the Black Forest near the River Danube. Then back to Neuchâtel for three more weeks of intensive study. The students will be accommodated in London, Hamburg and Frankfurt in Youth hostels, which are very generous in their services.

The stay in Neuchâtel will consist of French lessons six days a week at four per morning; in the afternoons they will participate in excursions around Neuchâtel, to castles, mountains, and industrial centres; or they can take courses in art, painting, and art history at an art school. Sports are also offered one afternoon per week. In the evenings the students can attend cultural activities in Neuchâtel. On the week-ends the students may go on more excursions around Switzerland, the area being well-connected with fast and efficient railway lines. They will return to Canada on September 5th, 1968.

Of course, the cost involved in such a project will be quite high, even by travelling on the group plan. The return air fare to Gander is \$81, while that from Gander to Geneva is \$290, this price covering the flights from Zurich to Hamburg and Frankfurt as well. Accommodation is expected to be in the range of \$200, while other transportation fares by train should be in the vicinity of \$20. The school fees, themselves, will cost a modest \$55. The organizer of the project, Miss S. Journeaux, the French teacher at the Collegiate, has sent out requests for financial support to quite a number of organizations, and most of the students are doing everything possible to make ends meet. Babysitting, cutting Christmas trees and operating the pomalift at the Ski Lodge are but a few of the many activities that will have been carried out by the end of the school year. It is certain that if everyone does his or her share, there should be no reason why this trip should not turn out to be a wonderful adventure.

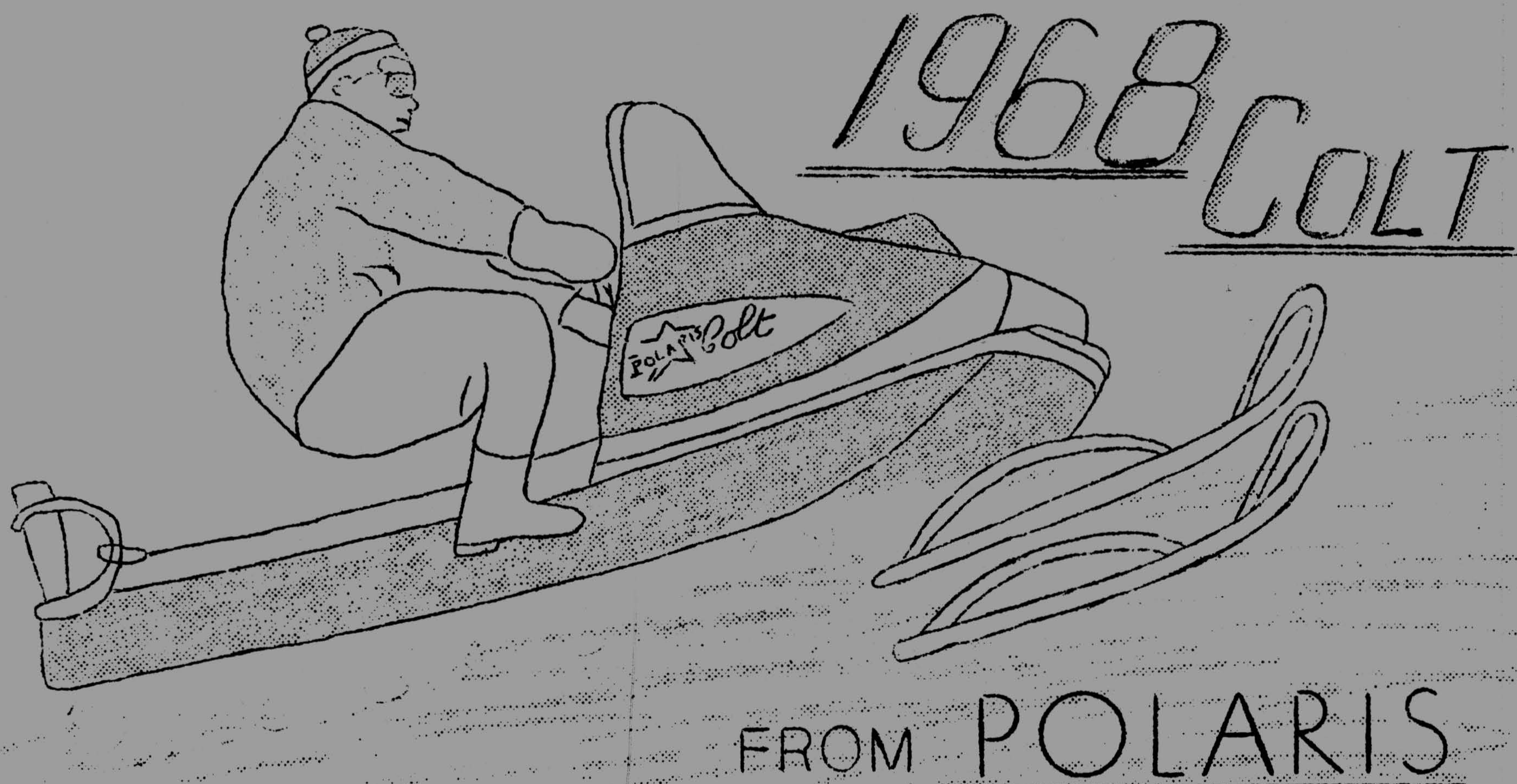

RESOURCES BRANCH NEWS RELEASE

Although the 1968 caribou hunting season is more than nine months away, resident hunters were urged to-day by the Provincial Wildlife Service to apply for their caribou licences early.

Last year many residents made application for licences just prior to the open season and were dissappointed since licence quotas had been filled months before the opening date.

The four hunting areas on the Island will probably remain the same as in previous years with licences issued on a first come first served basis. To ensure that they will receive a licence, resident hunters should mail an application form and licence fee to the Department of Mines, Agriculture and Resources without delay.

The licence quota for each hunting area will be determined following the annual spring census.

- SIMPLE RECIPES TO CUT OUT AND KEEP -
BAKED STUFFED APPLES

- 2 lb. even-sized apples
- Sultanas and chopped dates
- Brown sugar
- ½ oz. margarine or butter
- Water.

METHOD

Wipe and core the apples, but do not peel them. Cut each across with a sharp knife, scoop out a little apple, fill the cavity with a mixture of dried fruit and sugar and replace top. Put on a greased baking tin or in a shallow heat-proof dish, surrounded by a very little water. Cover the apples with greaseproof paper and bake in a moderate oven (350°F.,

for about ¾ hour.)Some large apples may require about 1 hour's baking, but avoid over-cooking, or the skins will burst and the apples will lose their shape.) Serve with custard or cream, or sprinkled with caster sugar.

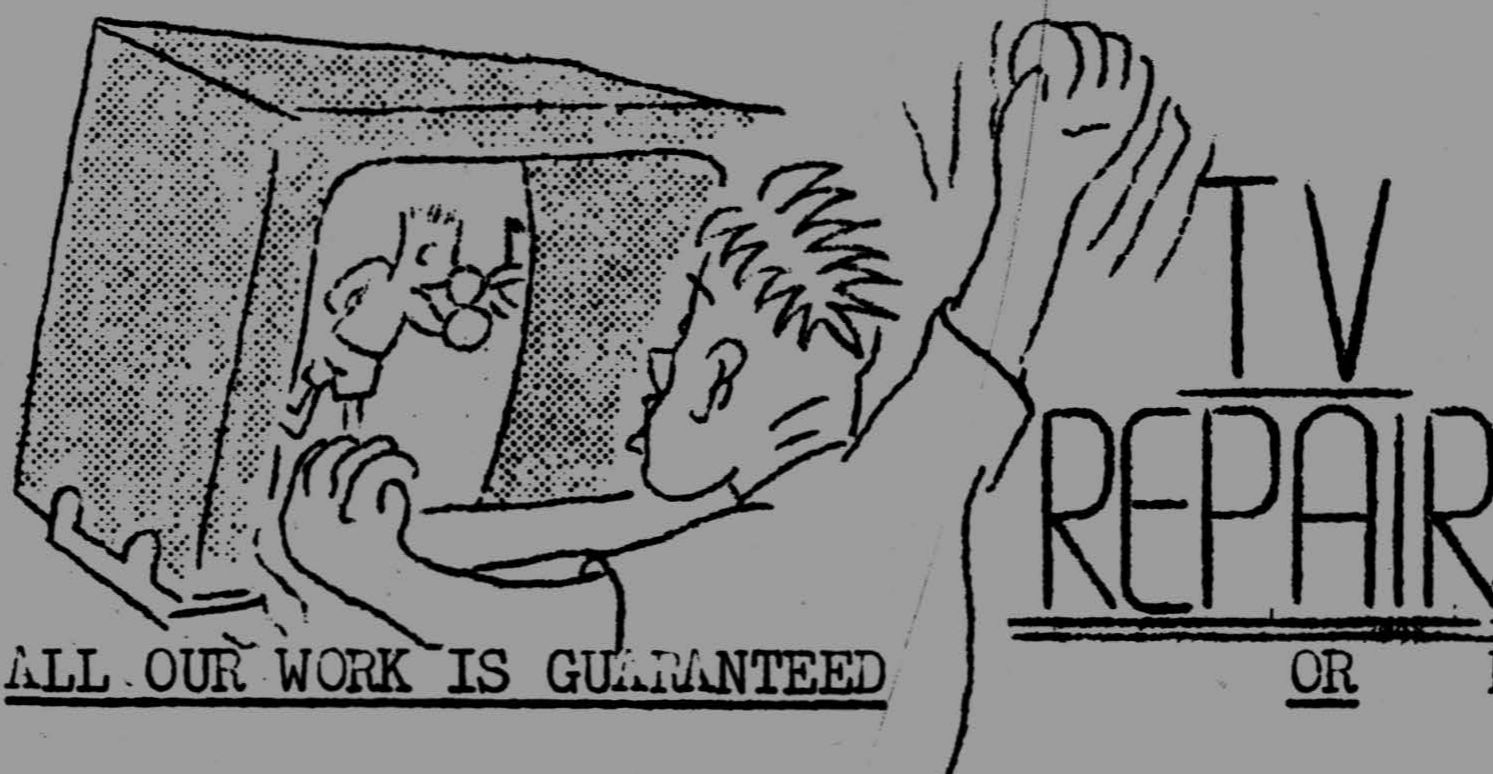

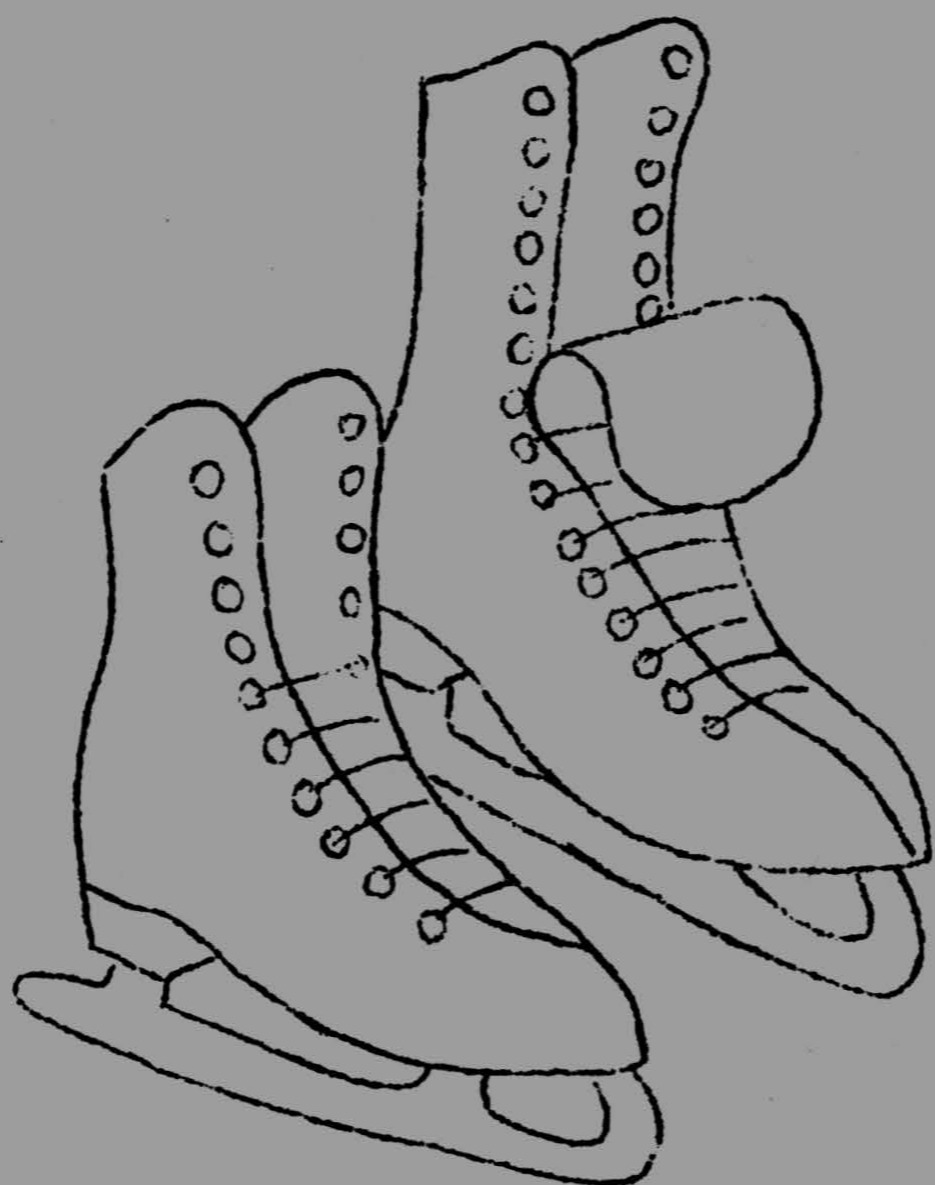

CANADIAN MINOR HOCKEY WEEK

This week is being celebrated as Minor Hockey Week across Canada. Locally we shall be celebrating the week during our Winter Carnival. This is the time of the year to remind people, "Don't send- take your boy to the arena- then stay and watch him play". It is with this in mind that I dedicate this week's Sports beat to the men and women who make minor hockey possible in Labrador City.

The local Minor Hockey Association is made up of enthusiastic, hard-working volunteers whose efforts on behalf of local children cannot be measured in hours or dollars. They make it possible for over 200 of our boys to take part in Canada's national sport.

More than that, they contribute towards the development not only of stronger bodies, but of healthier minds and better citizens. They keep the youngsters engaged in healthy, supervised sport rather than wasting leisure time. "To keep a boy out of hot water-put him on ice".

As we pause long enough to pay tribute to our Minor Hockey workers, similar recognition of the thousands of minor hockey volunteers in Canada is taking place right across the country.

Minor Hockey Week in Canada started on January 20th, and is one of many worthwhile projects of the Canadian Amateur Hockey Association. Although the recognition of the volunteer organizers, coaches, managers, car drivers and fund raisers is one of the most important objectives of Minor Hockey Week, it is not the only one. Another is to, "Focus attention on minor hockey" and this I gladly do.

Minor hockey is an important part of our community life. It is an integral part of the fabric of our community and a major part of the sporting activities of our municipality. It is beneficial to the youngsters and to the whole of the community. In addition to building stronger bodies, minor hockey contributes to the development of better citizens while keeping them occupied in a worthwhile endeavour- right at an age when many of them might easily be engaged in activities less acceptable to society.

Some of the statistics issued by the Minor Hockey Committee of the C.A.H.A. indicate yet another reason for supporting minor hockey week. The C.A.H.A. committee points out that minor hockey is an activity that not only works for the youngsters, but provides work for many adults, as it turns back to the Canadian economy more than 5 MILLION DOLLARS EVERY YEAR.

The cost of providing sweaters, skates and other equipment, the cost of ice rentals, transportation, meals after games, injury insurance are items that soon run up into many dollars per player, and hundreds of dollars per team. Consider that there are more than 10,000 minor hockey teams in Canada, and it is not very difficult to visualize millions of dollars being spent to keep the operation going. Thus everyone benefits from minor hockey - truly it IS good for the community.

It is with these factors in mind that I urge all residents of Labrador City to support minor hockey - not only this week but in the weeks, months and years to come.

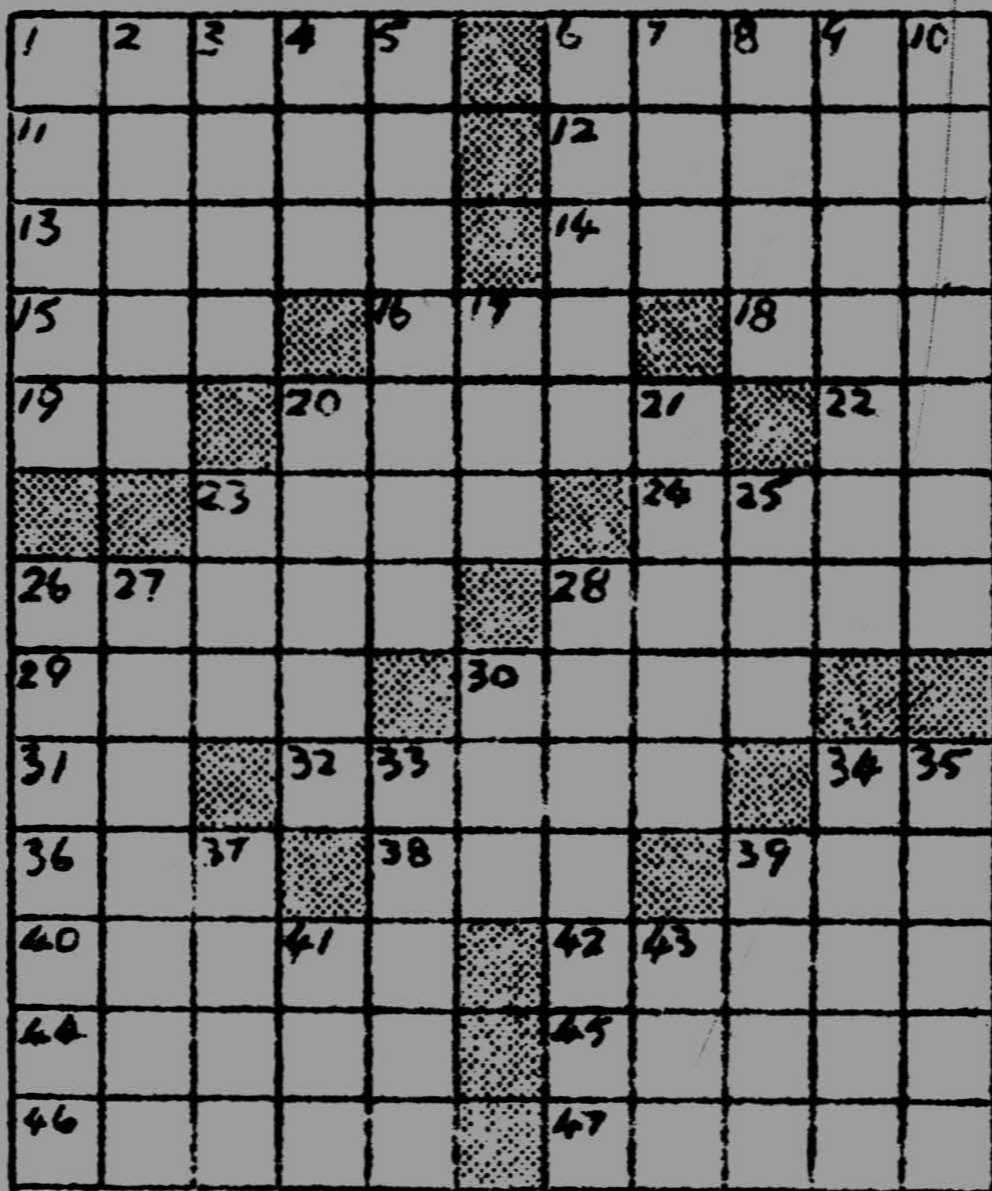
