Over two years ago the Premier announced the Government's intention to pay allowances or salaries to Newfoundland students attending our University. He stated that this program would be introduced in stages, starting with fourth year students and over, and gradually bringing it down until all students were included.

Last year, salary allowances were paid to 600 students in their fourth, fifth, and sixth years, at the University. Students whose homes are outside the St. John's area were paid \$100 a month and those in the St. John's area \$50 a month. The total amount paid this way was about \$350,000.

Starting last September we began to pay allowances to \$30 third year students and we will pay to them this year \$540,000. Thus, in the present year we shall have paid out to students in the third year and higher, a total of just under one million dollars.

It was the Government's hope that next year we would be able to extend this programme to include all the second year students at the University, but it appears very doubtful that we shall be able to do this. The reasons for this are not at all mysterious. As everyone knows, financial restrictions are being imposed all over the world on Governments at every level, and indeed on any kind of activity involving money. Newfoundland is no exception and there is no doubt in our minds that just as in all the other Provinces of Canada, this coming year, we shall have to defer some of the things that we hoped to do.

But there is another reason, a much happier one - Last year the Government approved for the University a budget of over 7 million dollars. Yesterday, the Government approved for the coming year for the University a budget of over 12 million dollars more than 5 million dollars above last year's budget. There are several reasons for this tremendous increase. First of all, during the past year or so, the size of the University plant itself has more than doubled and this involves far more maintenance and far more staff, making it possible, of course, for the University to accommodate many more students. Then, too, the Government are assisting the University to establish a School of Engineering and a School of Medicine. Putting these and other things together, the University has to spend in the coming year, over 5 million dollars more than it did last year.

Nobody regrets this, indeed every Newfoundlander is proud of it, but coming in the time of the tightest money in North America since the Great Depression, it is putting a tremendous strain on Newfoundland's finances, and this figure that I have mentioned does not include what we will pay for free tuition for all students who qualify at the University. We estimate that this coming year alone, that figure will amount to well over \$2,000,000.

The Government will continue to pay this free tuition for all students who qualify and the Government will continue to pay the salaries to third, fourth, fifth, sixth and seventh year students but, as I said earlier, it seems most unlikely that we shall be able to extend this programme down to the second year students next September. This raises the question as to how such students, whose families lack the necessary money to help them to go to University can do so, of course some of these second year students will qualify for the many Government and other scholarships available, but that still leaves a great many others. Fortunately, there is a way out and that is through the Canada Student Loan Plan.

Under this plan any student who needs the money may borrow up to \$1,000 for any one year and up to \$5,000 for their entire University period.

While he is at University and for six months after he leaves University he does not have to pay any interest on this money for that is done by the Government of Canada. When he starts work after leaving University he begins to pay back his loan in installments over a period of up to as much as nine or ten years, so that no great hardship is imposed on him.

Many Newfoundland students, especially those attending University outside Newfoundland have borrowed under this plan, but in no year since it was started four years ago have our students borrowed anything like all the money available to them. In fact over the four year period our students have borrowed only about half of the money allocated to Newfoundland. Thus there will be no difficulty for second year students needing money to borrow for that one year. Once they get through the second year they will, of course, qualify for the salaries paid to the third year students and above.

In other words in spite of the disappointment that this announcement will give to some of our students we are confident that every student who wishes to go to University for his second year next year will be able to do so one way or another.

I am making this announcement now so that all students who are involved will have ample time to make their plans for next September.

HISTORICAL DEVELOPMENT OF ADOPTION IN NEWFOUNDLAND

Until 1940 there was no adoption legislation in this province, and therefore no adequate protection for that class of children who needed protection most. As a rule, therefore, in the absence of proper legal arrangements, such children were passed around from one person to another, the subjects of sympathy or charity.

Before specific legislation was passed a form of contract had been developed and was in fairly wide use. It was better than nothing at all, in that it named definite obligations to be carried out by the adopting parents, and the sight of the "papers" was always a reminder that these obligations were in some way real. However, the contract offered doubtful security to the child, inasmuch as the adopting parents under certain circumstances could be made to surrender the child and the original contract thus rendered null and void.

The Adoption Act of 1940 was the first decisive step toward real protection for the children concerned. It was not, however, sufficiently linked to the main body of existing welfare legislation, and further, it contained certain restrictions which were later considered to militate against sound adoption practices.

In the Welfare of Children Act, 1944, these defects were remedied. All adoptions now have to be referred to the Director of Child Welfare, and no adoption is valid without his formal consent. The legislation contains those features which are essential toward safeguarding the interests of both the adoptive parents and the child. The Adoption Order makes the child "to all intents and purposes, the child of the adopting parent or parents".

During the period 1944-64 no major changes were made in adoption legislation. However, on June 10th 1964 Part V of the Welfare of Children Act, Chapter 60 of the Revised Statutes of Newfoundland, 1952, was repealed and its provisions reenacted in the Adoption of Children Act.

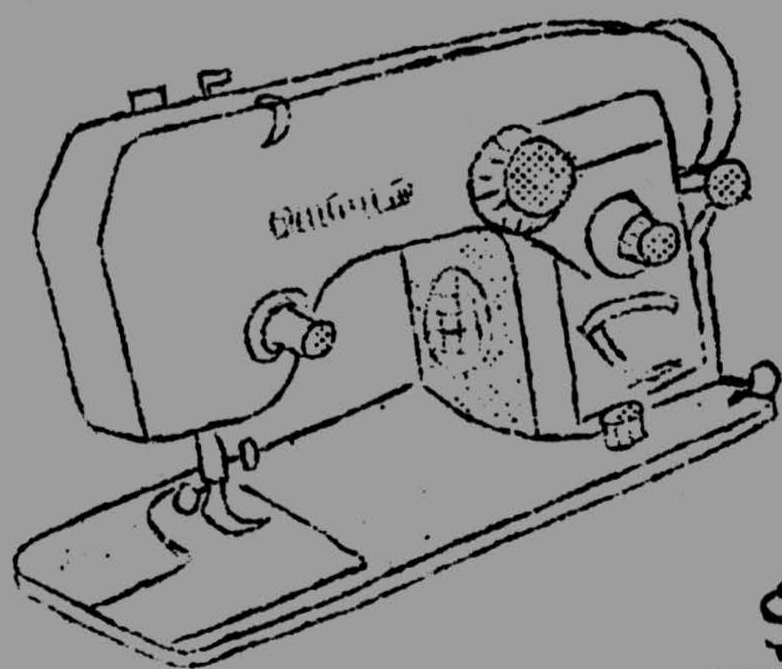
The new act contains several changes, the most important being the change in the probationary period from one year to six months.

During the period 1944 - 67 there has been an increasing interest in adoptions in Newfoundland. The number of children adopted between 1946 - 1965 is shown in the following table:

1951 to 1955	621
1956 to 1960	740
1961 to 1965	1111

During 1966 and 1967 five hundred and eighty-seven adoptions were finalized.

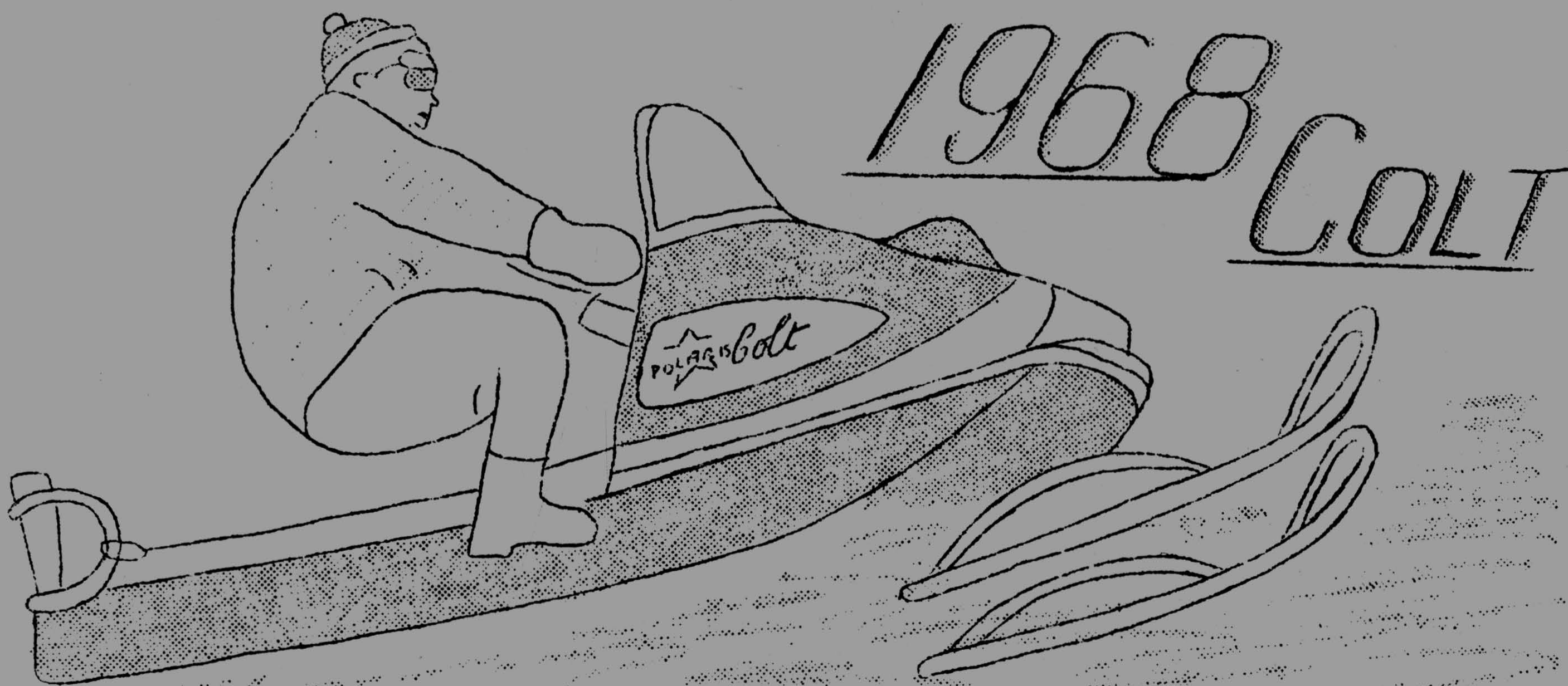

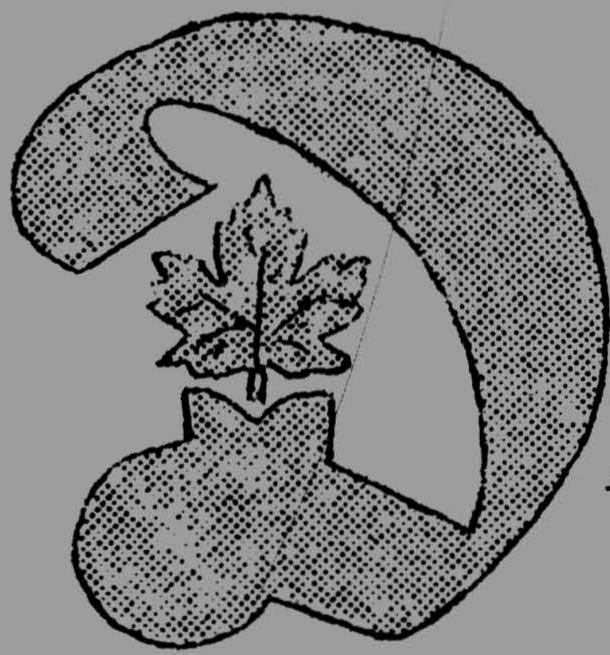

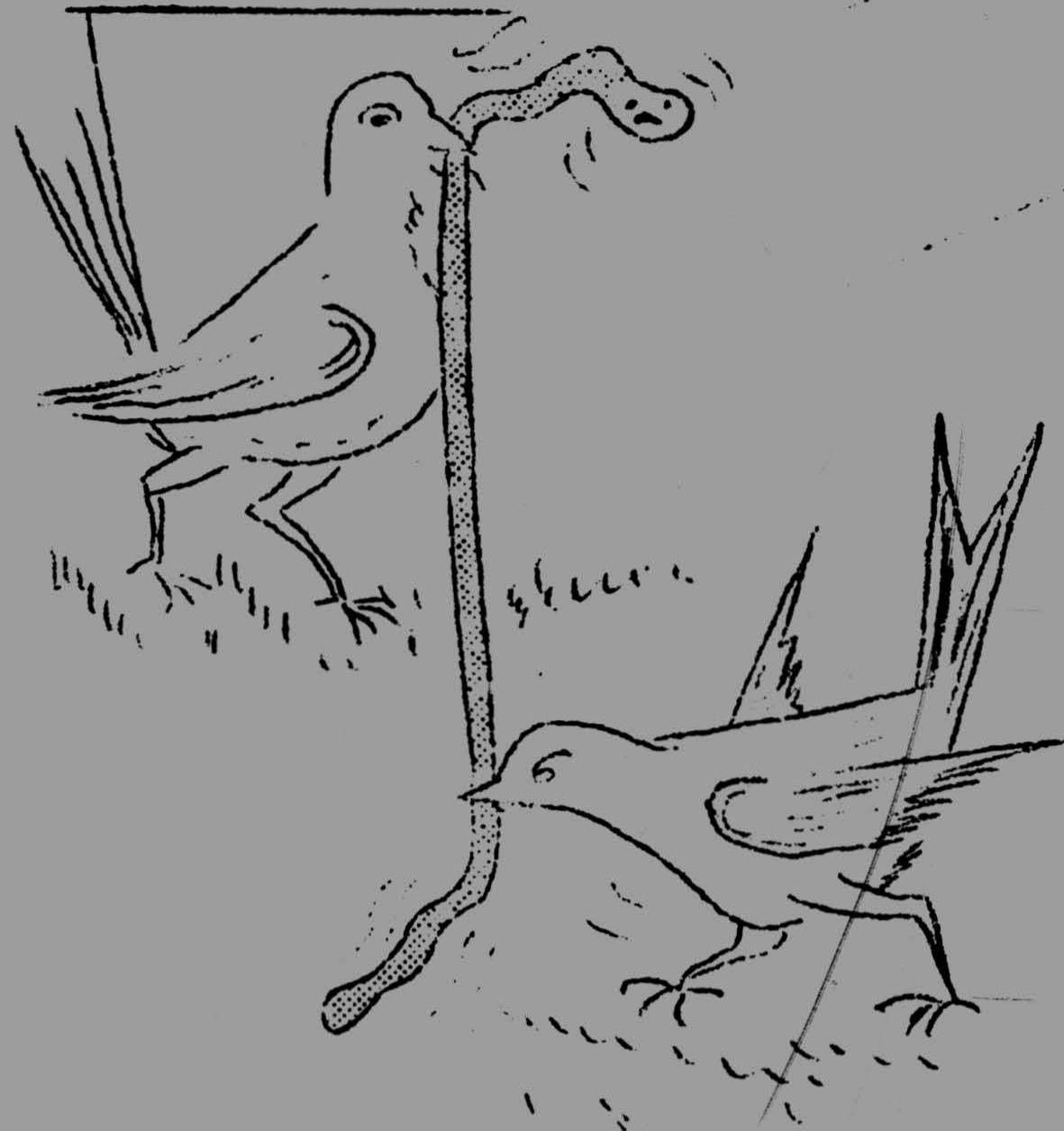
