- COURT NEWS -

A Labrador City man appeared in Magistrate's Court on seven charges of theft, two charges over the amount of \$50.00 and the other 5 under this amount. He was fined \$125.00 and given a 2-year suspended sentence. He was also ordered to sign a bond and to pay compensation.

A resident of Labrador City was convicted on a charge of being in possession of money, knowing that it was obtained by the committing of a crime. He was fined \$25.

A Labrador City man was convicted of unlawfully operating a motor vehicle while his ability was impaired by alcohol. He was fined \$200.00 and prohibited from driving a vehicle on a highway in Canada for six months.

Two residents of Labrador City were charged with causing a disturbance in or near a public place. They pleaded guilty to the charge and were fined \$50.00 each.

Twenty-three residents of Wabush and Labrador City were fined for parking violations: 9 were fined for failing to stop at a stop sign, 5 were fined for backing their vehicle when it was unsafe to do so, while 9 persons were fined for exceeding the speed limit.

A Wabush resident was convicted of unlawfully conducting a lottery and fined \$40.00. The articles involved were confiscated by the Crown.

A Wabush resident appeared on a charge of taking a motor vehicle without the consent of the owner and on a charge of committing a breach of recognizance. He was fined \$200.00 or 60 days on the first charge and \$100.00 or 30 days on the second. He was committed in lieu of fine on both charges.

A Churchill Falls man was convicted on a charge of theft under \$50.00. He was given a suspended sentence and ordered to sign a two-year bond.

A Labrador City man was fined \$50.00 and ordered to pay compensation for failing to stop his vehicle after being involved in an accident.

A resident of Labrador City received a six month suspended sentence on a charge of common assault.

Two residents of Labrador City were fined \$10.00 each for violations of the anti-litter regulations.

A Labrador City man was convicted of theft under the amount of \$50.00. He was fined \$75.00 or three months in jail.

A Labrador City man was charged with committing common assault at Wabush. Upon conviction, he was fined \$50.00 and ordered to pay compensation.

QUESTIONS AND ANSWERS ABOUT ADOPTION

(Second of Three Articles)

Adoption is for many families the way by which they may have children of their own. It is for many children the only way by which they may have parents of their own--the birthright of every child. The decision to adopt a child may be the most momentous one a couple will ever make.

Having made the decision, however, prospective adopting parents have many questions about adoption and the purpose of this article is to attempt to provide answers to some of the questions that are most frequently asked:

WHAT IS ADOPTION? Adoption is taking a child as your own. The general steps are application for a child, placement and supervision, and application for an adoption order.

WHO CAN BE ADOPTED? Children of all ages who are legally free for adoption. Care is given to procure the appropriate legal consents before a child is offered for adoption. Some handicapped children are available.

IS THERE A FEE FOR ADOPTION SERVICES? There is absolutely no charge whatever involved

MUST WE OWN OUR OWN HOME? No. Your home, whether it is a house or apartment, whether you own it or rent it, must be adequate for your family.

MUST WE BE IN A HIGH INCOME BRACKET? No. All that is required is that you have a steady income sufficient to cover your family budget and to provide for the needs of a growing child.

MUST WE BE IN A PARTICULAR AGE GROUP? There are no rigid age limits. You need to be young enough in years to care for a child until he grows up. Older children are available for older parents.

IS OUR HEALTH AN IMPORTANT FACTOR? For the protection of both you and the child, a statement from your family doctor regarding your general health is required.

DO WE HAVE TO BE OF THE SAME RELIGIOUS PERSUASION AS THE CHILD? Your application will be considered even if you are of a different religious persuasion from that of the child, although every possible effort is made to place children with parents of the same religious persuasion.

TO ADOPT A CHILD ARE THERE SOME THINGS MORE IMPORTANT THAN OTHERS? There are two things that cannot be stressed too much: a good sound marriage; and a capacity to be good parents.

HOW DO WE APPLY? All adoption applications are made through the Regional Offices of the Department of Public Welfare. There is no other adoption agency in this Province.

WHAT WILL THE DEPARTMENT WANT TO KNOW? Information about your family, home occupation, finances, religion, names of three references, reason for wanting to adopt, etc:

HOW WILL THE INFORMATION BE OBTAINED? Through interviews with our Welfare Officer in your home and his office as well as by writing the references given.

WHAT HAPPENS IF OUR APPLICATION IS APPROVED? Our Welfare Officer will discuss the child selected with you and will arrange for you to see the child should you desire to do so.

HOW LONG DOES IT TAKE AFTER OUR APPLICATION IS APPROVED, BEFORE A CHILD IS PLACED? This varies with the children available and the wishes of the applicants with respect of sex, age, etc., of the child desired. Usually, the child would be placed within weeks. However, if your request is too precise it could take much longer.

HOW MUCH WILL BE TOLD ABOUT THE CHILD? You will be told whatever is known about the child's family background, health record, growth and development, experience, and personality that will add to your understanding of the child. The child's identity will not be disclosed.

DO WE HAVE TO TAKE THE CHILD THE DEPARTMENT SUGGESTS? No. The Department selects a child for you keeping in mind suitability as to age, sex, appearance and personality. You are told about the child and YOU make the decision.

HOW LONG IS IT BEFORE THE ADOPTED CHILD IS LEGALLY OURS? A period of at least six months following placement is legally required. During this period our Welfare Officer will visit your home. This provides an opportunity to assure you and the Department that this has been a satisfactory placement.

WHAT HAPPENS NEXT? When the probationary period is satisfactorily completed, you will be assisted by the Welfare Officer in making application to the Court for an Order of Adoption.

WHAT PAPERS CAN WE GET AFTER THE ADOPTION IS COMPLETED? Upon completion of the Adoption Order the birth record of the child is changed to the new name of the child and a birth certificate may be obtained from the Division of Vital Statistics, Department of Health, St. John's for a fee of two dollars per copy. A baptismal certificate and a copy of the Adoption Order may be also obtained upon request, from the Director of Child Welfare.

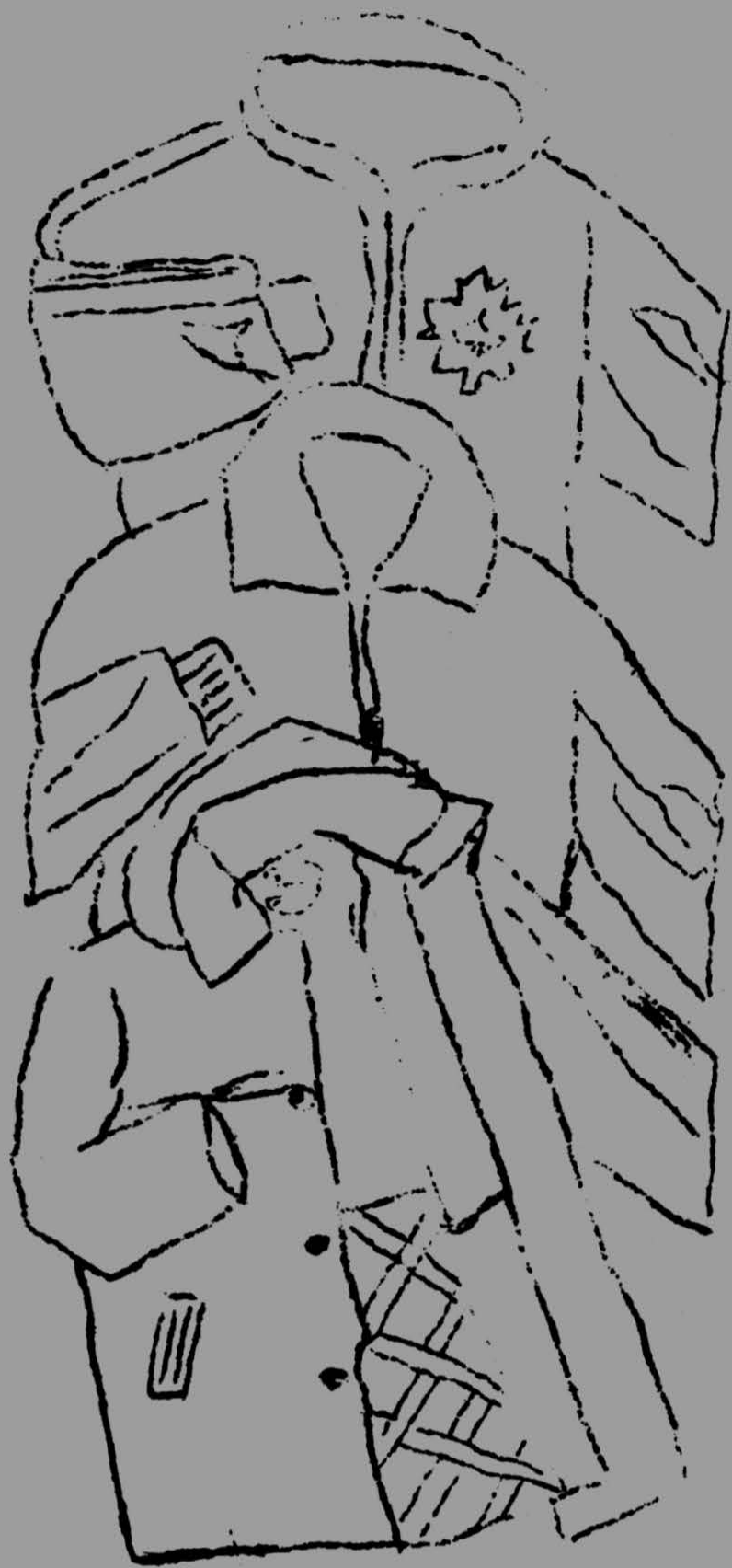
It is not possible in this article to cover every aspect of adoption. Applicants will no doubt want to ask many other questions of their own and their district Welfare Officer will be very pleased to arrange interviews to meet them and answer their questions.

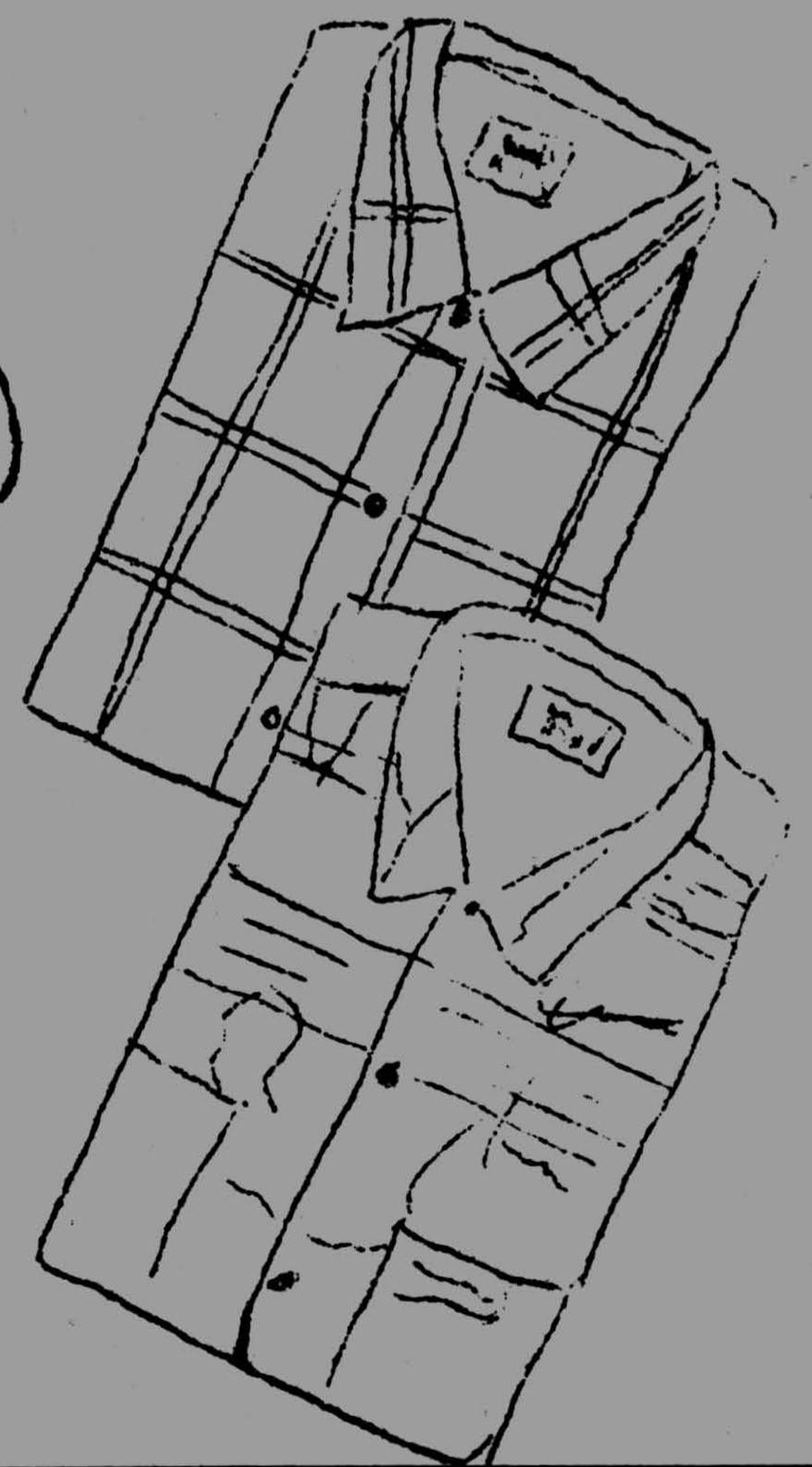

BADMINTON TEAM RETURNS VICTORIOUS

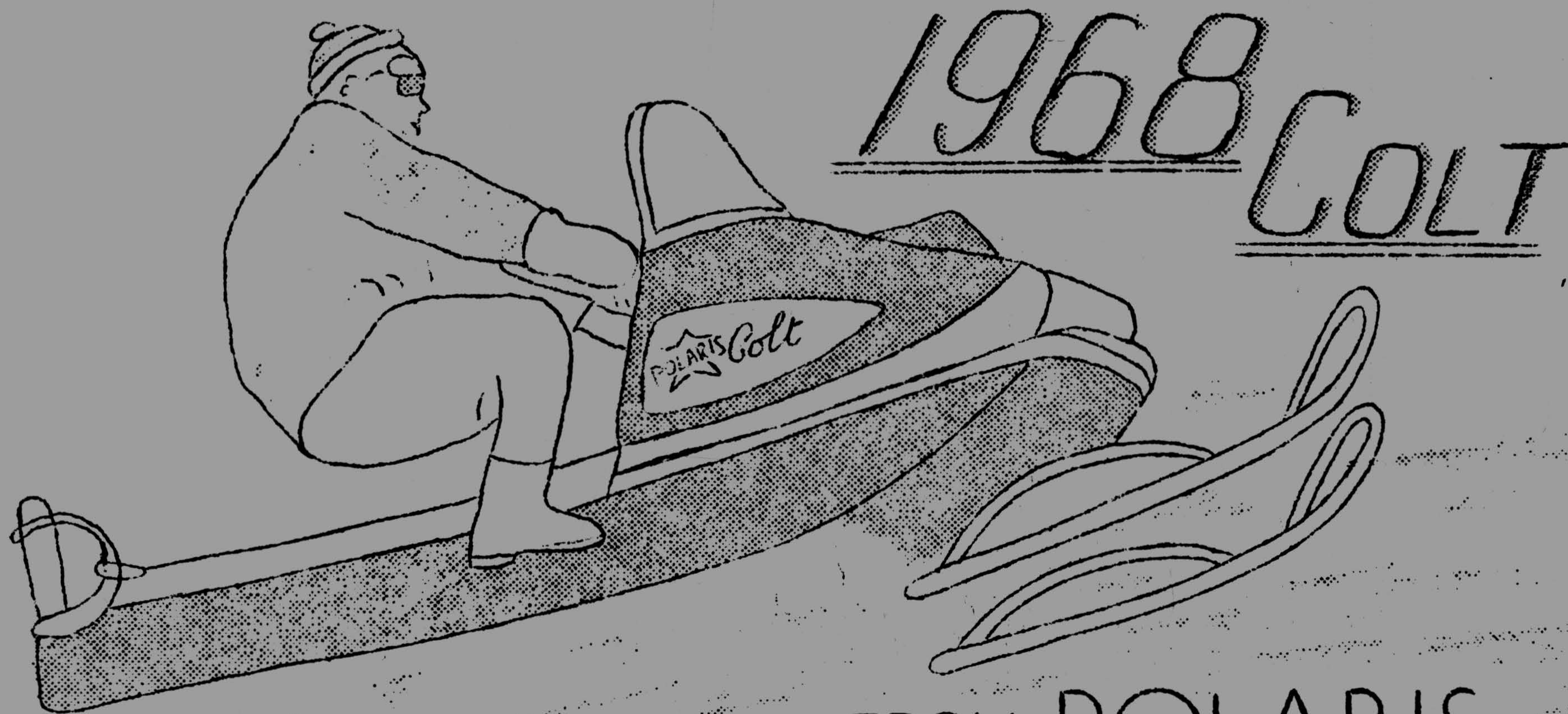
This past weekend eleven members of the local Badminton club were hosts at a tournament in Seven Islands of the Acadian Club.

EVENING COURSES FOR CREDIT - PRELIMINARY SURVEY

GENERAL INFORMATION: The M.U.N. Alumni Association, Labrador City/Wabush Branch in conjunction with Memorial University of Nfld; plans to establish a programme of evening courses for credit towards a degree beginning Sept. 1968.

These courses will be given in the conventional manner (that is: using a local lecturer) but final examinations will be set by the University.

Classes will be held Tuesday and Thursday evening from 7:00- 8:20 pm: and from 8:30 - 9:50 pm: Lab. hours where applicable, will be arranged at a later date.

The fee for each course will be in the vicinity of \$70.00 - \$85.00, payable at the registration in September. To be eligible to register for these courses a candidate must meet the entrance requirement of the University.

As there is a minimum enrollment of 20 students required for each course, it is necessary for the Association to have some indication of local interest before making final arrangements for the various courses to be given. Therefore, if you are interested in taking any of the following courses, please call BEFORE MARCH 16th.

TENTATIVE LIST OF THE COURSES:

- ENGLISH 100: (1) Language- instruction in reading and composition
(2) Literature- an introduction to the reading of English Literature.
(3 hrs per week)
- ENGLISH 200: (prerequisite-English 100 or equivalent)
An intensive study of the chief literary kinds through selected examples, read in conjunction with major critical treatises.
(3 hrs per week)
- ENGLISH 320: (prerequisite-English 100 & 200 or equivalent)
Shakespeare-a study of the man, his works, and his times.
(3 hrs per week)
- FRENCH-100: A revision of fundamentals of grammar, practice in phonetics and spoken French, exercises in translation and elementary literary appreciation.
(3 hrs per week)
- FRENCH-200: (prerequisite-French 100 or equivalent)
Exercises in translation, a further course in spoken French, a study of texts and further steps in literary criticism
(3 hrs per week)
- FRENCH-310: (prerequisite-permission of instructor)
An audio-visual course prepared under the auspices of the French Ministry of Education (3 hrs per week)
- HISTORY 106: An introduction to History. An examination of the nature of history and the historian's approach to the study of his subject.
(3 hrs per week)
- HISTORY 322: History of Canada since 1791 (3 hrs per week)
- MATHEMATICS 101: Algebra, Analytical Geometry, and Trigonometry
(3 hrs per week)
- MATHEMATICS 250: (prerequisite Maths. 101 or equivalent)
Basic statistical methods, Frequency distributions, measures of central tendency and dispersion, time series, index numbers, correlation, curve fitting and measurement of statistical significance. (3 hrs per week)
- CHEMISTRY 100: (1) Lectures: The nature of matter, atoms, molecules, chemical bonding in compounds, weight relations in chemical reactions, changes of state, solutions, chemical equilibrium in simpler types of reactions, chemical changes as related to electrical energy. A brief discussion of the principal metals and non-metals, brief introduction to organic chemistry and other topics.
(2) Laboratory- Qualitative and quantitative experiments illustrating the principles discussed in the lectures. Parts of laboratory periods may be used for discussion of problems.
(3 hrs lectures & 3 hrs Lab per week)
- PHYSICS 101: (prerequisite-Maths. 101 which may be read concurrently)
Elementary treatment of mechanics, heat sound, light, magnetism, electricity and atomic physics. Emphasis is placed on the study of physical principles and their application in the solution of simple problems. (3 hrs. lectures & 3 hrs Lab. per week)
- GEOLOGY 101: A survey of all major topics of geology, with emphasis upon the composition, physical development and geological history of the earth. Practical work will include field trips to areas of geological interest nearby.
(3 hrs lectures & 3 hrs. practical work or seminars per week)
- EDUCATION 125: The New Math. - This course is intended for primary and elementary school teachers but might also be of interest to parents.
(3 hrs per week)

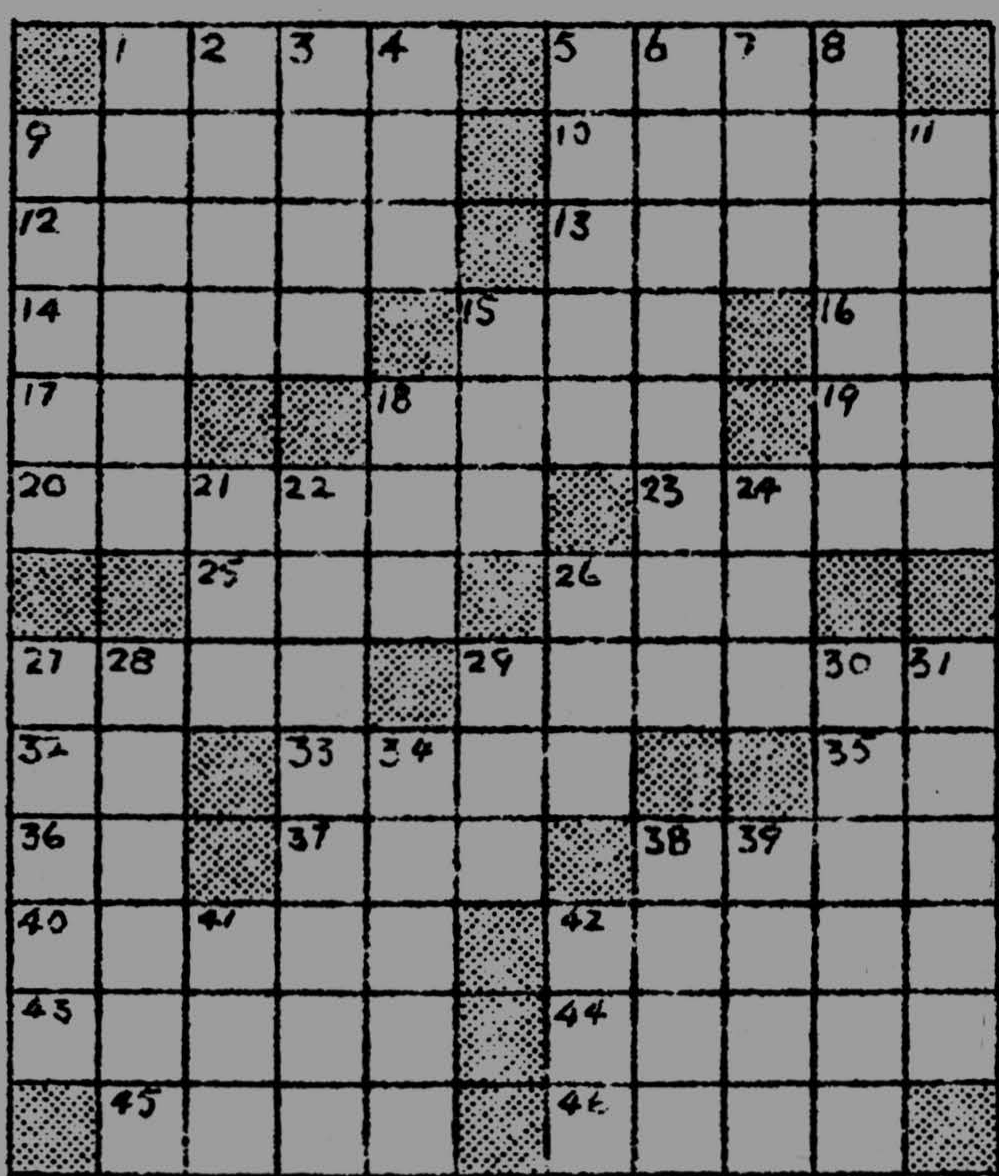

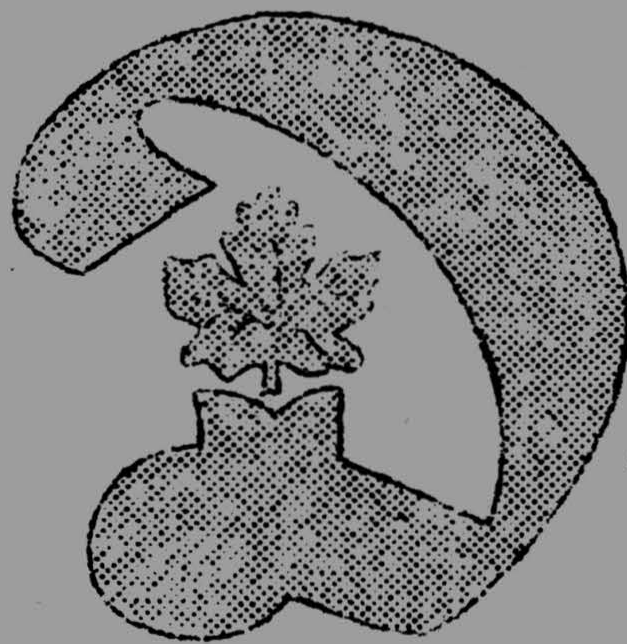
