THE GIDEONS-

- PLACING SCRIPTURES IN CANADA'S LIFE STREAMS FOR OVER FIFTY YEARS

Recently in the Labrador City Collegiate Auditorium, 150 Gideon Bibles were dedicated and presented for classroom use throughout the Collegiate and McManus School, also 300 New Testaments with Psalms and Proverbs were presented to individual students. (Full details of this event are reported elsewhere in this issue of Carol News) At the editors request, I have submitted this editorial on the GIDEONS --- their work and facts of interest.

The foundation of the Gideons Association was laid in the United States of America in 1899, by three Christian Commercial travellers. Twelve years later, the work became established in Canada. Membership today embraces Christian commercial, business and professional men. There are approximately 2,000 Gideons in Canada and 20,000 around the world. The Gideons unwaveringly believe that the Bible is the inspired Word of God, and that the Lord Jesus Christ is the eternal Son of God. They have accepted Him as their own personal Saviour and seek to glorify His name by living exemplary Christian lives and to help men find new life in God. This is the object of the Gideons and this they seek to do as an extended arm of the Church, by means of conversational evangelism and a well-defined program of Scripture distribution.

The aim of the Gideon Scripture programme is to place the Word of God in such strategic areas as hotels, motels, penal institutions, schools, colleges, nursing homes, universities, hospitals, homes for the aged and among nurses plus a score of sundry areas where a multiple of successive readers will be exposed to each copy, the Youth are not forgotten either, in addition to their Bible placement activities, Canadian Gideons present 200,000 New Testaments with Psalms and Proverbs, to grade five public school students, annually.

The Ladies Auxiliary is composed of the wives, daughters, sisters or mothers of Gideons. Their primary ministry is prayer. They also present attractive New Testaments to student nurses.

Convinced that the crying need in the hearts of men everywhere is for hope and salvation, The Gideons, in recent years, have extended their work to other lands. There is today an active Gideon organisation in more than sixty countries. In these countries the Word of God is being distributed at a rate exceeding one million copies a year.

Each Bible or New Testament is distributed or presented free of charge. The sources of Revenue for the Scripture programme of the Gideons International of Canada is financed primarily in four ways:

- (1) Voluntary contributions of members;
- (2) Offerings received at Church services;
- (3) Personal gift fellowship of interested friends;
- (4) A Memorial Bible Plan.

The Gideons International in Canada have their headquarters in Toronto at 90 Thorncliffe Park Drive, Toronto 17, where further information can always be obtained.

I will close with their statement at the end of most of their literature,

- STUDENTS PRESENTED WITH BIBLES -

In the Labrador City Collegiate Auditorium, 150 Gideon Bibles and 300 New Testaments, with Psalms and Proverbs, were dedicated and presented for use in the class rooms and personal possession, with students from Grade 5-8 receiving the New Testaments.

Present for this simple, yet impressive ceremony were Mr.K.Smart, chairman of the Labrador City Amalgamated School Board; the officiating clergy, Rev. L. Whitten, Rev.E.Snider, Captain Carew and Pastor D.H.Hartwell; also the principal, vice-principal, staff and students of the Amalgamated Elementary School.

The principal, Mr.C.McCormick, introduced those present and Pastor D.H. Hartwell, who had charge of the project and had worked in co-operation with the principals and clergy, gave a brief explanation of the project, the work of the Gideons (see this week's editorial) before offering the dedicatory prayer. Rev.Snider and Captain Carew read the scriptures and Rev.Whitten closed the proceedings in prayer.

Later, along with the principal of the Labrador City Collegiate, Mr.V. Snelgrove, Pastor Hartwell visited the classrooms of the High School, presenting Bibles to the classes and New Testaments to those students desiring them.

A LETTER TO THE EDITOR

ARE WE, OR ARE WE NOT - - - - ISOLATED
THAT IS THE QUESTION

This question has occupied the minds of many people in this area for a long time, and it was therefore with interest that I listened to a radio broadcast in which prominent local citizens took part.

The subject of 'isolation' was discussed by Miss L Douzan of the Department of Labrador Affairs, and by Magistrate Wicks who is now active in another area.

Miss Douzan stated emphatically that we are not isolated. Magistrate Wicks conceded that we are isolated. The populace as a whole were not available for comment.

We have air transportation and we have rail transportation. Let us look at the first item and analyze the air services available to us. We are served by two airlines - Quebecair and Eastern Provincial Airways. Quebecair flies South and West while E.P.A. flies North and East.

If the population decided to spend a long weekend outside Labrador City and Wabush, how many would be able to receive passage on either airline. Normally, the majority of seats is taken up by those going on their annual vacation, by those leaving for good or those travelling on business. As it is, on many occasions intendant travellers find that they have to go on a waiting list during normal times - what would be the situation were the population to decide that they wanted to get out of this area for a break, even a three day break. The situation would make the plot for a first class stage farce. Therefore on that basis alone we are isolated from the outside world inasmuch as we do not have the easy 'get out' access by air as stated by Miss Douzan. Of course let us not forget that due to inadequate services the same thing would happen when we wanted to return.

As for rail transportation, it should be remembered that the Q.N.S & L is not primarily a passenger service, nor is the Carol Railway. In fact the use of the railroad is not available to everyone in the area. If it were, then employess wanting to travel by rail to Sept-Iles with five or six children for a long weekend or perhaps for an annual vacation may never get the chance to go out as it would mean having to pay fares. For a family with a goodly number of children this could mean permanent residence in the area, with absolutely no prospect of seeing something different, and of meeting different people from different areas and of different "cultures!!"

I suggest that we refer to the Oxford dictionary for the meaning of the word 'isolation'.

QUOTE: ISOLATION -- Separation from other things and persons.

Magistrate Wicks on the other hand did concede that we are isolated, and his suggestion as to the best way to overcome the feeling of isolation was to 'forget it'. My own reaction to this statement is that the only way the majority of the isolated population will be able to forget it will be when adequate road facilities are available to the population to enable them to be like their fellow Canadians on the island and hop into their cars, drive in any direction and spend a weekend at a destination of their choice.

The question of access roads to and from this area is a pigeon-holed issue as far the government is concerned. As long as we pay the taxes to permit the construction of paved roads elsewhere in the province, our own needs are of no apparent consequence. Thus, not only are we isolated because of the very limited air and rail service, but also because of the complete lack of access roads.

CANADIAN FORCES RECRUITING CENTRE RELEASE

ROYAL MILITARY COLLEGE CADETS TO AID R.O.T.P. RECRUITING IN NFLD:

Three senior officer cadets from the Royal Military College of Canada will visit Newfoundland and Labrador from April 29 to May 10. to boost interest in Regular Training Plan of the Canadian Armed Forces. Officer Cadets William A. Matthews, 23, of Durham, Ont; David J. Rooke, 21, of Ottawa; and Malcolm F. Scott, 23, of Toronto will talk to high school students, Armed Forces cadets and Service Clubs throughout the Province, and will also take part in radio and T.V. interviews.

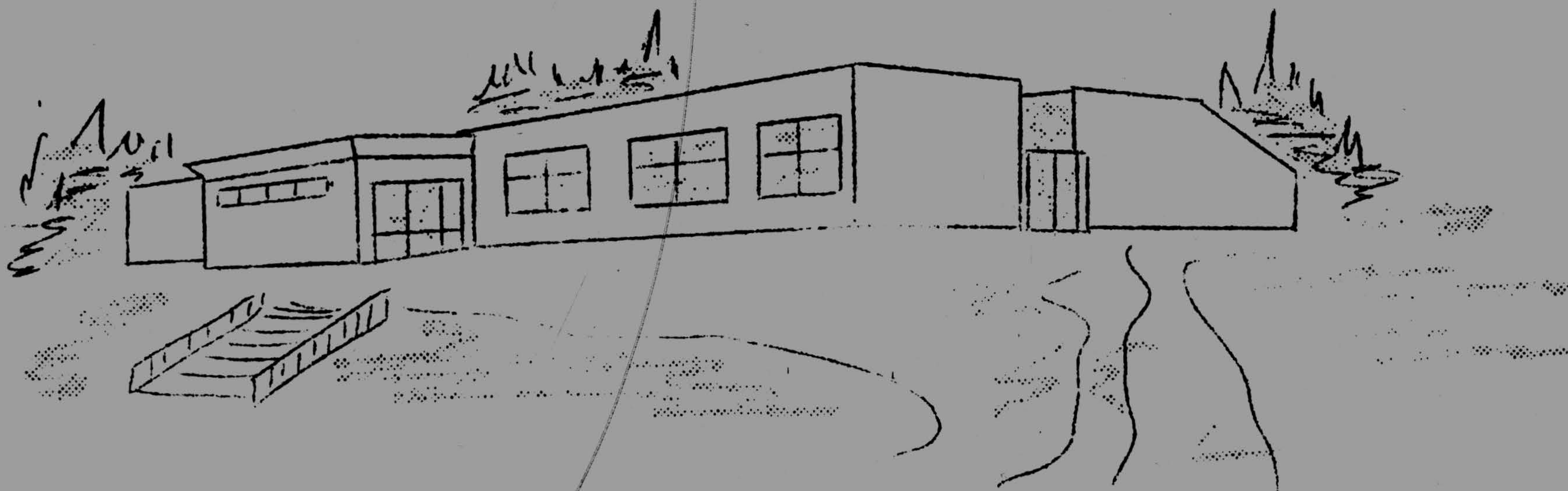
The three cadets will be attached to the C.F.R. Centre in St. John's for the duration of their visit, and will be accompanied by recruiting officers on their public appearances. Officer Cadet Scott will visit Labrador City and Wabush from the 4th until the 8th of May.

The cadets' goals will be to stimulate interest among young Newfoundlanders in the educational and career opportunities offered by the Armed Forces, and to encourage grade XI matriculation students to apply for the Regular Officer Training Plan which leads to a university degree and a career as a commissioned officer.

The ROTP is a unique opportunity for young men. Applicants selected across Canada this summer will enrol in the Armed Forces as officer cadets, and in September, will embark upon courses of four or five years duration leading to a degree in engineering, science, or arts. The majority of those selected will attend one of the Canadian Military Colleges located in Kingston, Ont; Victoria, B.C; and St. Jean, Que; and the remainder will study at civilian universities including Memorial in St. John's.

The Department of National Defence pays all tuition fees for ROTP cadets, who also receive a salary of \$2244 per year, and an allowance of \$125 per year to cover the purchase of books and instruments. During the summer months cadets receive military training followed by a period of leave, before continuing their academic studies. Upon graduation the cadets are commissioned with the rank of lieutenant, and embark upon a challenging and rewarding career as officers in the Canadian Armed Forces.

!!! C.N.I.B. NEWS !!!

It is hoped to make arrangements for an eye specialist to visit the Labrador City / Wabush area by June at the latest. The delay has been caused by the non-availability of specialists due to their own heavy commitments, but Mr. J. Caruk, Superintendent for the C.N.I.B. in Newfoundland is confident that arrangements can be made for June.

In this connection, parents of the children scheduled to be seen by the doctor will be receiving a communication from Miss L.A. Sayers of the C.N.I.B. in the near future. Parents who have not yet returned the questionnaire to the C.N.I.B. office in St. John's are asked to do so immediately.

A second survey took place at Mount Pearl, St. John's, and 45 of the children screened have been referred to a specialist for further diagnosis and treatment.

The third survey is to take place in Corner Brook around the middle of May, therefore the C.N.I.B. is wasting no time in putting to practical use the experience gained during the initial survey conducted in our twin towns.

It is the intention of the C.N.I.B. to set up an Advisory Board in this area. The function of the board will be to work with the Institute in the development, arrangement and support of services for the blind and in the prevention of blindness in the Western Labrador region. The formation of the Board will mean that the population have an accredited group through whom contact can be made with the St. John's office.

At the moment it is not known whether or not the specialist will be available for private appointments, but as soon as a decision has been made an announcement will appear in the Carol News and will be broadcast.

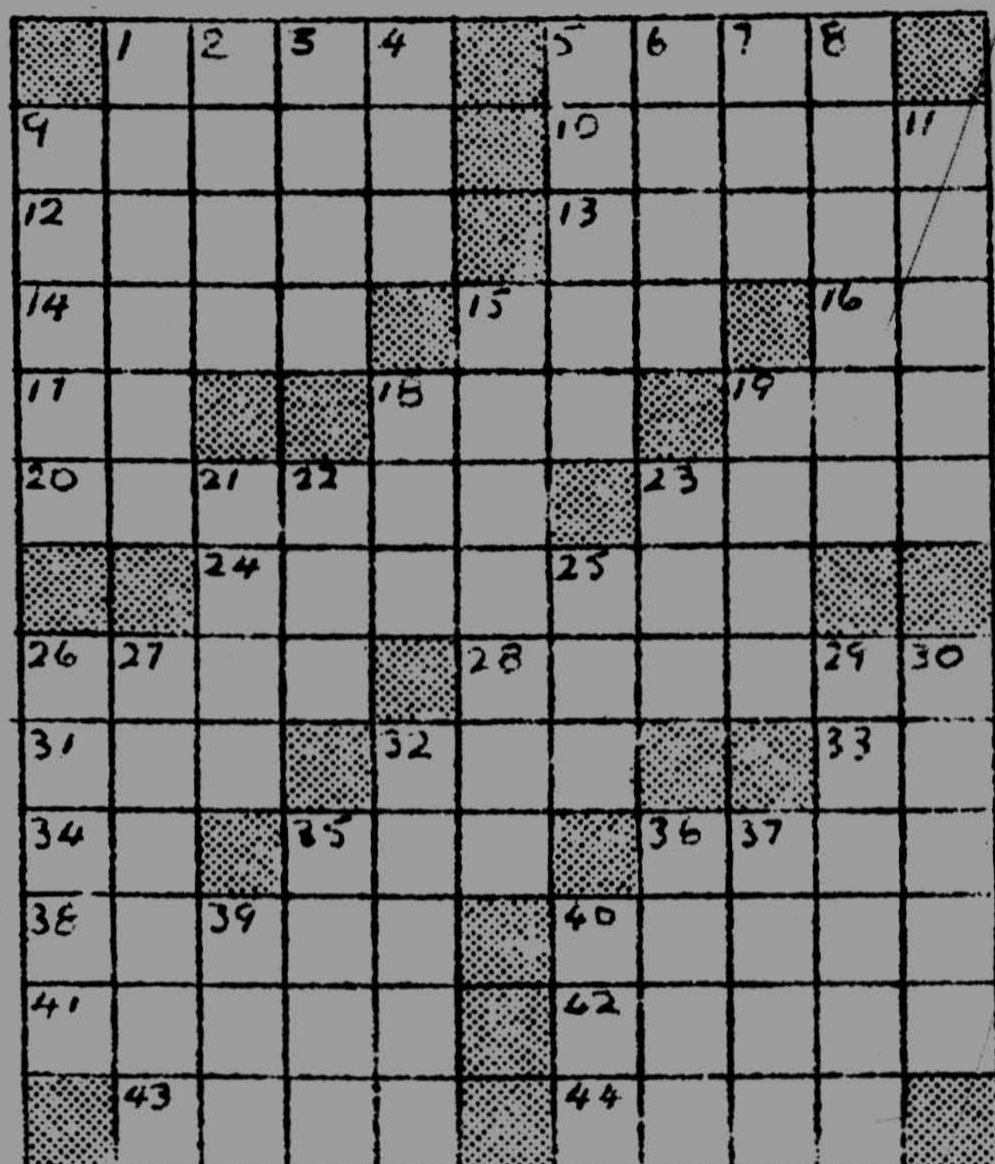

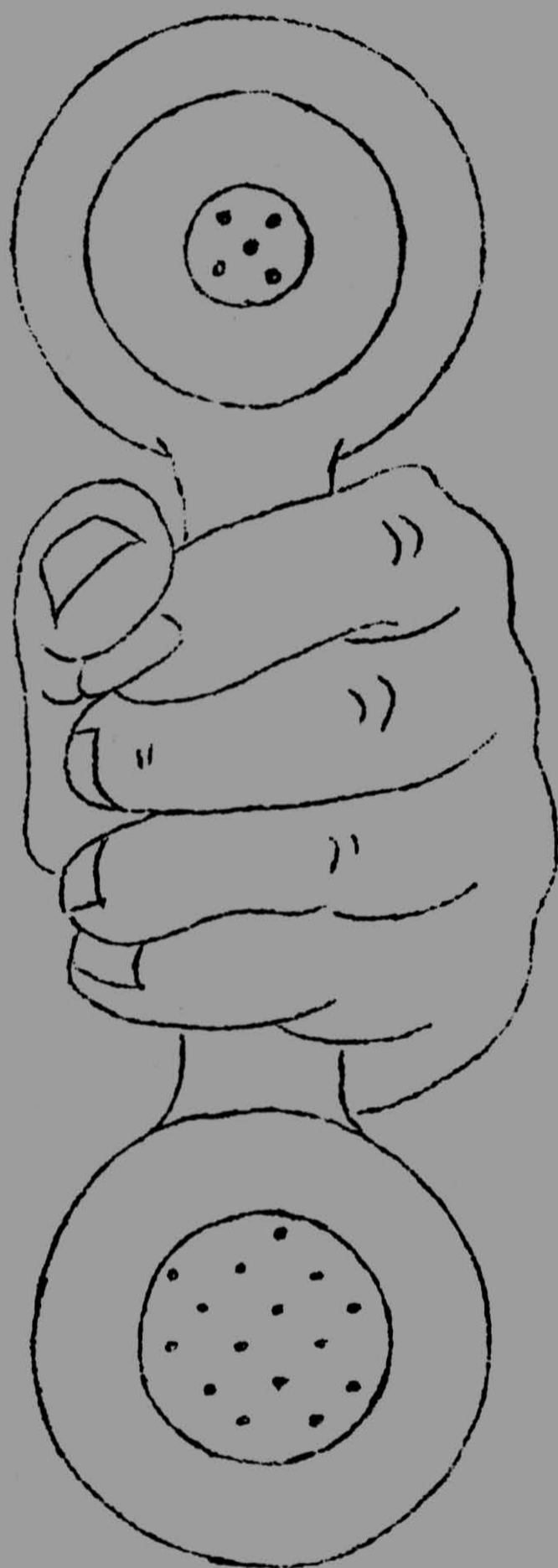

TOP TIP

Leather boots, shoes or handbags that have been stored for any length of time can easily have that look of neglect wiped off them - by olive oil. Rub a little sparingly but thoroughly into the surfaces and leave for a few days before polishing with a good cream.

SIMPLE RECIPES TO CUT OUT AND KEEP

- BAKED STUFFED ONIONS -

Even-sized onions
2 tbsps. breadcrumbs
Salt and pepper
3-4 oz grated cheese
A little white sauce
Meat drippings

Peel and boil the onions for about 20-30 minutes, drain, and scoop out the insides with a spoon or pointed knife. Mix the crumbs, seasoning and most of the cheese, add a little sauce to moisten and fill onions. Put in a fireproof dish with shavings of dripping on top, sprinkle with remaining cheese, and bake in a moderately hot oven (400° F) until quite tender when pierced - 30 - 40 minutes. Any well flavoured filling containing meat, poultry or cheese, or sausage-meat, may be used.

WABUSH TO HOST GOLDEN GLOVES TOURNAMENT

Mike Coady, who many feel would be a strong contender in the light-welter division is in the hospital and will be unable to compete.

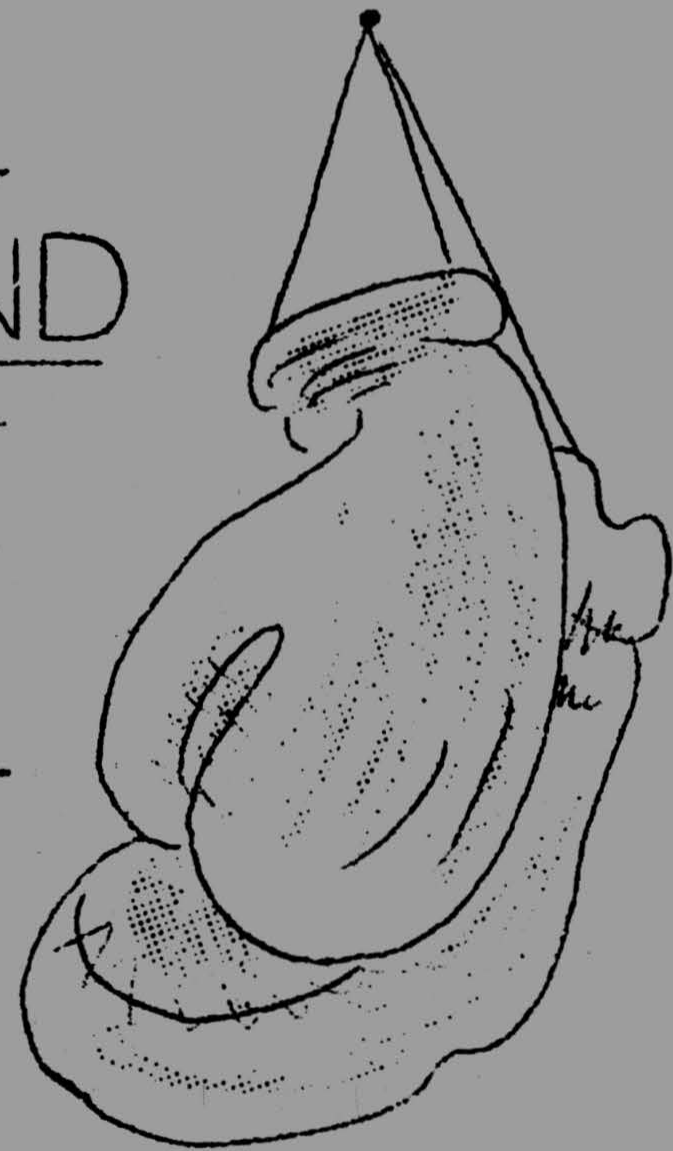
The Gander Boxing Club and the St. John's Boxing Club will enter 8 boxers each in the Tournament bringing the entry list to 30 or more boxers.

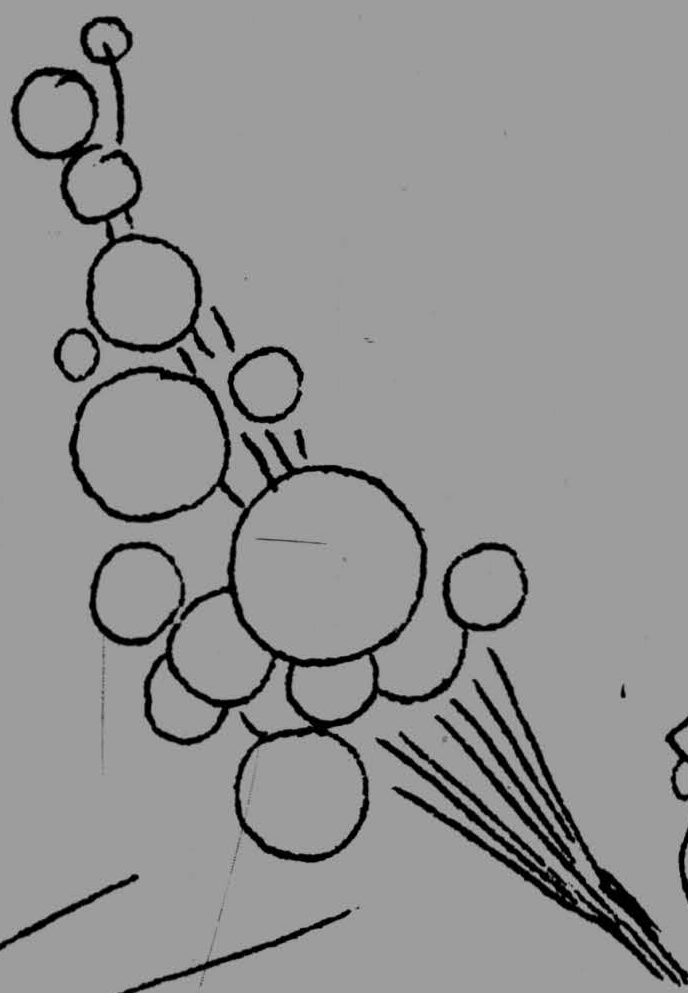

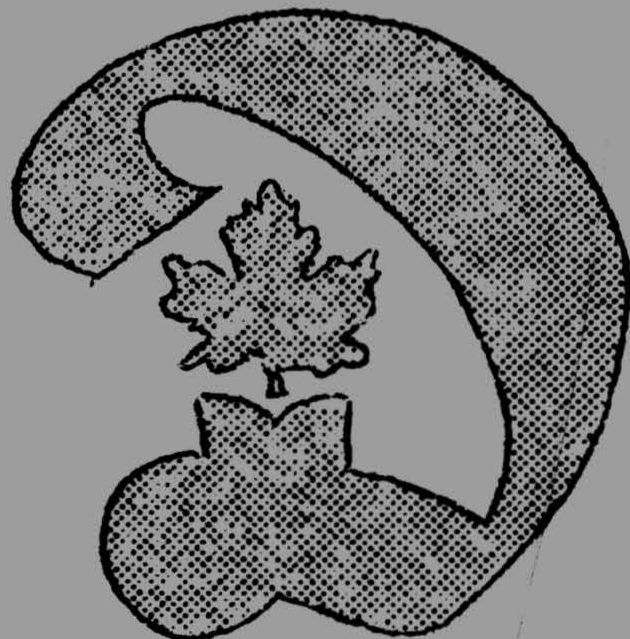
