I pass on to you the following letter sent in to the Carol News by the Staff of the Scully Mine Training Department in Wabush. This is one of many pamphlets entitled 'Facts' and when published brought the following observation from the Elmira (N.Y.) Advertiser:

" If any driver can resist its appeal, he has no business with a driver's license."

Dear Driver:

A few weeks ago, I saw a little girl struck by a car as she tried to cross the street. I saw a father race toward her and hold her to him as she struggled in the agony of death. I saw all the plans that had been made for her dashed and I saw the look of despair that came over his face. I could only offer a prayer that such a thing might never happen again.

Today my daughter, who is 6 years old, started off to school. Her cocker spaniel, whose name is Scoot, watched her leave and whined his belief in the folly of education.

Tonight we talked about school. She told me about the girl who sits in front of her, a girl with yellow curls, and about the boy across the aisle who makes faces; about the teacher who has eyes in the back of her head; about the trees in the school yard and the big girl who does not believe in Santa Claus.

We talked about a lot of things - tremendously vital and unimportant things.

Now, as this is written, she is sound asleep with her doll "Paddy" in her arms.

When her doll gets broken or her finger gets cut or her head gets bumped, I can fix them. But when she starts across the street - then, Mr. Driver, she is in your hands.

Much as I wish I could, it's not possible for me to be with her all the time. I have to work to pay for her home, her clothes, her education.

So, Mr. Driver, please help me to look out for her. Please drive carefully. Please drive slowly past schools and at intersections. And please remember that sometimes children run from behind parked cars.

Please don't run over my little girl.

Dear Parent,

You have no doubt been wondering if there is to be a further follow-up of the CNIB Amblyopia Screening Survey held in October 1967. This letter will bring you up to date on our efforts to complete the programme undertaken.

Thus far we have received replies to our Questionnaire for Parents from 23 out of 31 parents concerning 25 out of 37 children. The results from these questionnaires are as follows:

Eight letters concerning 10 children were sent to various ophthalmologists whose names had been given by the parents, giving the report of the survey for these children.

We are still making efforts to have an ophthalmologist come to Labrador and Wabush, but it is difficult to find someone with the available time.....

..... Children who require surgery will probably have to come out for treatment either to St. John's or Corner Brook or to Quebec. We would hope to have definite information for you in regard to this by June.

Although the CNIB is doing other Amblyopia Surveys in Newfoundland, Labrador City and Wabush are the only places that we have taken the further responsibility of arranging for examination of the children by an ophthalmologist. In other areas, the medical follow-up is being left to the responsibility of the parents.

THE FOLLOWING ANNOUNCEMENT WAS MADE RECENTLY BY
THE HON. DR. F.W. ROWE, MINISTER OF EDUCATION

Some years ago in order to encourage schools to purchase projectors for film strips and movies as aids to Education, the Government introduced a policy of making small grants available for such purposes. These grants were \$25 in the case of a film strip projector and \$100 for a 16 millimetre sound movie projector.

While these grants were helpful at the time they were introduced and resulted in encouraging a number of the larger schools to obtain such equipment, the form and the scale of the assistance is clearly inadequate for modern needs.

I am happy to announce that the Government has approved a wider and more generous programme in this field of Audio Visual Education. Under the new programme all School Boards will now be eligible to receive 25% of the cost not only of film strip and movie projectors but also of overhead projectors, approved school television sets, loop projectors and tape recorders.

Furthermore, in order to start their own film strip libraries, the schools will be able to obtain grants covering 25% of the initial cost of such libraries.

This new policy may be regarded as a preliminary step in implementing the recommendations of the Royal Commission on Education and Youth in this respect.

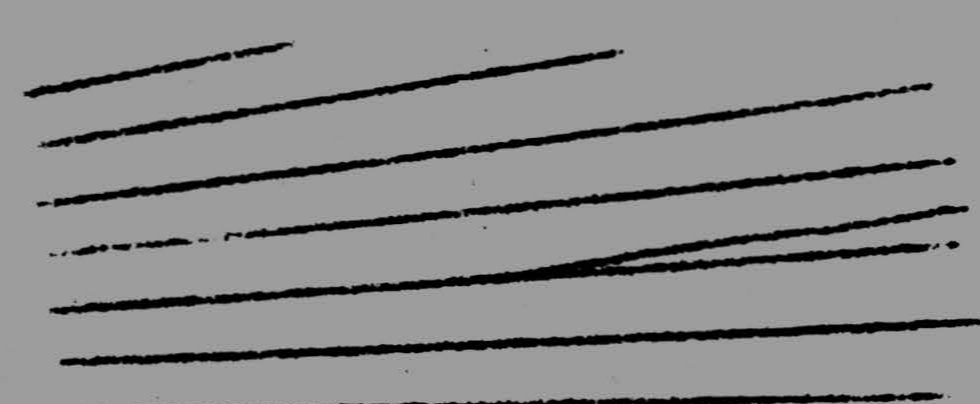

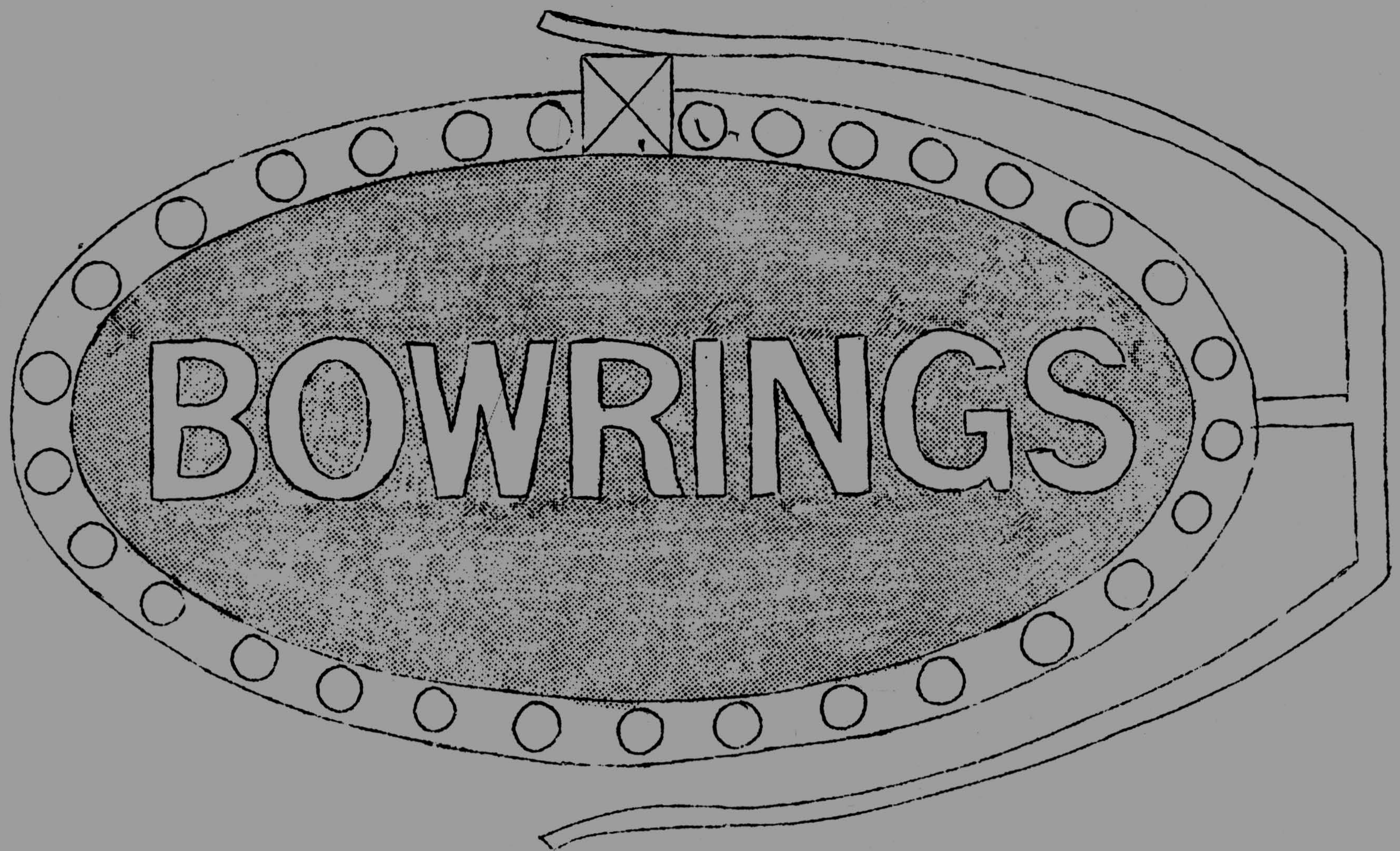
