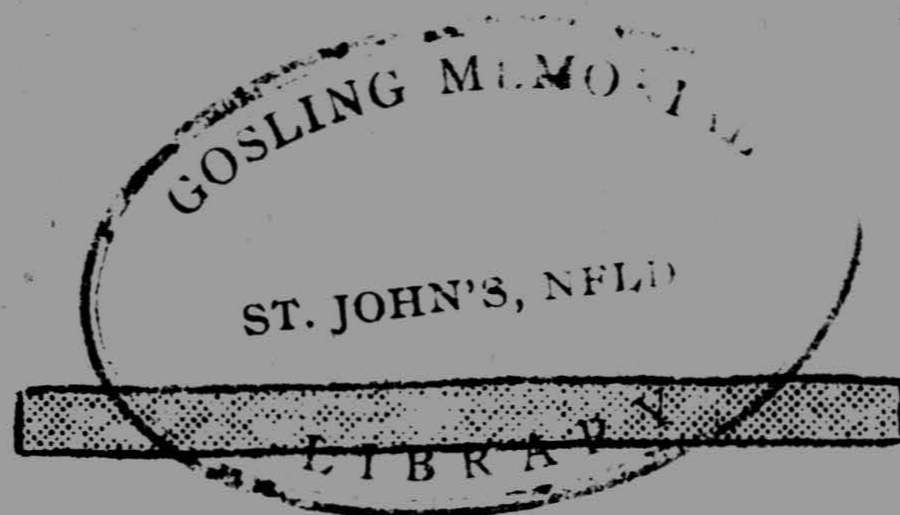

May we remind you that the Postage rate on unsealed Christmas Cards addressed for delivery in Canada; United States; its territories and possessions; North, South and Central America; the West Indies and Spain is five cents for the first two ounces and three cents for each additional two ounces and to all other countries including Great Britain and the Commonwealth the Postage rate on unsealed Christmas Cards is six cents for the first two ounces and three cents each additional two ounces.

OFFICE OF THE DISTRICT DIRECTOR OF POSTAL SERVICE

A number of rate changes involving both international and domestic mails will be implemented on NOVEMBER 1st, 1968. The international rates are shown on a chart. However, due to the number of amendments it was not possible to prepare a chart covering domestic rates.

THE DOMESTIC RATE CHANGES AFTER NOVEMBER 1st WILL BE AS FOLLOWS:

1. FIRST CLASS (a) Letters - No change Post Cards - 5¢ 1st oz., 3¢ each additional oz.
2. UNDELIVERABLE SECOND CLASS RETURNED TO PUBLISHERS (a) Wrapper only - 10¢ each
Copy returned - 5¢ 1st oz. and 3¢ each additional 2 ozs. per copy - minimum charge of 10¢ on each copy returned.
3. THIRD CLASS (a) Christmas cards, advertising circulars - 5¢ 1st 2 ozs., 3¢ each additional 2 ozs. - Limit of weight 1 lb.
(b) Bulk mailings (10,000 items) 4¢ 1st 2 ozs. and 3¢ each additional 2 ozs. - Limit of weight 1 lb.
(c) Samples. 5¢ 1st 2 ozs. and 3¢ each additional 2 ozs.
Limit of weight - 1 lb.
(d) Books: Mailed by publishers, dealers and book club -
14¢ 1st 10 ozs. 1¢ each additional 2 ozs. Limit of weight 25 lbs.
(e) Unaddressed
(1) Printed matter - 3¢ 1st 2 ozs., 1½¢ each additional 2 ozs.
(11) Samples up to 8 ozs in weight but not exceeding 9"x4½"x¾"
4¢ 1st oz. and 2¢ each additional 2 ozs.
(111) Samples exceeding above limits (accepted for delivery at non-letter carrier offices and on all rural routes)
5¢ 1st 2 ozs, 3¢ each additional 2 ozs.
(f) Keys 5¢ 1st 2 ozs and 3¢ each additional 2 ozs if prepaid.
Double deficiency if unpaid or short-paid.

NOTE: The parcel post limit of size will apply to printed matter and oversize items will be surcharged 75¢.

4. FOURTH CLASS: (a) Catalogues (including telephone directories and other publications comprising commercial listings) over 1 lb. - parcel post rate
Bulk mailings (over 2500 items) - 15¢ per item plus 10¢ per lb. on the total weight of the mailing.
(b) Oversize -- 75¢ surcharge.

5. INSURANCE Now extended to 3rd class mail - no change in fees.

6. SPECIAL DELIVERY now extended to 3rd class - Fee 50¢

NOTE: Items which were formerly known as 3rd and 4th class will be treated as 3rd class when the weight is less than 1 lb.

All such items weighing over 1 lb. will be treated as parcel post.

MULTI-LEVEL MERCHANDISING - THE CUSTOMER IS VERY ULTIMATE

One of the fastest-growing merchandising techniques in the nation today is multi-level merchandising, a complex, hierachal arrangement sometimes concerned more with the endless recruiting of distributors than with actual sales of a product to the public.

A number of companies are marketing such products as cosmetics, food supplements, housewares and appliances through merchandising plans based on stages or graduated levels of distributorships.

As a rule, these plans involve the recruiting of independent distributors at four or five levels, the level depending on the amount of money invested by the distributor. Distributor earnings depend on profits based on the difference between wholesale or quantity prices and retail prices, plus bonuses or incentive payments from the company for recruiting other distributors and commissions or overrides on sales made by lower-level distributors.

The total income to any distributor thus may result from one or a combination of these sources, or may depend solely on the sales activities of others.

A Basic Difference

Where there is a realistic projection of distributor earnings and actual selling of the product to the public, multi-level merchandising, as practiced by a number of reputable companies, is an effective sales tool.

But where the sale of merchandise is secondary to the sale of distributorships, where a distributor's success hinges largely on his ability to recruit lower-level distributors, the technique is highly questionable.

Plans require an investment of a specific amount for a distributorship at a particular level, purchase of a quantity of merchandise, or both. The larger the investment, the higher the level. At the top level, distributors, sometimes called "generals," qualify for proportionately larger discounts on quantity purchases. These distributors then recruit lower-level distributors, selling them an inventory of the product and collecting commissions or overrides on any sales, along with recruiting bonuses from the company.

Some "generals" have reportedly recruited as many as 300 to 400 other distributors, who have in turn recruited other distributors who have recruited other distributors, in a seemingly endless chain. In the higher levels, investments in product inventory are mostly paper taansactions, with no actual merchandise changing hands.

High-Style Recruiting

Distributor recruiting is often done on a grand scale, with space taken in hotels for sessions that are reminiscent of revival meetings. Distributors planted in the audience get up and testify to their phenomenal success. These are distributors who got in the plan early, when it was still possible to recruit large numbers of people and collect handsome bonuses and commissions.

For the latecomers, it's often a different story. Continueing and regular income depends on the sale of products to comsumers. That part of the return on the distributor's investment based on bonuses or commissions related to recruiting eventually declines or stops, unless products are accepted and purchased by consumers.

NBBB's Position

The National Bureau recommends that prospective distributors require proof in the form of verified accounting records of claims made verbally or in advertising as to amounts which can be earned by new distributors. Media also are advised to obtain such data.

NBBB

NBBB suggested that anyone interested in developing a distributorship should first investigate the competition in his area for the product involved, the potential market for the product and what provision will be made for a refund of investment should he wish to withdraw. He might also evaluate his own ability to sell the product.

In any case, the prospective distributor should seek the advice of an attorney before signing any contract or agreement.

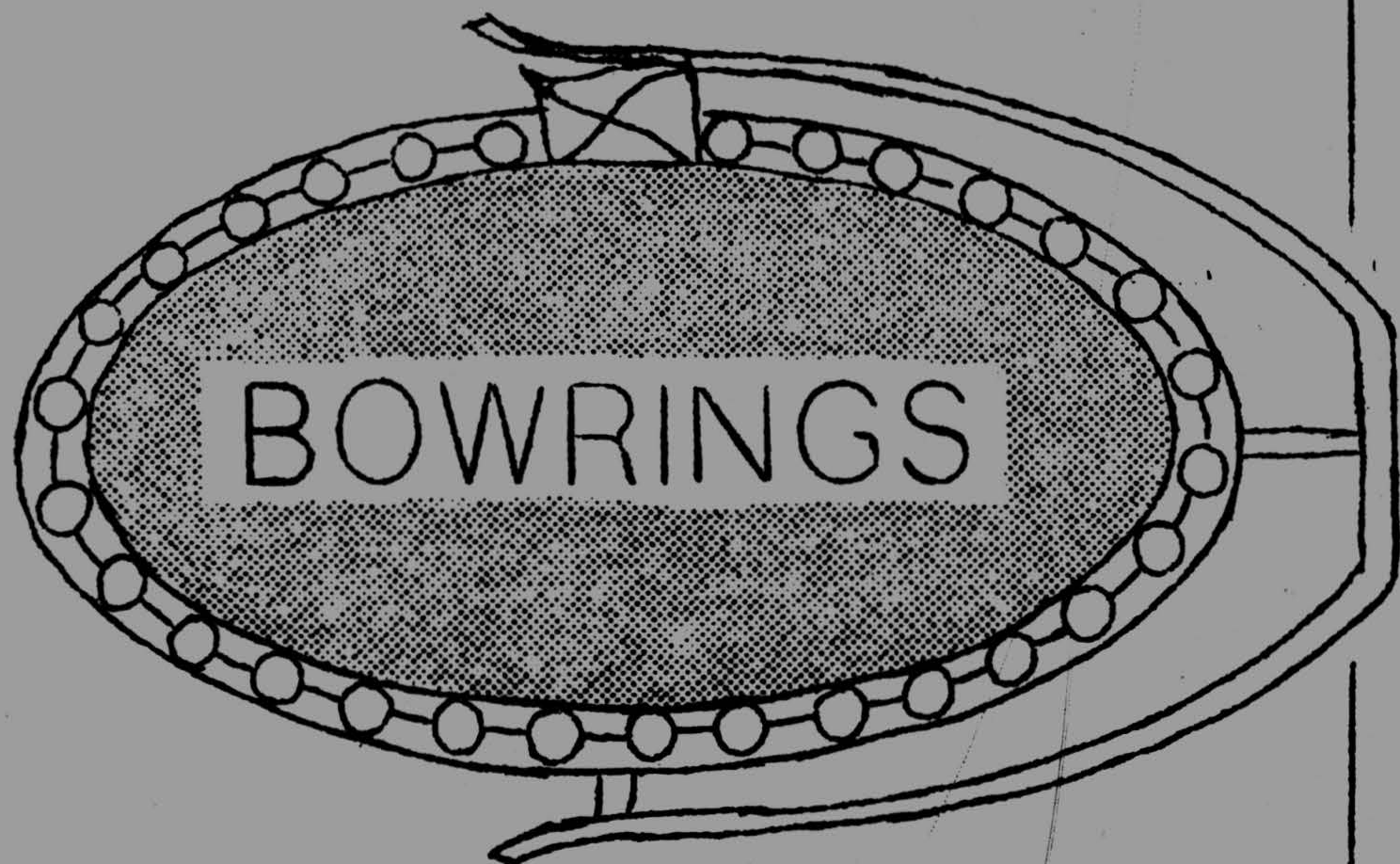

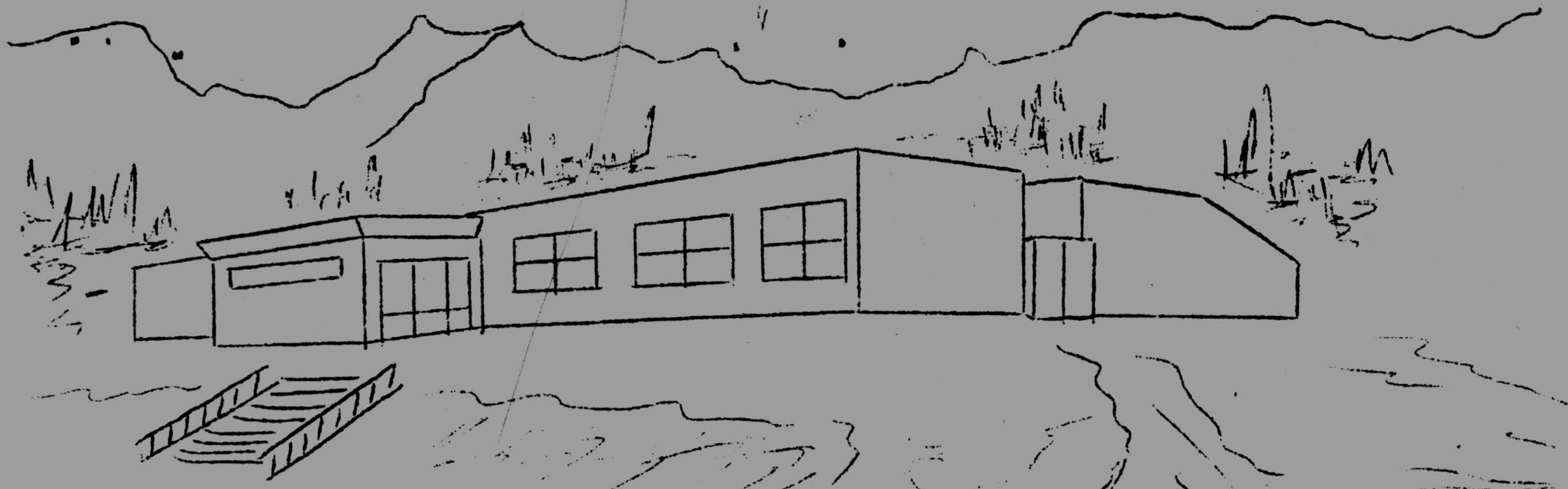
