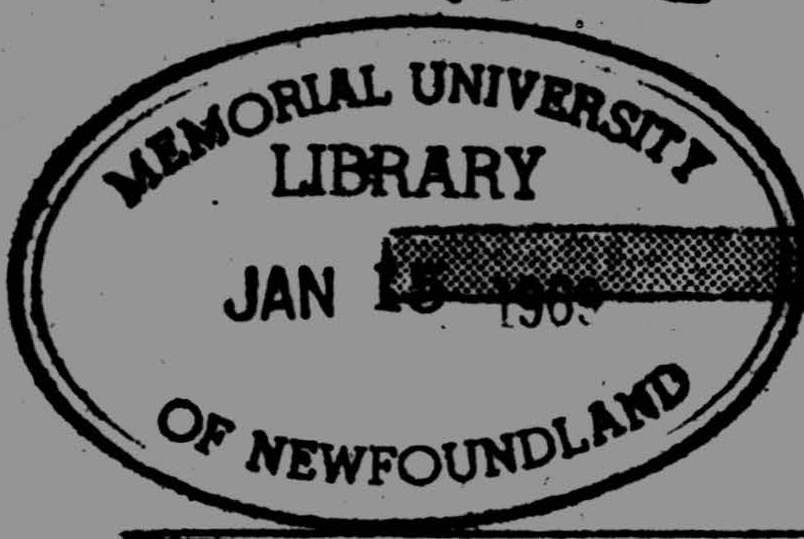

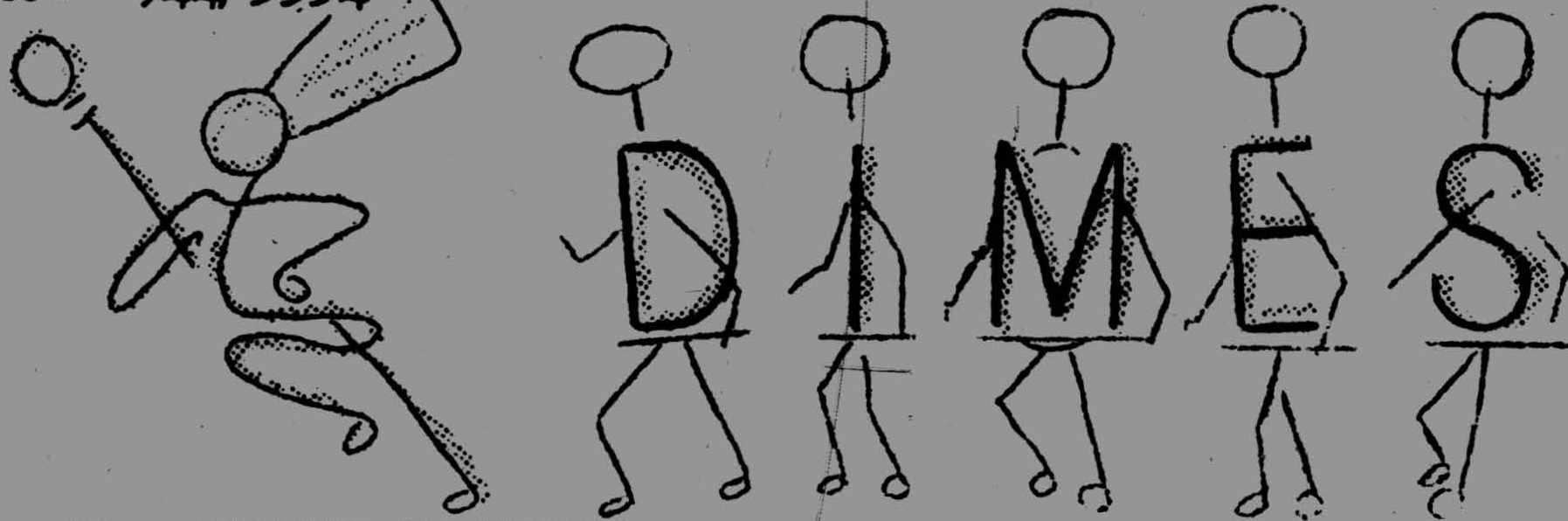

The MARCH OF DIMES was founded in the early 1930's by the late comedian Eddie Cantor and was originally established to fight the dreaded crippling disease Poliomyelitis commonly known as Infantile Paralysis.

The MARCH OF DIMES was introduced to Newfoundland in 1953 - 54, following the first polio epidemic, under the auspices of the Newfoundland Society For The Care of Crippled Children and Adults. Rehabilitation services were provided for victims of polio and others with physical disabilities. These services are still available to all persons up to the age of twenty years at the Society's Children's Rehabilitation Centre, St. John's.

The Society is now considering adult facilities and the development of other rehabilitation services for the physically disabled. The problem of providing these new facilities can be made a lot easier through generous donations from the general public.

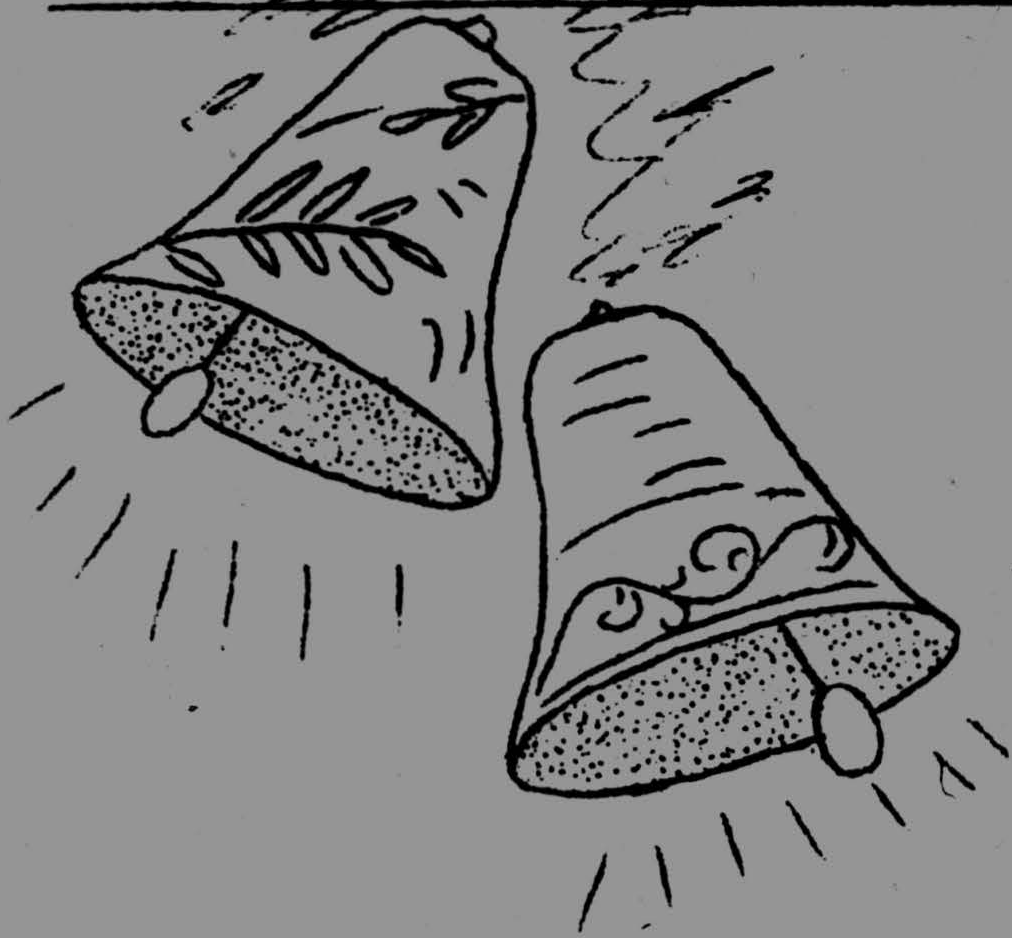

A PUBLIC HEALTH REPORT  
from the  
CAPTAIN WM. JACKMAN MEMORIAL HOSPITAL  
LABRADOR CITY.

As Public Health Nursing is a recently established office in Labrador City and Wabush, we felt a brief description of its functions and services would enlighten our community towards a more full use and understanding of the services offered.

The needs of this community were assessed some months ago by the Director of the Dept. of Public Health Nursing for Labrador and Newfoundland Miss Jean Lewis S.R.N. It was felt then that such a service would benefit this area greatly.

Public Health is concerned with preventative rather than curative measures for health. Through a Public Health Nursing Service it is hoped that some health needs can be met before hospitalization or direct medical care is needed. Preventative or public health work begins even before birth. Studies have shown that maternal and infant mortality have steadily declined as the quality of care given during pregnancy has increased. Labrador City and Wabush are unique in the fact that a large proportion of our population is made up of young married couples without the corresponding number of older persons who have experienced the problems of newborn and pre-schooler. Here we find young mothers unable to turn to older persons for advice and hence needing possible guidance. A home visit is made to each mother as early as possible in her pregnancy. Dietary counselling is offered, explanation of discomfort of pregnancy, teaching about the development of baby and exercising.

Care of the newborn is explained and encouragement given to attend pre-natal classes and to maintain adequate supervision under the care of the physician. Often the mother has problems with the other children she wishes to discuss at this time. Visits are made to mothers during their stay in hospital and then approximately 24 to 48 hours after discharge a home visit is made to the mother and newborn.

This is proving to be a very worthwhile service as there seems to be many problems arising at this early stage. The infant is weighed, measured, examined and feeding problems are discussed, demonstrations of infant feeding, bathing and formula preparation can be given. The mother is encouraged to maintain post-natal exercises and to return to her doctor for a later check-up. As Labrador City and Wabush have a very high birth rate this service alone could involve a full time Public Health Nurse.

There have been many referrals from school nurses where home visits have been required for school children having various problems and needs. There have also been many home visits made as a result of referrals from the physicians of Labrador City and Wabush for persons requiring some special care or health teaching in the home.

Another service carried out is the communicable disease programme. This is done by demonstrations of home nursing care, support of those who have a communicable disease and advising families how to protect themselves when there is a communicable disease in the home or neighborhood. We also provide complete immunization to all pre-schoolers through child health conferences. These have been held twice a month at the hospital but because of large attendance will now be held each Friday from 2:00 pm to 4:30 pm. It should be emphasized that these clinics are not only held for purposes of immunization but also to provide parents with a chance to receive counselling about problems they are having with pre-schoolers. Current health literature and child guidance pamphlets in both French and English are available to those interested.

It is hoped that as these services become more firmly established other new services will originate. Films and new literature have been ordered for parents of retarded children. Also, hopefully in the new year, a C.N.I.D. Sight Detection Survey for pre-schoolers will be started in following last years Amblyopia Screening Programme.

Public Health Nursing works with many others in the community such as Welfare Officers, Public Health Inspectors, Hospital Personnel, Doctors, School Nurses and Red Cross Volunteers. It should be strongly emphasized that a public health nursing service is not a welfare programme. It is not concerned only with uneducated persons but with all persons in the community. Health education benefits everyone ! Cont.

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# CANADA MANPOWER CENTRE

CANADA MANPOWER IN THE COMMUNITY

Being recently transferred to the Wabush-Labrador City area, I would like to take the opportunity of expressing my deep interest in the continued development of a Canada Manpower Centre that will service the needs of employers and job-seekers alike and further extend our support policies of Manpower Mobility and Occupational Training for Adults.

Having analyzed the position of our office in the community over the past month, I must frankly admit that I am quite concerned about the general lack of liason between the employer with job openings and our local office. I find no togetherness at present, and employers seem to have a general lack of faith in the efforts we are ready to provide in trying to fill their job vacancies. Also, many people in the community seem uninformed of our policies, and in general, our purpose and function.

Canada Manpower, which is a branch of the Department of Manpower and Immigration, came into being in June of 1966. Since this date it is important to realize that we are no longer in any way directly connected with the Unemployment Insurance Commission. Our general function is to find jobs for people and people for jobs. We can also move people under certain conditions to areas of employment and also provide the means for those who wish to upgrade themselves and learn any wide number of trades. We are a service agency orientated towards the problems of employment and a new breed of civil servants who must strive for efficiency in a daily operation that deals directly with people and the employers who wish to hire them.

Our records indicate that approximately 90% of all the people who come into the area seeking employment fill out an application with our office at one time or another. Although we are able to assist a certain percentage, far too many people find it necessary to seek employment on their own initiative causing wasted time and expense to themselves and their prospective employer and a duplication of the service provided by our office.

Our aim for the future will be to strive for a better working relationship with the business community in which we can give a quick and efficient response to employer demand in order to provide an availability of positions for qualified applicants. Nothing is harder on our pride than to have to phone Mr. or Mrs. X every few weeks with the story that they are registered with us but we have no positions to offer them. Jobs are limited, but we feel certain we can provide a better service.

It is with these thoughts in mind that we wish to include a weekly "Manpower Review" to be inserted in the Carol News. We hope you will find this page informative and that employers will take note of the people we have available for local positions.

## Manpower Review

### General Information:

As many people already know, our Wabush Office is composed of a small staff of two men. Many people ask why the Canada Manpower Centre is in Wabush rather than in Labrador City. This was simply an accomodation problem. At the time the office was established, suitable space could only be obtained in Wabush.

We are presently experiencing a significant change. Previous to this year our office was a Branch of St. John's, Nfld. As of January 2, 1969 we are on our own as an Atonomous Canada Manpower Centre with a branch in Goose Bay which is in the process of being established. We hope that the employers and people we are dealing with in the area realize that we will be experiencing organizational difficulties and a heavy work load until April when our staff will be increased by one Counsellor. However, we anticipate that we will be able to overcome our difficulties and continue a stepped-up programme in the area of local placement.

Next week I will give a brief description of our Manpower Mobility Programme and explain what we are doing and what is necessary in order to qualify.

Clients Available:

At present our office has fifty five people registered as immediately available for employment. Twenty are male applicants and thirty-four are female applicants.

Male Clients:

Of all the male clients only four are over 24 years of age. Our general breakdown includes:

MACHINIST ( Machine Shop ) JOURNEYMAN. Fully qualified with 9 years experience Specialised in gear cutting and turning.

WELDER (arc) Three years experience in construction and heavy equipment welding. Client also has a St. John's Ambulance course revived last June '68.

CARPENTER with considerable experience with local construction firms in the past.

PLUMBER APPRENTICE This client has taken one year of trade school and wished to work as a plumbers helper.

CLERKS Young men available who are interested in working in a small business or retail store.

LABOURERS, STOCK CLERKS ETC: An abundance of young men at present looking for full or part-time jobs in the area as labourers, stock clerks, truck drivers helpers and janitors.

FEMALE CLIENTS:

Secretaries and Steno's - We have up to ten women of various ages, both married and single who are looking for clerical openings in the area that require typing and shorthand. Some have over five years experience and would be an asset to any company. We have one secretary registered with thirteen years experience.

CLERK TYPISTS, CLERKS AND RECEPTIONISTS. - There are up to fourteen girls of various working backgrounds in the area who would be suitable for various clerical duties that do not require shorthand.

The remainder of our applicants are seeking various types of work that include working as a cashier, saleslady in a retail store and laundry worker.

If we have no one available to fill a vacancy - please keep in mind that we will do our utmost to obtain the person you need from our various Canada Manpower Centres in Newfoundland and Quebec.

**PETS  
CORNER** by

The home can be a dangerous place for pets as well as for children, with the trailing electric flex being one of the most common dangers. All flex should be carefully lifted above floor level, out of the reach of playful pets - as well as children. If however, your pet does manage to get an electric shock, be careful. Before touching it cut off the electricity supply in order to avoid a shock yourself.

Another danger is scalding, but it is very difficult to see the scald area for the animal's fur. However, he will soon let you know if he is in pain and half of an Aspirin will relieve this. We all know too how cats love fish and dogs are never happier than when they have a bone to chew on. How many of us realize though that we may be doing the wrong thing by giving these to our pets. All fish should be thoroughly boned. Never give a cat chicken bones, chances are he'll end up with a splinter perforating the intestines. Your dog should only gnaw on a bone that does not splinter - never give T-bone or ribs.

If the worst comes to the worst and your cat manages to get a fish or chicken bone in his throat, wrap him securely in a towel, then with the help of another person insert a home-made gag in his mouth. If you can see the obstruction you will know whether you can do anything to release it or not. NEVER pull if the bone is wedged ACROSS the throat - this can cause severe lacerations. The best tool is a pair of blunt-edged scissors. The bone should be cut well away from the throat wall enabling you to withdraw the two separate pieces with a pair of tweezers.

Meat bones are not so easily removed, tweezers alone should be used for this. It is often possible by gentle pressure to release the bone from one side so that the whole of the bone can be withdrawn; the more quickly this is done the better. Remember that efficiency must never be sacrificed for speed!

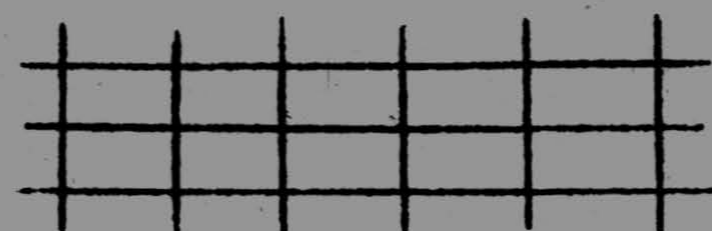
