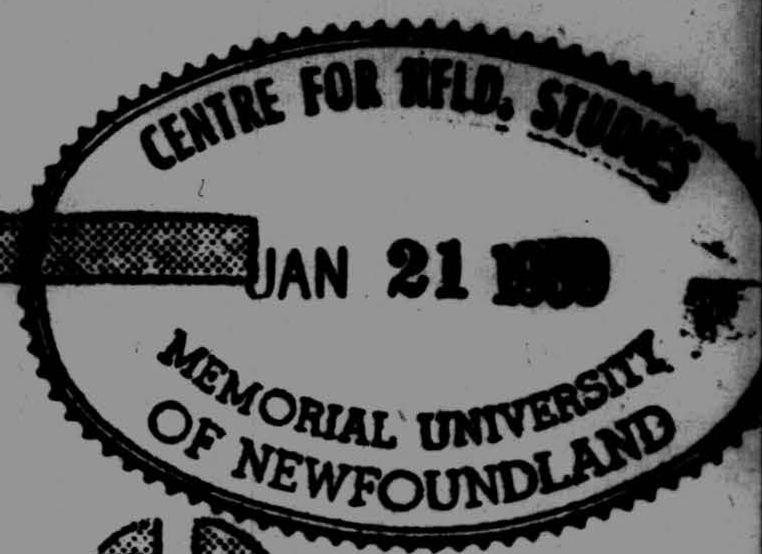

BASIC RULES FOR THE CARE OF PETS

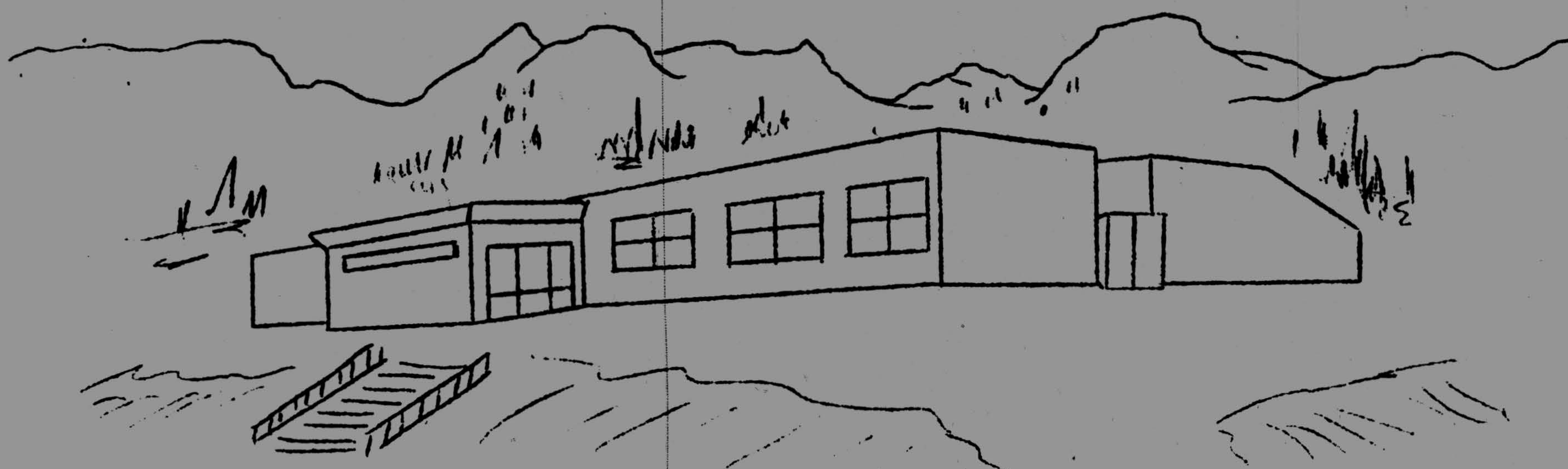
1. When you are buying your pet make sure it is alert, lively, and apparently free of disease. It should not be so young that it still depends upon its mother for feeding.
2. When you bring your pet home be sure to keep it separate from other animals of the same sort until you are absolutely sure that it is healthy and free from parasites. Some conditions may not show up for a few days but could still be caught by other animals.
3. House your pets in clean, bright and room quarters.
4. Make sure your pets can get plenty of exercise, otherwise they may become fat, unhealthy, lazy, and bad-tempered.
5. Nearly all animals require a variety of foods to keep them healthy and happy. Do not rely entirely on canned foods but consult a guide book or an expert on the particular type of creature with regard to care and feeding.
6. Do not overfeed or underfeed animals, otherwise they will catch diseases more easily just like human beings.
7. If your pet becomes sick consult someone who knows what to do for it, such as a veterinarian, an expert, or your S.P.C.A. which will put you in touch with the right person. Never attempt to treat a pet yourself without being 100% sure that you are doing the right thing. For instance, only one or two types of pesticides are suitable for use on pets which have fleas and lice - other types may do permanent damage or even kill your animal.
8. Never carry or handle pets without supporting the whole body. Do not pick up rabbits by the ears. Never pick up cats by the scruff of the neck, never pick up four legged animals by the front paws only and of course never pick up any animal by the tail.
9. Remember that your pet is a living, feeling creature, not a toy. It should be given the same respect you would give a child.

The S.P.C.A. hopes that you and your pets obtain full enjoyment from each other and would be glad of any support whether it be verbal, physical, or financial.

MANPOWER REVIEW

GENERAL INFORMATION.

The Manpower Mobility Program was introduced to Canada by Parliament on April 1, 1967. It was created to relocate unemployed workers unable to obtain employment, to areas where employment is available.

Since 1967 our Wabush Office has been very heavily involved in this program that has assisted well over 1200 workers and their families to settle in the Wabush - Labrador City area. We are a Mobility Receiving Office in that we process the applications of workers who have been authorized to move by Canada Manpower Centres in the four Maritime Provinces, Quebec and Ontario. Reasons for the large amount of Mobility traffic to the area are the permanent jobs offered by the mines and the availability of family accomodation, which, although hard to obtain, are necessary for complete relocation. Other permanent jobs in the area with suitable criteria for a Mobility Grant.

In trying to explain the Manpower Mobility Program on a general basis, I must ask you to first consider two negative points:

(1) Do not try to derermine the eligibility of a Mobility Grant by comparing notes with someone who has received. one. Mobility Grants differ as individual cases differ.

(2) Only under rare conditions, study and review can a worker receive a Mobility Grant after he has moved to this area. A worker, already in the area, who has moved to Wabush or Labrador City on his own, has not been previously authorized by a Canada Manpower Centre, is not elegeble.

The Manpower Mobility Program was not created to pay every persons costs of moving to improve his prospects of employment. It is designed to help people who don't have jobs, and who can't get jobs without moving, but who can't move unless they receive financial assistance.

CRITERIA

In order to qualify for a Mobility Grant, an unemployed worker has to be laid off indefinitely from his last job in his original area with no prospects of finding other suitable employment in that locality. In other words, a worker who leaves a job voluntarily in order to find other employment, cannot qualify for a Mobility Grant. As I stated earlier, the program was designed to relocate the unemployed worker.

It is also important to note that grants cannot be made to people who move to a job in this area and then apply to our local Canada Manpower Center for money. Although many people come to us and explain that they knew nothing of the Mobility Program before they moved we are still unable to assist them under the present set of regulations. There is a very good reason for if this were done, we would relinquish effective control of our expenditures and the examination of the circumstances that surrounded a man's departure from his previous job.

In order to control our program a worker has to be authorized to move under the Manpower Mobility Program by a Canada Manpower Center serving his original area. In other words, before moving a worker must make his application for a grant and have it approved by his original Canada Manpower Center before he can receive the benefits at his destination.

MALE CLIENTS

We have six men this week who are over 24 years of age. Our most exceptional client this week is:

COOK - Middle aged man, single with considerable experience. He was a First Cook for six years in his last job and was laid off because of a cut-back in staff. Bilingual.

MACHINIST - (Machine Shop) Journeyman fully qualified with 9 years experience Specialized in gear cutting and turning.

The awards were presented by Lady Taylor at a special meeting of the Newfoundland Rehabilitation Council held in the Fort William Room, Hotel Newfoundland on Jan. 7.

These awards are given annually not only to recognize the remarkable achievements of certain disabled persons but also for the possibly more important purpose of stimulating and encouraging those who are still in the process of rehabilitation.

The Awards were instituted in 1961 and consist of \$500.00 each donated by Mr. C.A. Pippy, Past President of the Newfoundland Rehabilitation Council, and an inscribed plaque donated by the Council.

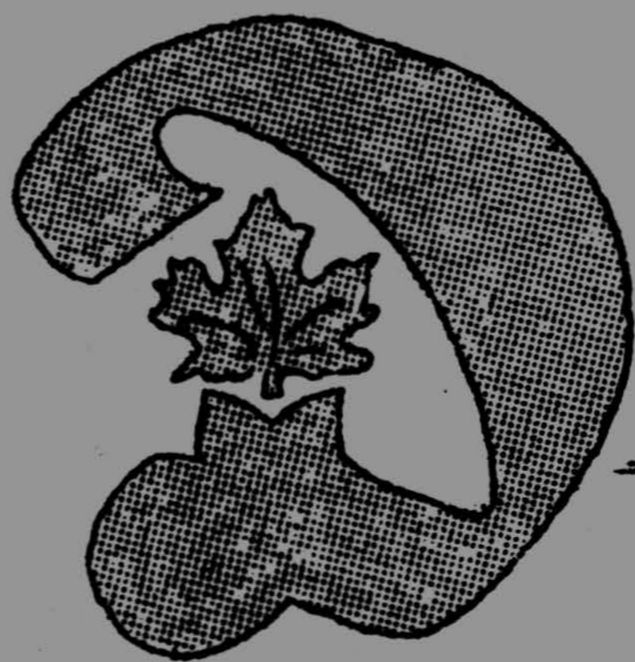
