

SUPPORT THE RED CROSS

FORTY THOUSAND ACTIVE RED CROSS YOUTH MEMBERS IN NEWFOUNDLAND

Mr. Donald Evely, Chairman of the Red Cross Youth Committee, disclosed today that there are, in Newfoundland, forty thousand boys and girls, who are actively engaged in the humanitarian programmes of the Canadian Red Cross Society.

Mr. Evely said how proud he is to be associated with an organization, which is doing such a great deal of work in eliminating suffering and helping the youth of the underdeveloped nations to help themselves and all this, in addition to their activities on a local level, in providing assistance for the less fortunate than themselves.

The administration cost of this programme is borne by the Red Cross Society. All funds raised by the Junior members, themselves, are devoted to their work for youth here at home and abroad.

Pennies, nickles and dimes, that the Juniors give from their allowance or raise through worthwhile meaningful projects, really mount up. Newfoundland Juniors raise about seven thousand dollars annually. With this money, they provide therapeutic and orthopaedic aid for less fortunate children right here in Newfoundland. Mr. Evely also pointed out that our Red Cross Youth Members are among the first to recognize that while charity begins at home, it does not end there. Just a month ago, these young people sent \$2,035.42 to the Nigeria/Diafra Relief fund. They send health kits, school supplies, clothing and medical and technical assistance to about thirty countries each year, and it is through the RED CROSS that our children learn about this aspect of good citizenship.

!!!! HIGHLIGHTS OF THE SEPT ILES TOURNOI DE HOCKEY MINEUR!!!!

FEBRUARY 28 - MARCH 2

The Labrador City Minor Hockey Association entered three teams in the Sept Iles Tournament. The following is a summary of games played in the Mosquito, Pee Wee and Bantam Leagues.

The Pee Wees played on Saturday morning at 8:00 am against the Maliotenam Indians. The score was 7 - 3 in our favour with John Bullen scoring 4 goals, Brendan Kerr 2 goals and Jimmy Hopkins placing a single. The team played well and Larry Bartlett and Glenn Burford alternated in the nets. John Bullen and Brendan Kerr were 1st and 2nd stars of the game. The second game for Labrador City began at 10:30 am.

In the Mosquito League we defeated Schefferville 4 - 2, the Labrador City scores were achieved by the team work of Bruce Bullen, Dwight Arnold, Eric Lake and Armond Trehan. The Schefferville goals were netted by Denis Mattais and Tim Terry. Although both these teams were quite equal, Labrador City obtained their winning goals in the 3rd period. Bruce Bullen and Fidelis Leonard were 1st and 2nd stars of this game.

The third game was played at 3:30 pm. with Labrador City going against Schefferville. Things looked bad for Schefferville who are in their first year of Minor Hockey but victory came to their Bantam team who defeated Labrador City 3 - 1. Lorne Brown scored the single Labrador City goal while Schefferville goals were pegged by Jeff Kean, Gordie Tarrant and Dennis Mayo. The Labrador City Bantams were kept in the game by the efficient goal tending of Darrel Munn who was chosen as 2nd star of this game.

The fourth game was not in our favour, as the Penticote team led 2 - 1 going into the 3rd period, but Labrador City's combination of Bullen, Kerr and West spurred the team to victory. 4 goals were fired by Bullen, 2 by Kerr, Matienzo-1, Robin Hunt - 1, with Billy West delivering five assists.

On Sunday Morning at 9:30 am Labrador City Mosquitos skated into the arena as contenders for the 6th Tournoi de Hockey Championship game against Sept. Iles - cheered by a crowd of 2,000. The boys played well, but they were out-skated and entered the 3rd period with Sept Iles increasing their score from 4 - 1 to 9 - 1. The single goal was netted by Bruce Bullen and the star of the game was Gerry Hicks, whose goal-tending prowess limited the puck from entering our cage. At 2:00 pm Labrador City Pee Wees were defeated by Sept. Iles 5 - 2. John Bullen placed our 2 goals and Larry Bartlett's goal-tending earned him the honour of 2nd star of this game. John Bullen was acknowledged as the second star of the Pee-Wee division throughout the Tournament, with a total of 10 goals. Sept Iles captured all the division by the following victories in the final games.

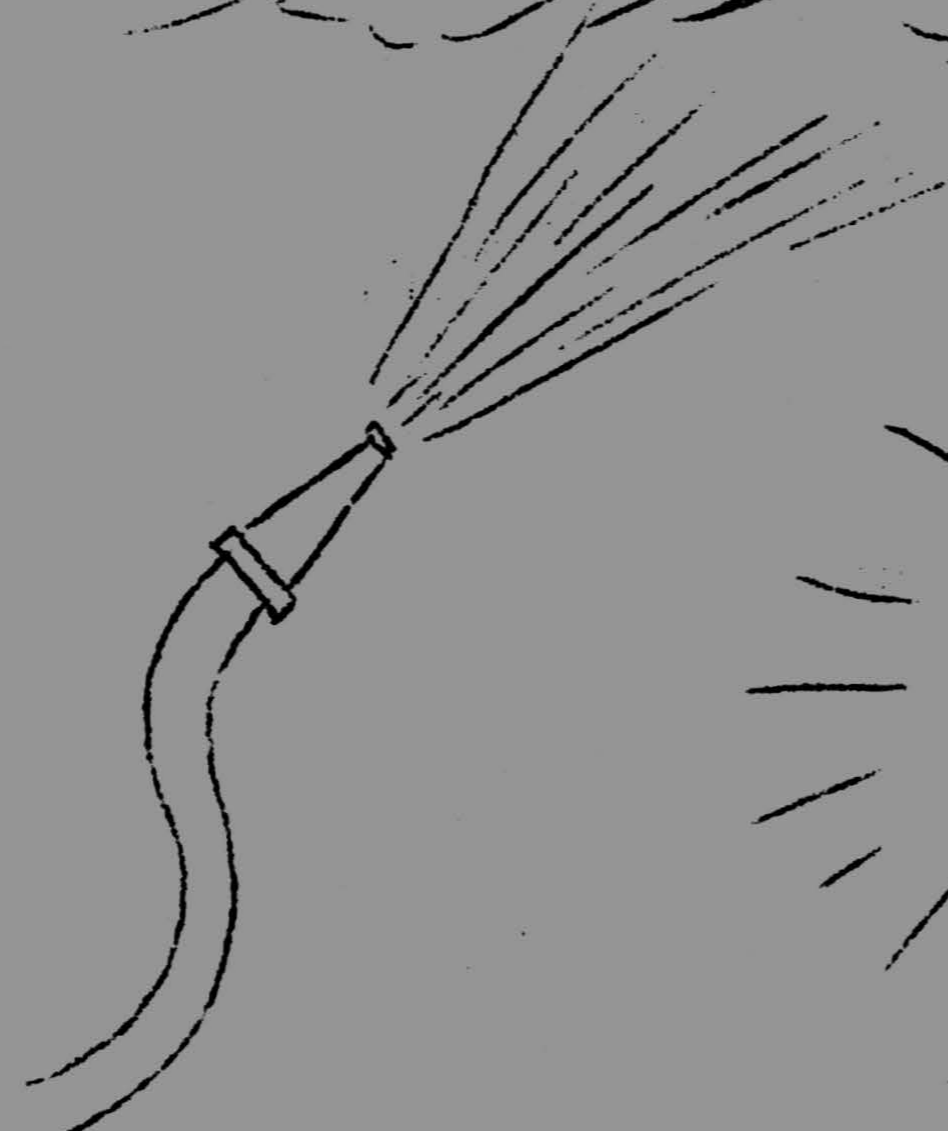

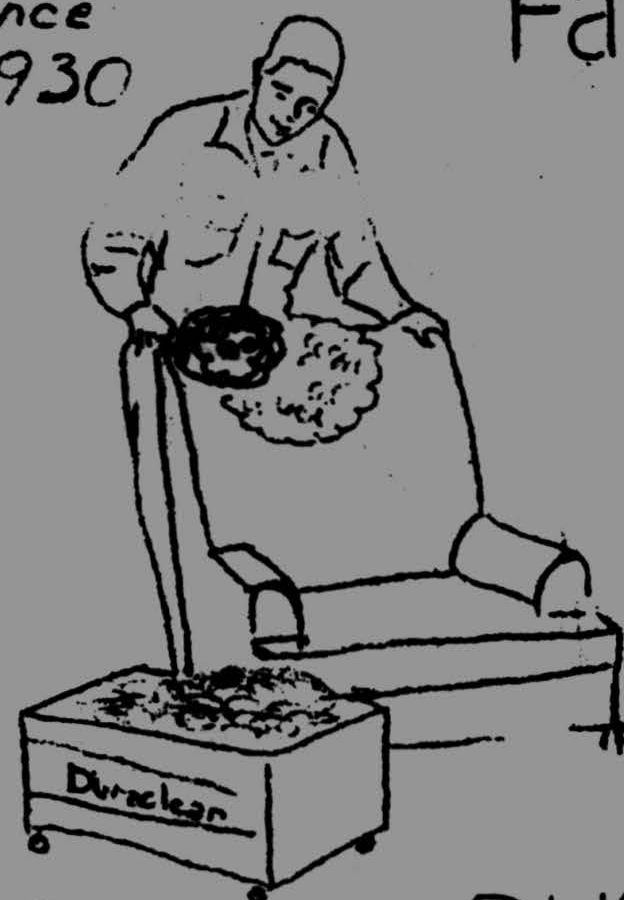

STATEMENT BY THE HONOURABLE MINISTER OF EDUCATION

Mr. Speaker:

For some time, the Government of Newfoundland and Labrador have been giving careful thought to ways and means whereby the students of our University may be able to play a more significant role in University affairs generally, than is possible under present legislation.

I am very happy to inform the House that with the approval of the Board of Regents and of the Senate the Government have agreed to introduce in the present Session, amendments to the Memorial University Act which will help to bring about this educational reform. Among the amendments to be introduced for the consideration of this House will be a revision of the structure of the Senate which will make obligatory the appointment of eight University students to that body.

It is Government's intention also to introduce an amendment which will enlarge the size of the Board of Regents, in order to make it obligatory for at least one representative of the students to be appointed to that important Board.

Businesses large and small throughout the whole province are advised to exercise caution if approached for advertising in the name of the labour movement. Persons said to be representing "TWENTIETH CENTURY PUBLICATIONS" and / or "TRADE PUBLISHERS AND PRINTERS" are soliciting ads for a publication allegedly called "NEWFOUNDLAND FEDERATION OF LABOUR CONVENTION PROGRAM." According to information gathered by the Better Business Bureau, several firms across the province have already paid cash with their order for advertising. No date has yet been set for a Federation Convention this year.

The Better Business Bureau's correspondence with Newfoundland Federation of Labour executives indicates that the Federation will not receive any money from this promotion, and that the "free" programs would not exceed one hundred and fifty. The Newfoundland Federation of Labour further suggests that no contributions be made to these solicitations at the present time.

According to information received by the BBB, the two companies are also soliciting pre-paid advertising for some sort of tourist guide, with the approach being made to hotels, motels, restaurants, service stations, and other establishments involved in the tourist business.

/// LABRADOR REGIONAL ECUMENICAL CONFERENCE ///

From Tuesday to Thursday this week Labrador City and Wabush was the scene of meeting for ministers and priests from all over Labrador and Eastern Quebec. They were here attending the second annual regional ecumenical conference to be held in this part of the country. The first was held in March in the Happy Valley - Goose Bay area. Attending were clergymen from up and down the Atlantic coast of the interior towns of Happy Valley, Goose Bay, Northwest River, Churchill Falls, and Schefferville, as well as those of the local churches. They represented the Roman Catholic, Anglican, United, Presbyterian and Moravian Churches and the Salvation Army.

These speaker at the conference was the Rev. Ralph McKim of the Anglican Church House in Toronto who introduced the delegates to the idea of group dynamics and sensitivity training in the area of human relationships. This is a study of what happens to people when they are together in groups, and is of special interest to teachers, leaders of youth, church and sports groups, and others interested in learning what makes people tick when they are together. For this reason the public were invited to an open session of the conference on Wednesday evening. This session which was led by Mr. McKim featured an experiment in group relationships, and was held in the basement of the new Carol United and St. Paul's Anglican Church.

Another guest at the conference was the Rev. Charles Catto of Operation Beaver in Toronto. This group which brings together overseas and Canadian students will be supervising the building of a youth camp in the Lake Melville area this summer.

Members of all the churches were invited to an ecumenical service on Wednesday evening in the new Carol United and St. Paul's Anglican Church. The preacher was Rev. Charles Deharveng of the Roman Catholic Church in Happy Valley, and the service was led by members of the various denominations.

Among the church leaders present at the conference was Bishop Legge of Newfoundland, Bishop Brown of Quebec, Bishop Legare of Schefferville, Superintendent Peacock of Happy Valley and Superintendent Morrison of Halifax.

Goose Bay Labrador

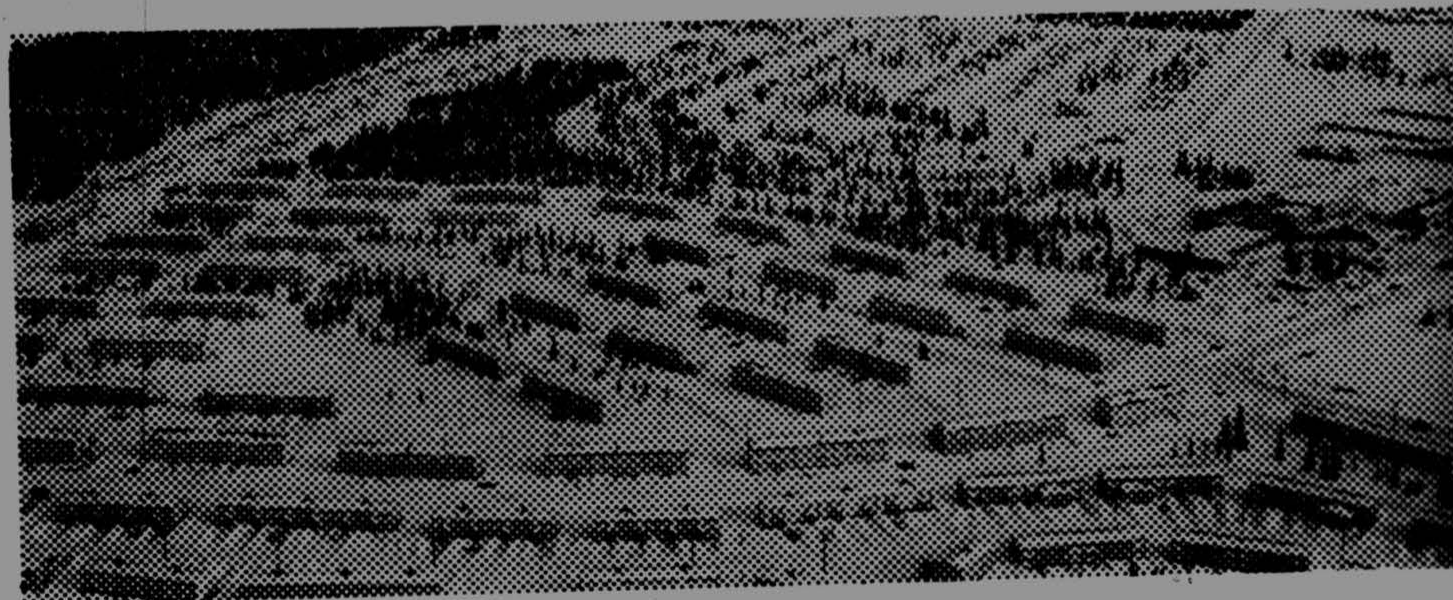
