A typically American institution, the male quartet has enjoyed a rare popularity since the days when handlebar moustaches were the vogue and such tunes as "Bicycle Built For Two", and "Down By The Old Mill Stream" were hummed and whistled by almost everyone.

Some fifty years ago the original foursome known as The Revelers was formed and became the first quartet ever to sing on the air.

In time, through fine arrangements of the standard repertoire and outstanding performances of both folk and popular songs, the quartet became one of the most distinguished groups of its kind at home and abroad.

In addition to providing listeners with consistently enjoyable and varied musical programmes, The Revelers Quartet has been a proving ground for many musical aspirants, including such luminaries as Frank Parker, Frank Black, and the late James Melton. Wilfred Glenn, original basso and guiding light of the group for many years is now retired and living in Charlottesville, Virginia.

The Revelers have been on various programmes under various names such as The Shannon Four, Seiberling Singers, Singing Sophomores, Palmolive Revelers, and others. There have been changes in quartet personnel from time to time, but they're always The Revelers, possessing an individuality and a group personality which marks them wherever they go.

For many years The Revelers have been heard in key cities throughout the country with outstanding success. Currently they are booked for fall and spring tours to cities through the United States and Canada. A highlight engagement and great honour was accorded the group when they performed at the White House in Washington D.C.

Variety and versatility are evident in the many activities of The Revelers. Summer finds them sometimes featured as the singing School Board in Meredith Wilson's "The Music Man". In a television "commercial" they advertise for a famous grocery chain. Now recordings are being played on radio stations across the land.

This is the third time that we in Labrador City and Wabush have had the pleasure of seeing and hearing these topflight performers. If you have seen one of their concerts before you will not want to miss this one; if you haven't, go along to the Labrador City Collegiate THURSDAY, MAY 1, the concert begins at 8:30 p.m. - it will be an evening to remember!

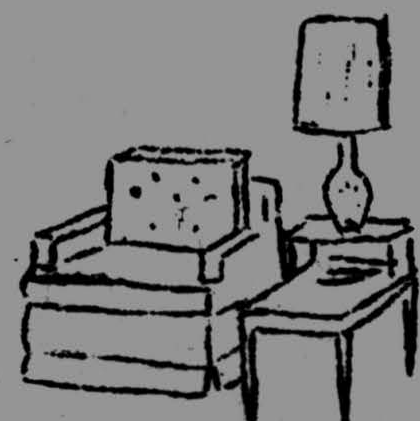

PETS CORNER

The following article was very kindly submitted by Mr. Clive Chen of Labrador City. Mr. Chen is quite an authority on the keeping and breeding of fish and he is the proud winner of many trophies awarded to him in London, England.

I would like to say, thank you sir, I am sure many of our readers will benefit from your advice.

KEEPING & BREEDING FISH by CLIVE CHEN

Keeping fish, tropical or otherwise can be a fascinating hobby, but as in any other hobby there are certain rules one must observe in order to ensure as long a life as possible for your pets. Below I have listed the ones I feel are the most important:

1. A fish tank is far better than a glass bowl.
2. An air pump is a must for your tank, especially when you have large fish or several fish together.
3. If you are using a bowl, you must fill it HALF FULL, that is to the widest part of the bulge, otherwise very little surface oxygen can penetrate the water. Each fish requires 2 to 3 square inches of surface space per 1" of fish.
4. Gold fish do not need plants the same as tropical fish, since they can stand sudden changes in the water temperature. There are two reasons for placing plants in with your fish (1) Fish breathe out carbon-dioxide into the water, this is poisonous to the fish but not to the plants, which take in this gas and replace it with oxygen. (2) Plants restrain the build-up of dissolved solids in the water, which by the way, is of great importance in hard-water areas. In addition to this water-conditioning value, root feeding aquatic plants provide the only constant means of compost cleaning, making a long-term aquatic display possible. (These notes apply to tropical fish for the most part).

In the case of gold-fish which are kept in a bowl, it is advisable to change the water at least once a week, this is depending on the size - the larger the fish the more you change the water. NOW CAREFUL PLEASE. When changing the water do it like this:- Put the fish in some of the OLD water into a plastic bag which you then tie. Wash the bowl completely and re-fill with cold water. Place the tied bag with the fish into the bowl, BUT DO NOT EMPTY YET! Allow the water in the bag to become the same temperature as the water in the bowl - this will take approximately 1/2 hour, only then do you free the fish. In this way the fish are not subjected to sudden changes of temperature, which, incidently reduces their resistance to diseases such as fungus.

WHAT CAN I DO ABOUT DISHONEST OR HIGH PRESSURE SELLING AT MY HOME ???

THE DIRECT SELLERS ACT: This Act which was passed in 1966 requires the licensing and bonding of Direct Sellers.

A Direct Seller is a person who goes to your home or place of business to sell you goods or services.

A direct sale may range from \$1 to \$10,000 covering items from cosmetics to hearing aids to steel buildings.

This Act provides a Ten-day "cooling-off" period in which a direct sale may be cancelled by the purchaser.

A copy of the Act and the regulations is available upon request from the Registrar of Direct Sellers, Confederation Building, St.John's Nfld.

KNOW YOUR RIGHTS: If you have bought . . . you may, within ten days, cancel the deal by sending a registered letter of cancellation to the vendor.

- o you may, within one year, cancel the deal if . . .
- oo the salesman was not licensed as required under the Direct Sellers Act; or
- oo the goods or services are not supplied within 120 days.
- o Nothing in the contract to the contrary can remove these rights.
- o In general, when an agreement is cancelled, you are entitled to a refund of your money

(a) within ten days after the day on which a notice of rescission of a contract has been delivered; or

(b) within fifteen days after the day on which a notice of rescission of a contract arrives at the post office to which it is addressed.

- gives no identification or proper licensing credentials

- does not answer your questions satisfactorily.

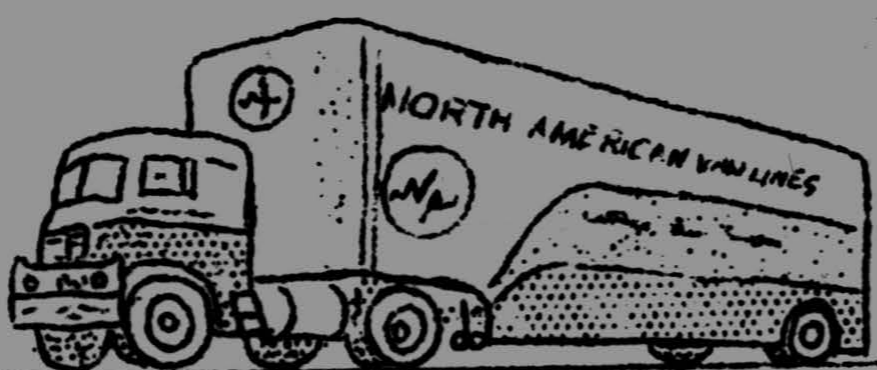

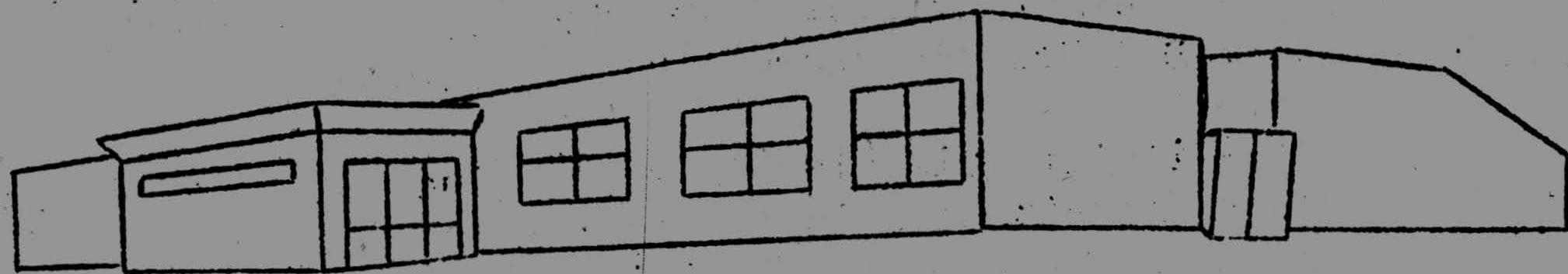

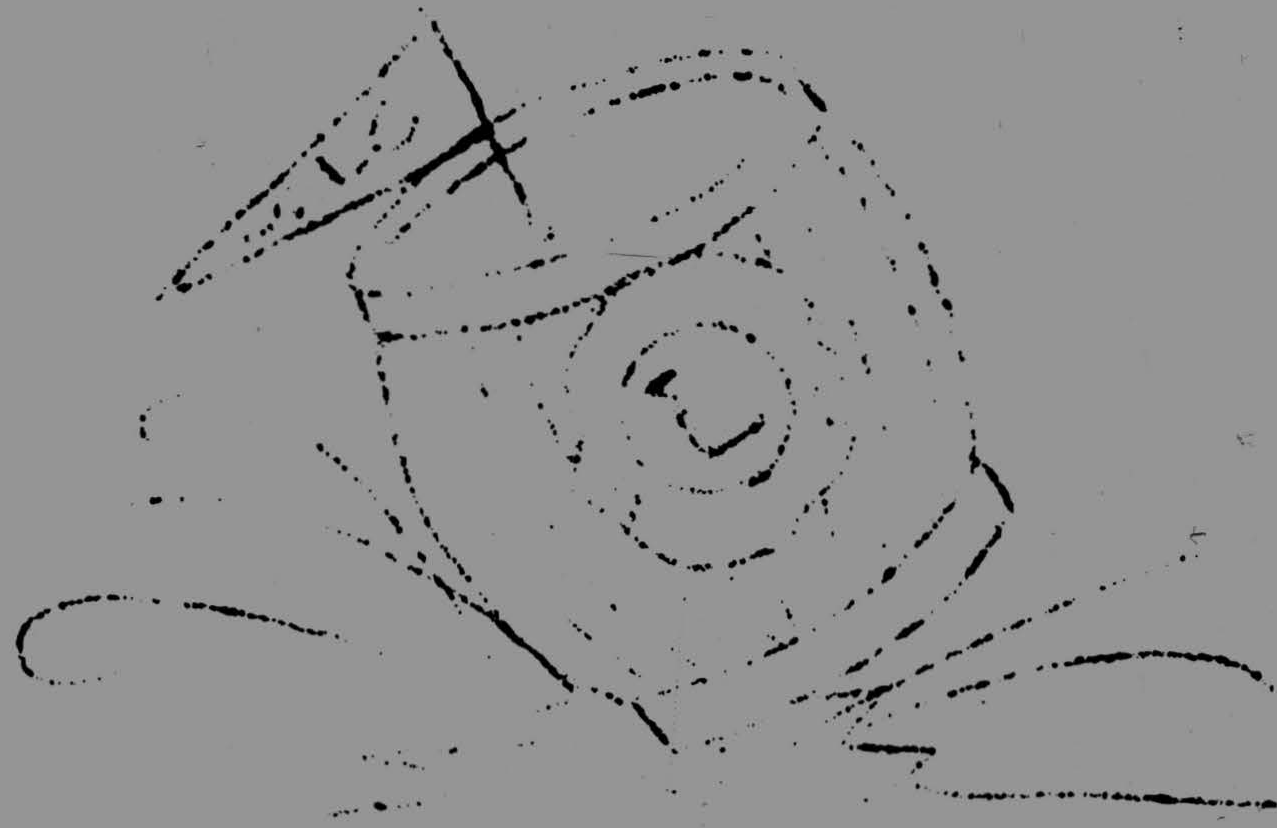
