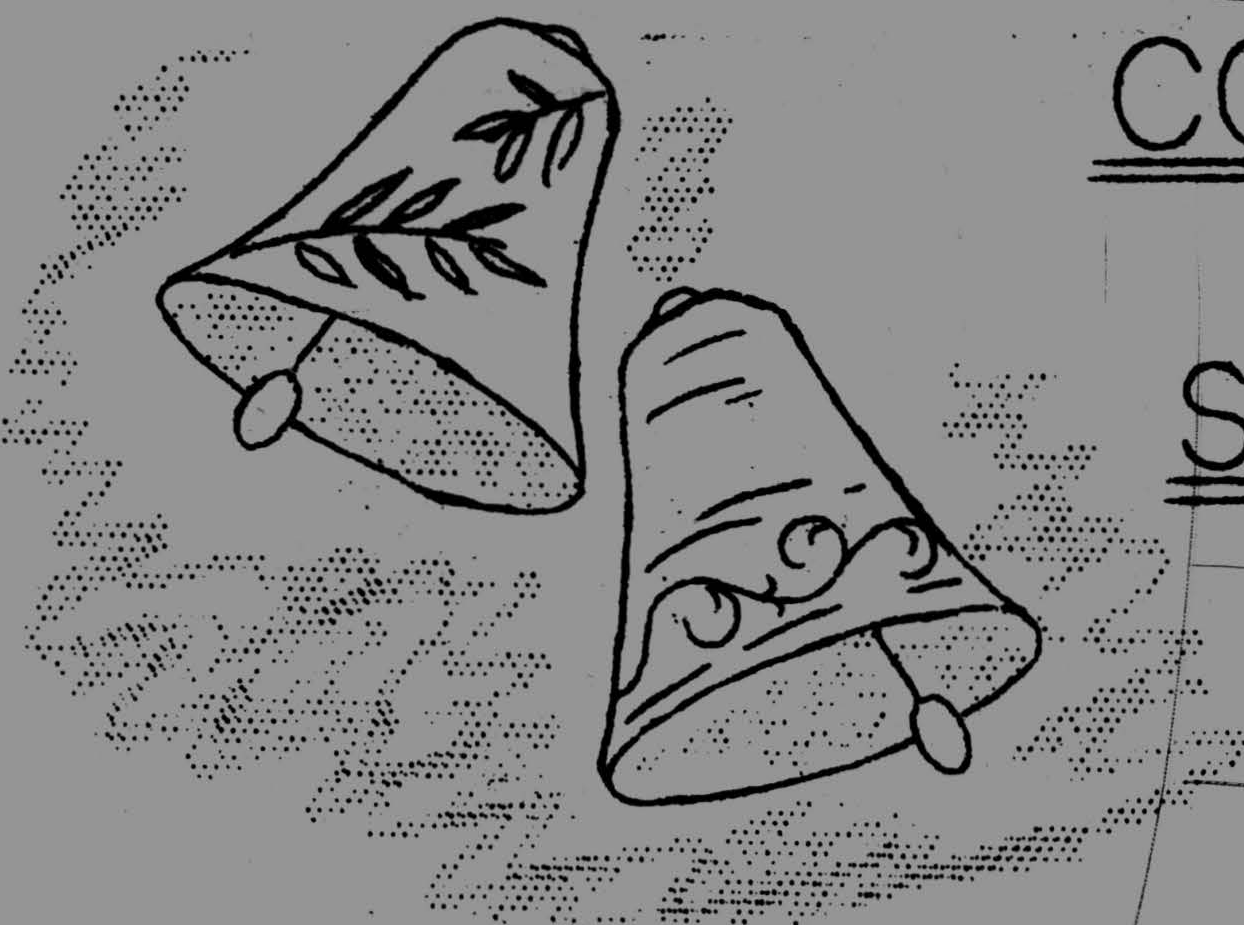
### THE INVISIBLE LINE, by Vivienne C. Chadwick

### SPLINT FOR A BROKEN HEART, by John Kirkpatrick

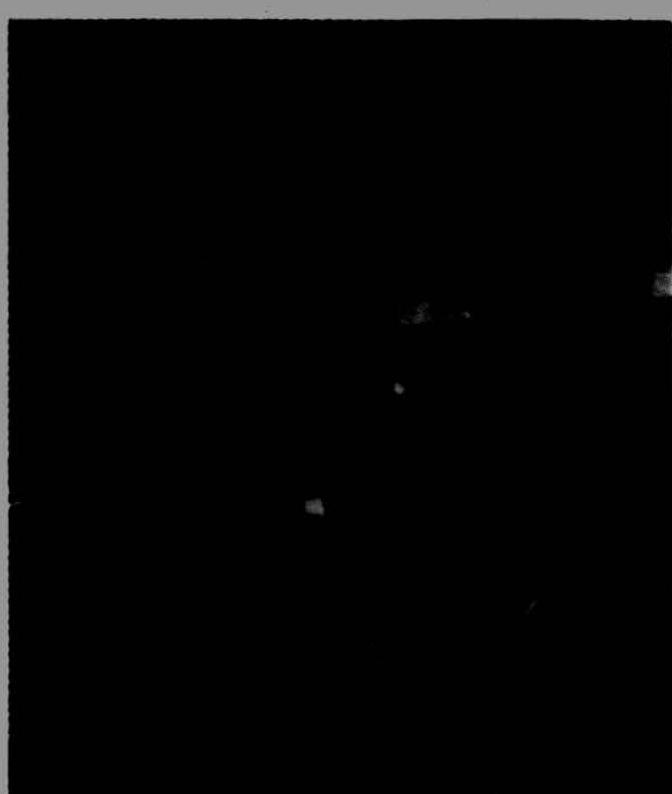

APPOINTMENT OF CONCILIATION BOARDS

The Honourable W.J.Keough, Minister of Labour, has decided to proceed with the appointment of conciliation boards to deal with disputes between locals of United Steelworkers of America and the two major mining companies at Wabush and Labrador City.

The Minister's decision is in response to requests from Locals 5795 and 6731 of the United Steelworkers of America affecting Iron Ore Company of Canada, Labrador City and Local 6235 of the same Union affecting Wabush Mines, Pickands Mather & Co., Managing Agent and Wabush Lake Railway Co.Limited, Wabush.

The disputes have arisen over the negotiation of changes to three (3) separate collective agreements between the parties which expired during October, 1968. The primary issues in dispute between the respective groups are extensive and in addition to monetary demands the Unions are requiring alterations to the major provisions of the agreement.

The three (3) disputes directly affect approximately 2,000 employees in the Wabush and Labrador City area.

The Minister has written the parties inviting them to nominate members of the boards.

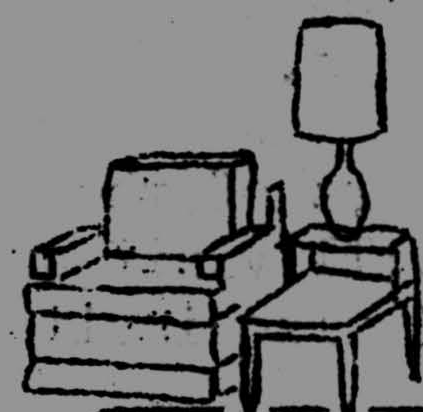

## NATIONAL ARTS CENTRE

### YOUTH PROGRAMME IMPORTANT PART OF N. A. C. WORK.

Estimates indicate that only four Canadians in a hundred have actually attended a live, professional performance of music, ballet or drama. But through a carefully planned Youth Programme, the National Arts Centre in Ottawa, Ontario, which opens on May 31, aims to change these statistics for future generations.

The Youth Programme, which will initially be implemented in the Ottawa region, has many facets. A series of special matinees for students, featuring opera, ballet, music and drama companies, is scheduled for the '69-70 season.

A student award programme grants invitations for regular subscription programmes to outstanding students from Ottawa and vicinity schools, and field trips to and tours of the Centre are actively encouraged. With permission of the companies concerned, groups of interested students will be invited to attend rehearsals to learn about the performing arts.

But the Youth Programme not only welcomes students to performances at the Centre. It sends performers out to the students themselves, in their schools. A choice of 33 distinct and carefully planned productions, designed for different age and interest groups, is offered to the area's elementary and high schools. For the first year of operation, from June 1969 to June 1970, 334 performances have been scheduled. It is anticipated that more than 400,000 students will be involved in the programme.

In-school productions will include performances by members of the National Arts Centre Orchestra, the Canadian Opera Company, the National Ballet, the Stratford Company, Le Théâtre du Capricorne, and Les Feux-Follets, which will take place with whatever facilities the schools have to offer.

The NAC Youth Programme's most ambitious undertaking is the integration of its programmes with the curricula of schools in the area, in order to present the performing arts as learning experiences rather than just entertainment.

Working in cooperation with Departments of Education and regional school boards as well as numerous principals and teachers, the Centre has already organized four consulting committees to act as liaison with the schools on future programmes, policies and scheduling.

A teacher-education programme is being initiated in which, through a series of seminars and lectures, faculty members can learn how best to use the features and facilities the Centre offers.

The Centre will also provide participating schools with published material, for both introductory and review purposes, on each of its presentations, so that teachers can prepare their classes for performances.

At the university level as well, the programme is concerned with filling the needs of the students, rather than offering them a "package deal" which they must accept as is.

Members of the resident orchestra, Le Théâtre du Capricorne and the Stratford Company will visit universities and take part in teaching and speaking engagements. They will also invite students to participate in workshops.

During the summer of 1969, a children's theatre will give bilingual performances in the Salon. Members of the theatre companies will hold story-telling sessions in parks and playgrounds and, in addition, the Centre's bilingual mobile theatre, Le Portage, will tour the region.

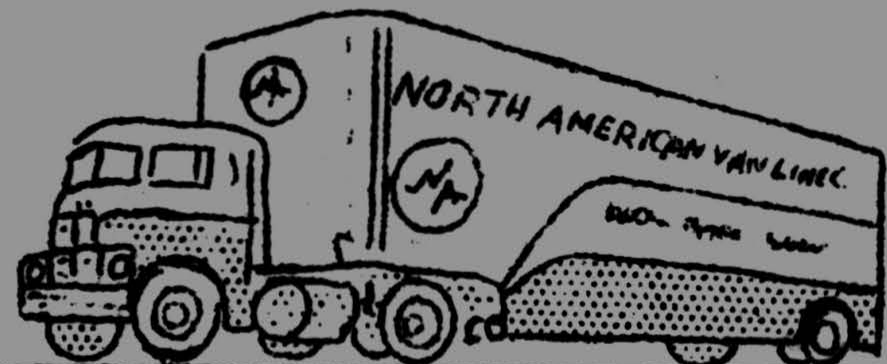

OFFICIAL OPENING OF NEWFOUNDLAND'S PROVINCIAL PARKS

May 15 will be the official opening date for Newfoundland Provincial Parks, the Honourable W.R.Callahan, Minister of Mines, Agriculture and Resources, announced on May 9th.

A total of thirty-four parks will open for the public use on this date, and thirty-one of these parks will have an officer in full-time attendance. Two parks in the western region, Squires Memorial Park and Blue Ponds Park, may not be fully operative due to snow conditions by May 15. However, the facilities in all other parks are expected to be ready by the official opening date.

The prepared facilities in the Provincial Parks system include eight hundred and twenty-eight camp sites most of which can also accommodate trailers; sixty-two trailer sites and nine hundred and three picnic sites.

One additional park area, Mary March Park in central Newfoundland, is presently under construction and is expected to be ready for public use sometime in July. This new park will contain initially twenty-five camp sites and twenty-five picnic sites.

The Minister said that the new park fees announced last March will come into effect on May 15. A vehicle entry sticker for the season will cost two dollars, an increase of one dollar over the entry fee charged in previous years. However, park visitors may, if they wish, pay a daily vehicle fee of fifty cents.

Mr. Callahan said that a park user survey, which is part of a National Outdoor Recreation Demand Study, will be conducted by the Provincial Parks Service this year. The survey will consist in part of a card questionnaire which will be issued to all visitors buying a seasonal or visitor permit at a provincial park. Visitors will be asked to complete the card and place it in a box provided at each park.

It is important to have the public co-operation in completing the questionnaire, said the Minister, since the results of this survey will have a major influence on future plans for the development of outdoor recreation facilities.
