IS YOUR HOME REALLY SAFE FOR CHILDREN

The failure of adults to protect children against the obvious dangers of drugs and chemicals is a very serious problem warns the National Safety Council, which adds that some 300 children under the age of five die each year from poisoning.

The council urges parents to follow these rules to help prevent their children from becoming poisoned:

Keep all drugs and medicines far out of the reach of children - preferably under lock and key.

Label all containers. Mark prescriptions with date, dosage and the patient's name.

Do not keep cleaners and other toxic chemicals in the medicine cabinet.

Pour down the drain all old or unlabeled medicines. Never throw them in a wastebasket.

Before giving or taking any drug, read the label in a good light.

Paste the day and night phone numbers of your physician and druggist inside the medicine cabinet door.

Never tell children that aspirin is "candy" (Large dosages of aspirin, taken secretly by children who think it's candy, can be deadly.)

Kathy Pottle's monologue, about the busybody who goes to 'cheer up' her sick friend, only to leave her feeling much worse, was very well done.

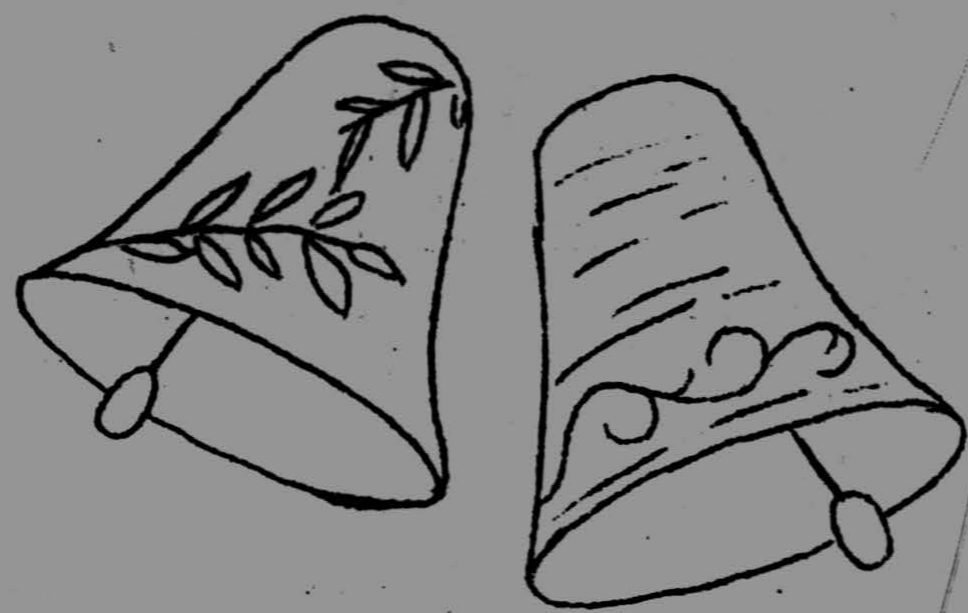

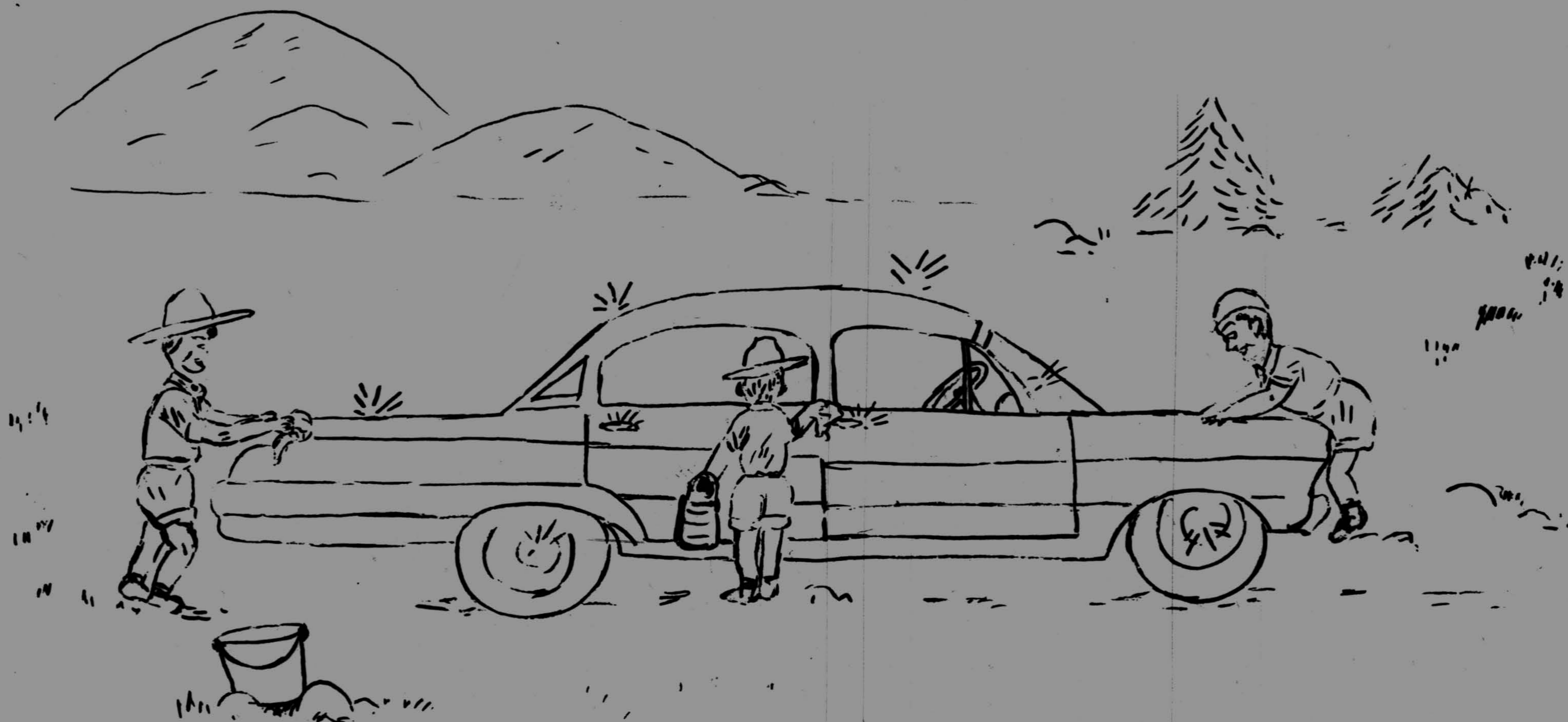

///SIMPLE RECIPES TO CUT OUT & KEEP ///

TIPS ON MAKING SANDWICHES

Always fill sandwiches generously - never skimp. Use several thin slices of meat instead of 1 thick slice.

When using toast to make your sandwiches, don't pile one on top of the other - this makes them soggy.

Always wrap each sandwich individually so as not to spoil the flavour.

Pack such things as tomatoes, pickles, and lettuce separately, adding them just before the sandwich is to be eaten.

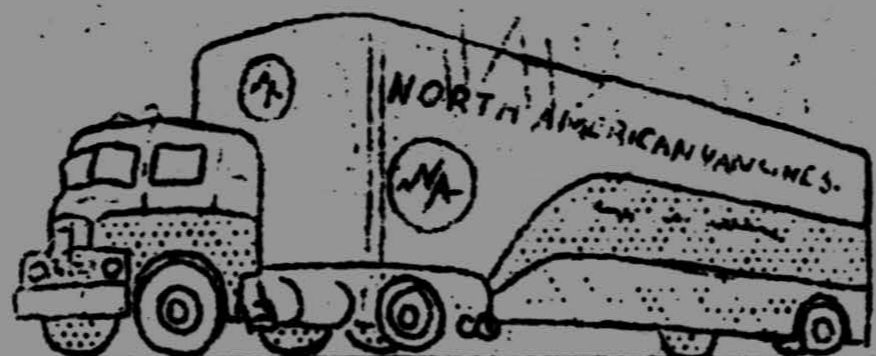
ROAST BEEF SALAD: Combine $1\frac{1}{2}$ cups chopped cold roast beef, $\frac{1}{2}$ cup finely diced celery, $\frac{1}{4}$ cup finely diced green pepper, 1 tbs. finely chopped onion, $\frac{1}{2}$ cup mayonnaise or salad dressing, and 2 to 3 tsp. prepared horseradish. CHILL.

LOBSTER SALAD: Combine $1\frac{1}{2}$ cups cooked or canned diced lobster, $\frac{1}{2}$ cup finely diced celery, $\frac{1}{2}$ cup mayonnaise or salad dressing, 2 tsp. lemon juice, $\frac{1}{4}$ tsp. salt, and a dash of pepper. CHILL

EGG SALAD: Combine 4 hard-cooked eggs, chopped; $\frac{1}{2}$ cup finely diced celery; 1 tbs. finely chopped onion; $\frac{1}{2}$ tsp. salt; dash of pepper; dash of cayenne; and $\frac{1}{2}$ cup mayonnaise or salad dressing. CHILL.

CHICKEN SALAD: Combine $1\frac{1}{2}$ cups chopped cooked chicken, $\frac{1}{2}$ cup finely diced celery, $\frac{1}{3}$ cup mayonnaise or salad dressing, 2 tsp. lemon juice, 1 to 2 tsp. onion juice or finely minced onion, $\frac{1}{2}$ tsp. salt, dash pepper. CHILL.

HAM SALAD: Combine $1\frac{1}{2}$ cups chopped ham, $\frac{1}{2}$ cup finely diced celery, $\frac{1}{4}$ cup chopped sour or dill pickle, 3 tbs. diced green pepper, $\frac{1}{2}$ cup mayonnaise or salad dressing, and 1 tbs. prepared mustard. CHILL.

PETS CORNER

THREE FAMOUS QUOTATIONS

Here is something that was said by a famous American author, called Mark Twain. "Man is the only animal that blushes - or needs to."

And here are a few charming lines written about the dog, by a well-known English humorist, Jerome K. Jerome: "He is very important, a dog is. He never makes it his business to inquire whether you are in the right or in the wrong. He never bothers as to whether you are going up or down life's ladder: never asks if you are rich or poor, silly or wise, sinner or saint. You are his pal. That is enough for him, and, come luck or misfortune, good repute or bad, honour or shame, he is going to stick to you, comfort you, guard you, and even give his life for you, if need be - foolish, brainless, wonderful dog!"

Another famous man also wrote lines to the honour of his dog. This time, he was a poet - Lord Byron. He lived about 150 years ago, and his poetry is still read by people today. He was very fond of animals. He lived in a beautiful mansion called Newstead Abbey in England, and in his will he directed that he should be buried at the Abbey, near the spot where his favorite dog lay. This dog had a curious but rather nice name - Boatswain. Boatswain had died of old age at Newstead Abbey in 1808, and Lord Byron put up a monument to his faithful friend, inscribed with these words:

NEAR THIS SPOT
ARE DEPOSITED THE REMAINS OF ONE
WHO POSSESSED BEAUTY WITHOUT VANITY,
STRENGTH WITHOUT INSOLENCCE
COURAGE WITHOUT FEROCITY,
AND ALL THE VIRTUES OF MAN WITHOUT HIS VICIES.
THIS PRAISE, WHICH WOULD BE UNMEANING FLATTERY
IF INSCRIBED OVER HUMAN ASHES,
IS BUT A JUST TRIBUTE TO THE MEMORY OF

BOATSWAIN, A DOG
That died at Newstead Abbey, November 18, 1808.

Maybe you are asking what breed was Boatswain? Well, for the breed of his dog, Lord Byron has Canada to thank; for Boatswain was a Newfoundland dog!

The box office in the main lobby of the new multi-million dollar structure will operate from 10 a.m. to 6 p.m. Monday through Saturday. Starting on June 2nd the hours will be extended, from 10: a.m. to 9 p.m. Monday through Saturday, and 12 noon to 9 p.m. on Sunday performance days.

Prices for the Opening Festival range from \$2.00 to \$7.50 and group attendance at performances may be arranged by contacting the box office.

From June 2 to 14, the theatres will present performances of drama, ballet, music and popular entertainment -- much of the programme especially commissioned for the occasion.

In the Opera House, the National Ballet Company of Canada presents three full-length productions, including the world premiere of a work by France's renowned choreographer Roland Petit, with music by the contemporary Greek composer Iannis Xenakis and sets by Hungarian-born Victor Vasarely. There will be concerts by the Montreal and Toronto Symphony Orchestras, an evening with singer-composer Gordon Lightfoot, another with Monique Leyrac, and a special production entitled "Pop Électronique" presenting today's music in a total environment setting that will envelop the audience.

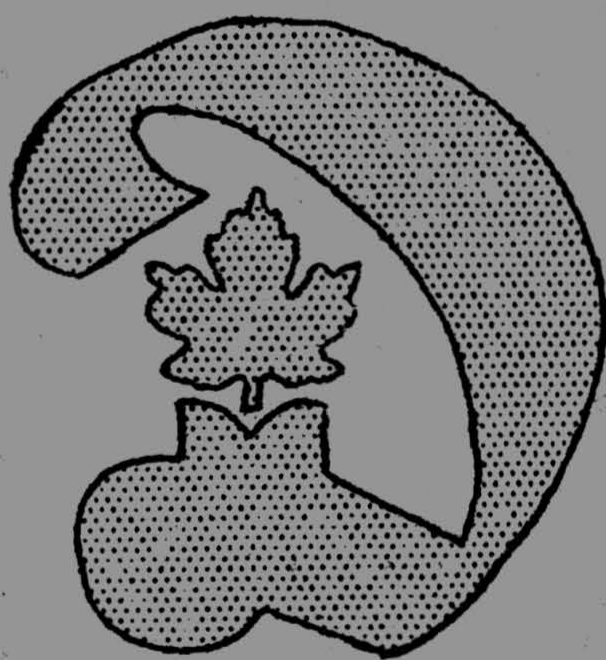
