They are fascinated by the library, for it has opened countless doors to new experiences for them. Many of them have developed a genuine interest in reading and spend much of their spare time in the library.

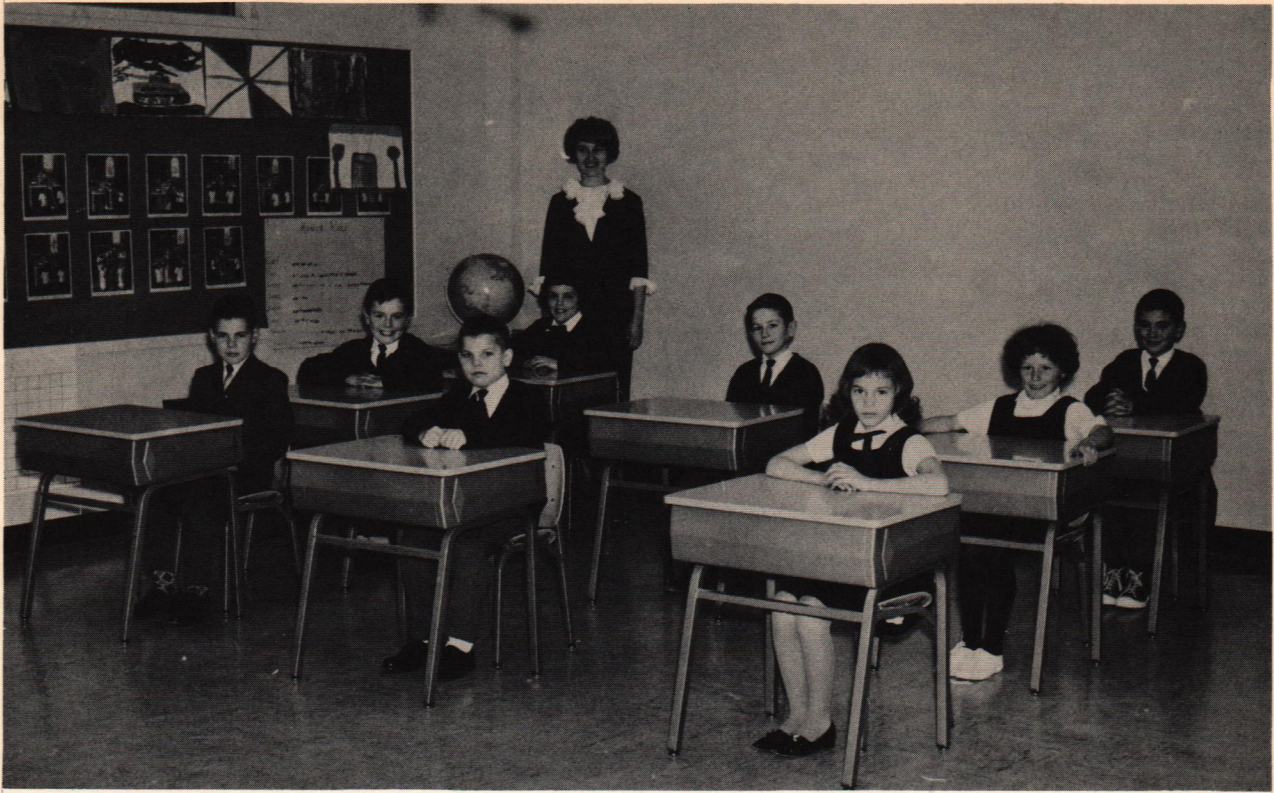

We consider this to be a successful year in our new home.

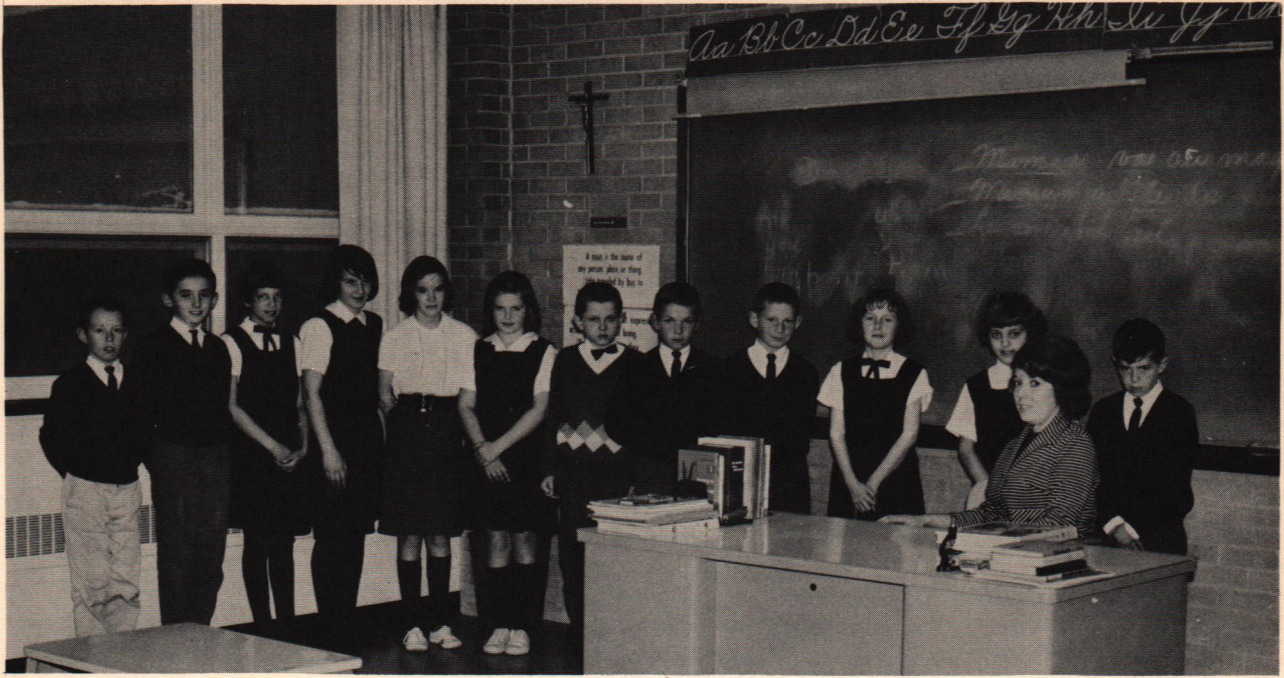

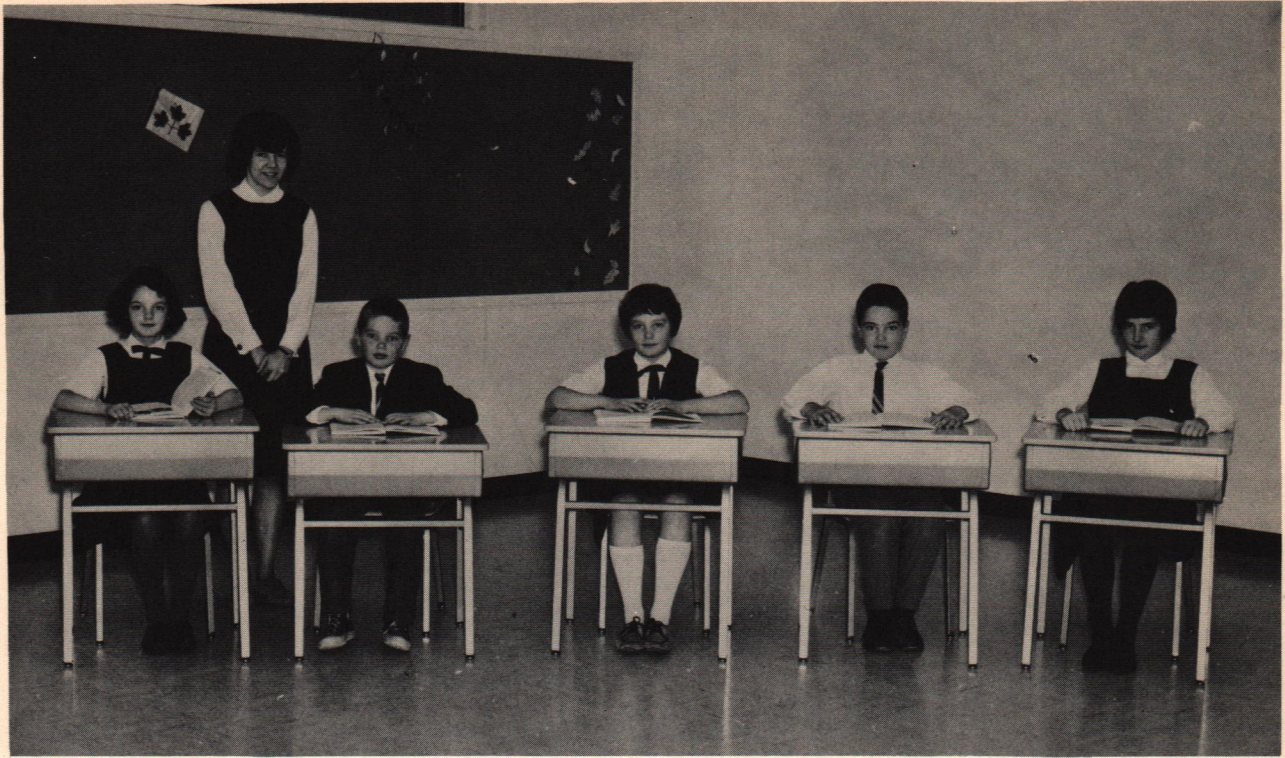
The members of the Grade V class numbered twelve at the beginning of the school year, but by February two had left Wabush, and one new pupil had arrived.

It has been a pleasure to work with these students during the past year.

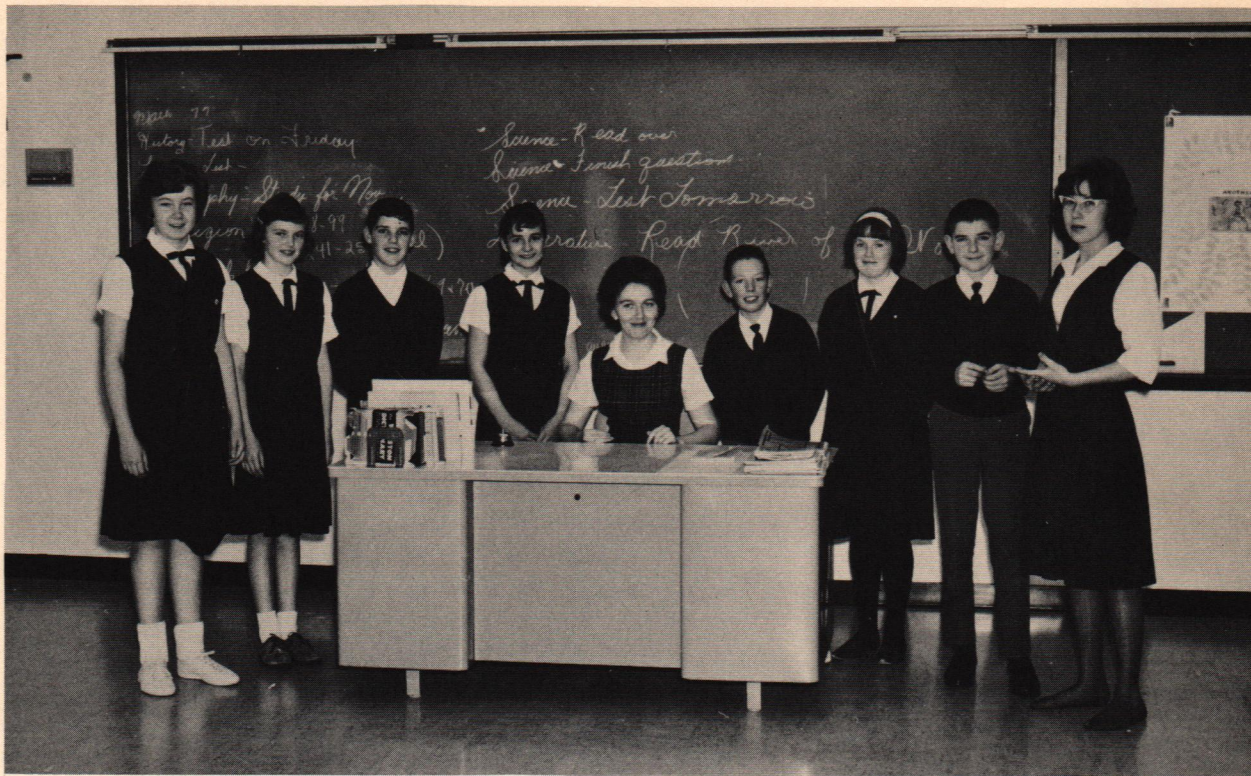

I hope you will develop and take with you the following two habits and attitudes which your high school teachers are forever looking for--and not too frequently finding--in students entering high school.

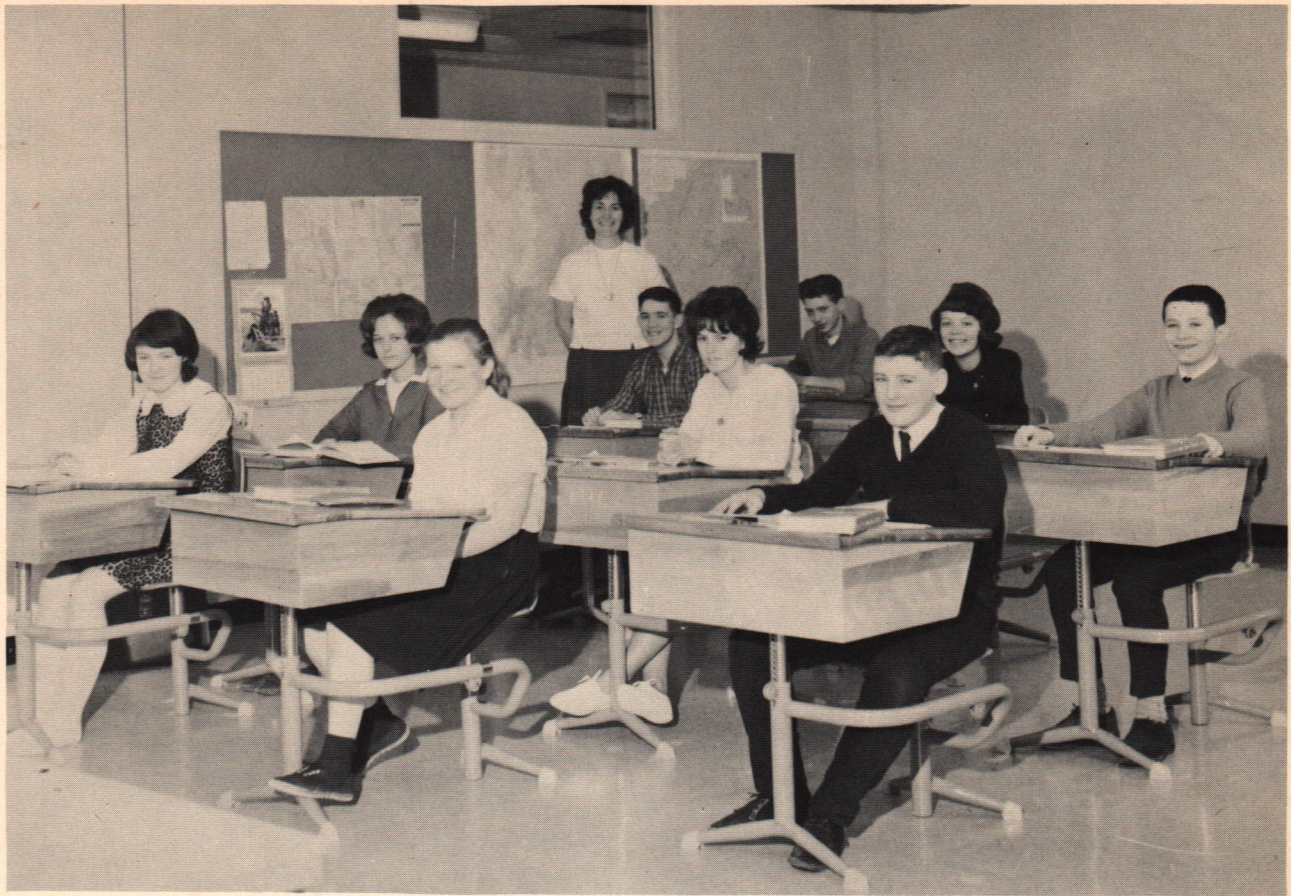
1. The ability to accept responsibility and work on your own.

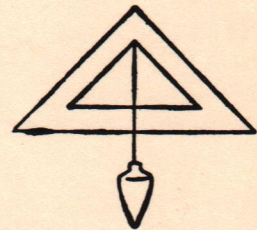
