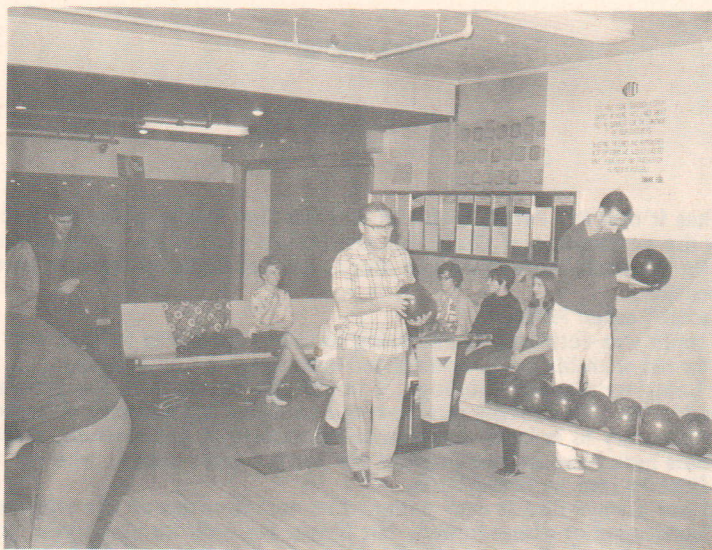
I sincerely extend my congratulations to you the graduating class and yearbook staff members for this project. It is indeed indicative of your initiative and perseverance.
