It is with all sincerity and every good wish that I extend congratulations to the Graduating Class of 1969.

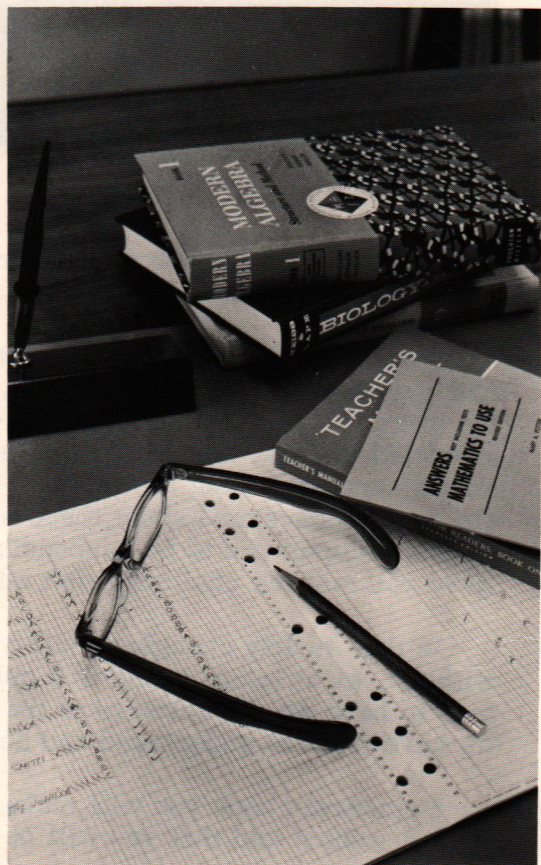
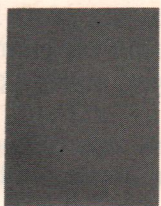
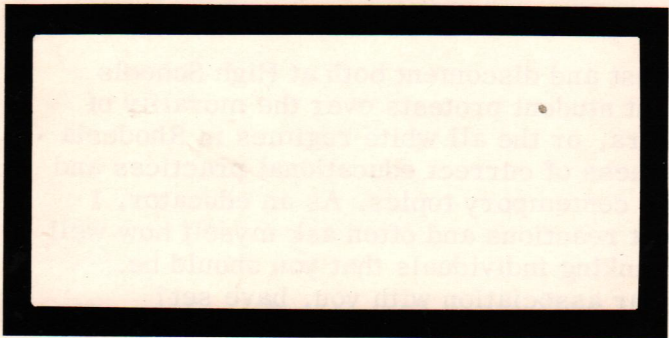

I sincerely hope you will make wise use of the experiences you have had here in school and that you will be remembered by the worthwhile contribution you make to society.

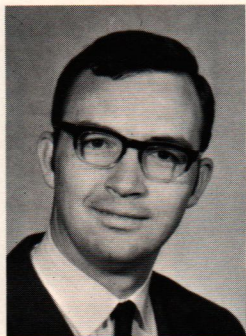
