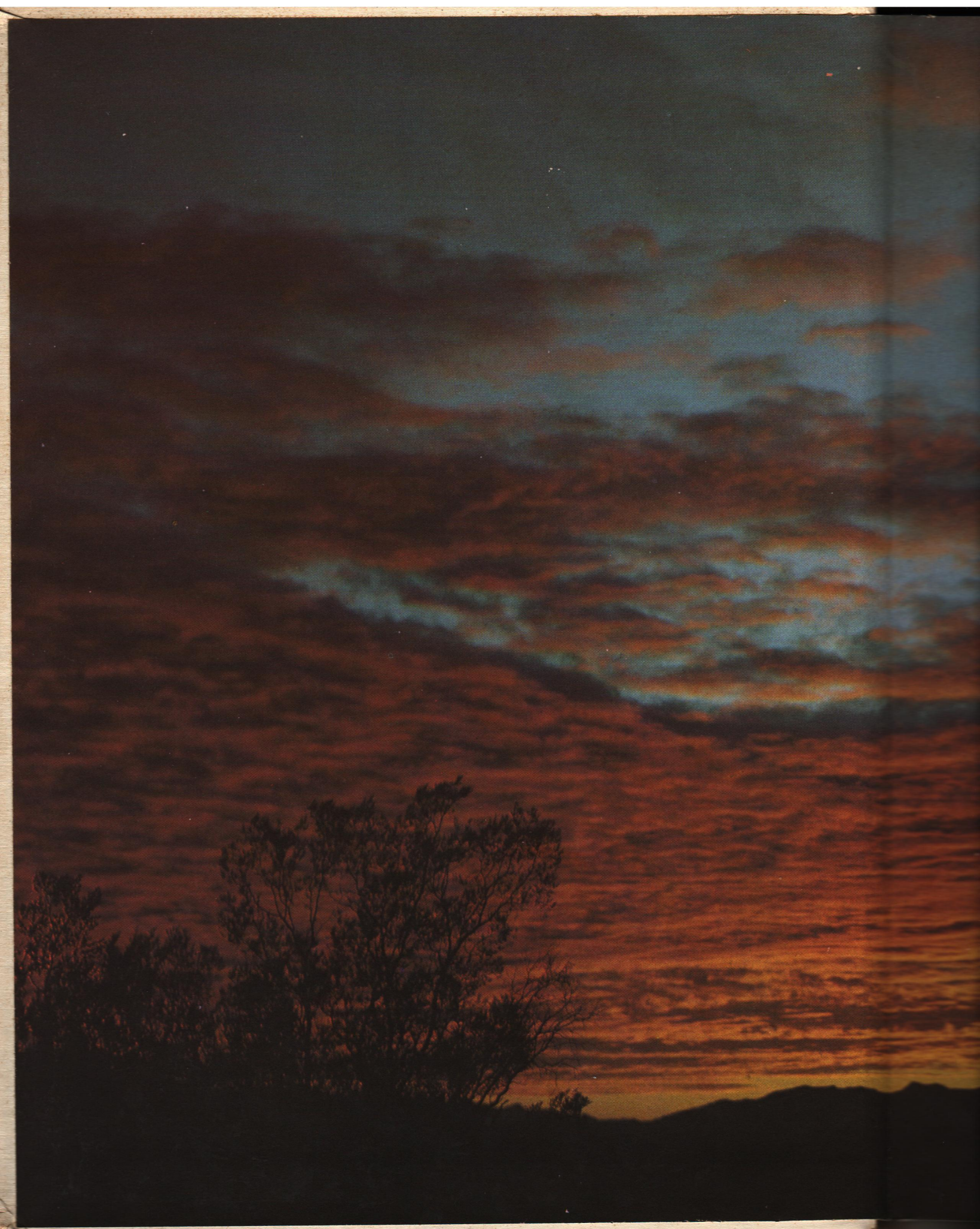
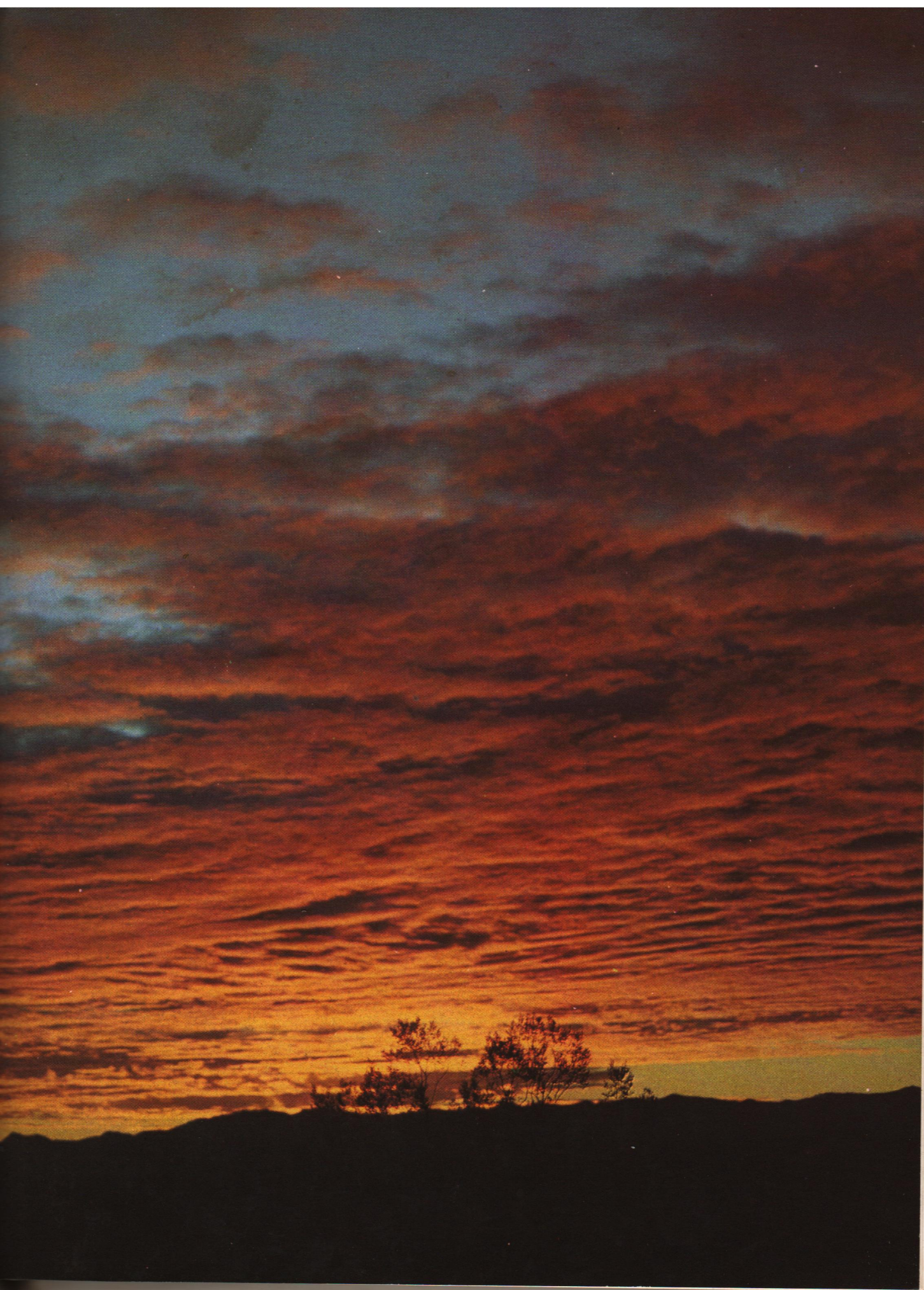

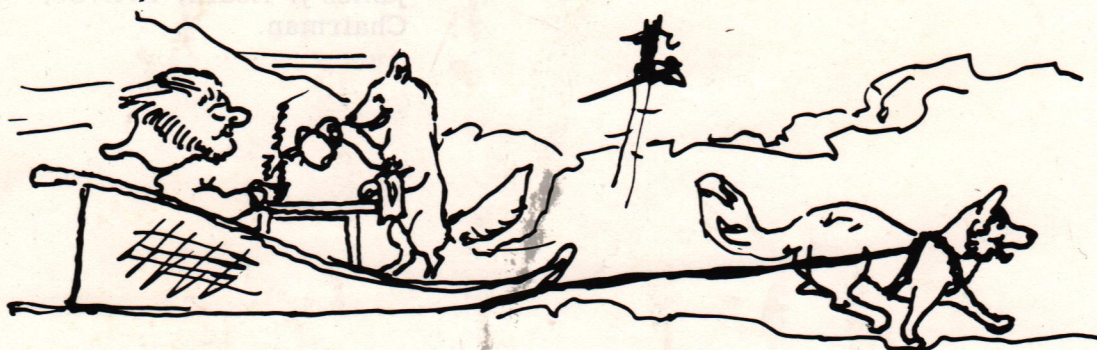

To The Graduating Class of J. R. Smallwood Collegiate


Dear Students:


I feel that the system is similar to the theme you have chosen for your yearbook "Unity and Spirit" because the education system in Wabush is just that.

The strength of each bond will depend upon the spirit given to it by the intimacy and insight of the relationship with the group.


Usually, smaller, more familiar and personally related groups such as the family unit are more easily and quickly united, particularly when there is or appears to be a common cause or threat.

"Friendliness is a togetherness of minds as well as of hearts; of hearts as well as of minds."



It might be worth your effort and time to reflect now on the value of your association with your peers. However, these reflections will mean more to you in the future when you have to contend with the complexities of living.

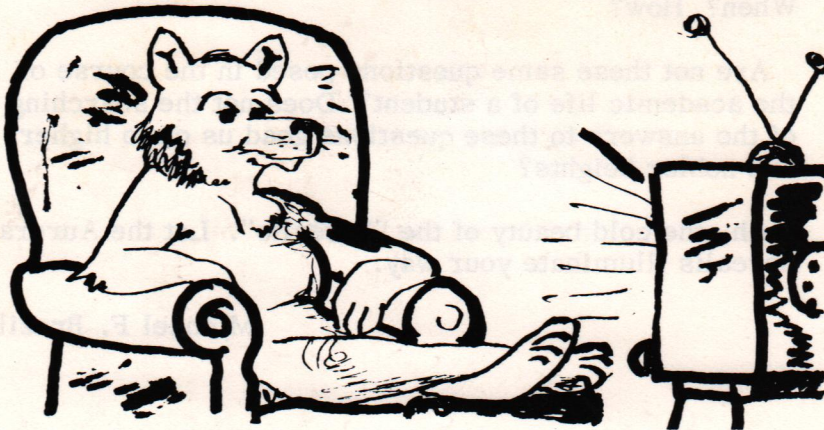

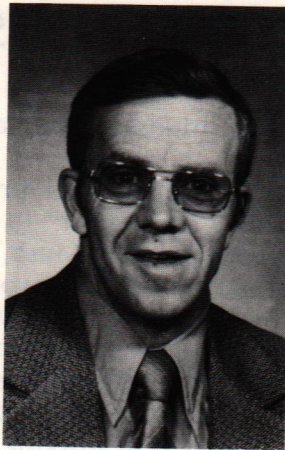

Questions foremost in our minds are Why? Where? When? How?

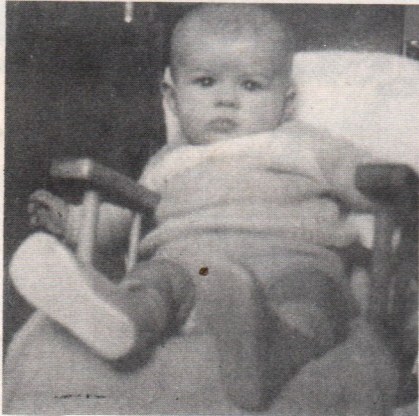
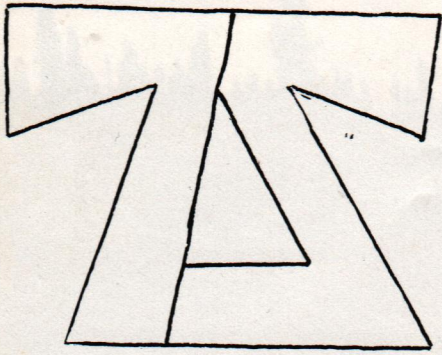
Are not these same questions posed in the course of the academic life of a student? Does not the searching of the answers to these questions goad us on to higher and nobler heights?

Ah, the cold beauty of the "Borealis". Let the Aurora Borealis illuminate your way.

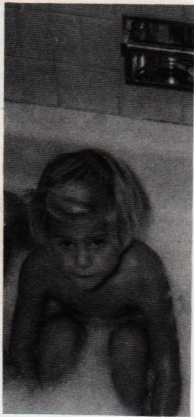
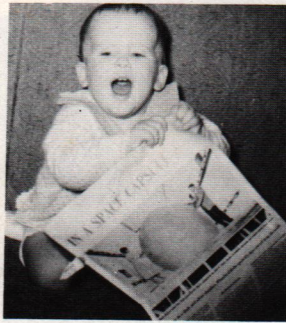
